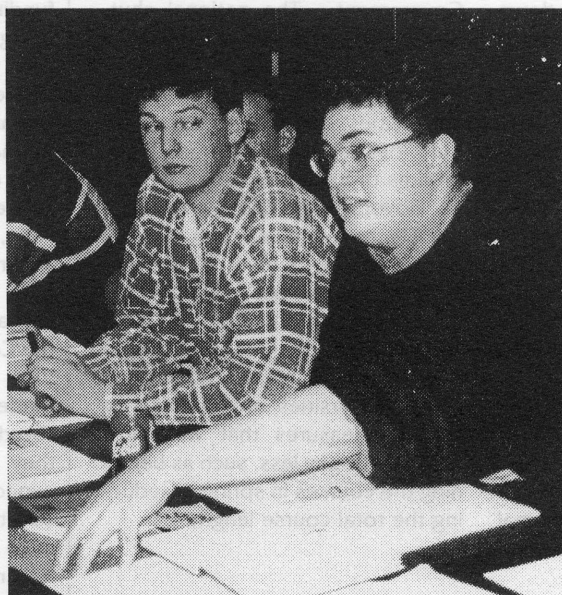

Andy Heeps: 'C&G Union a Joke'

At a surprisingly vocal meeting of the City & Guilds Officers and Members Council (OMC) last Monday, a year of perceived inactivity and incompetence from the C&G Union Executive finally came to a head with the presentation of a motion of no-confidence in Vivake Bhalla, the C&GU President. However, as Mr Bhalla was absent from the meeting, and thus unable to defend himself, C&GU rules forbade the proposal being put to a vote, and instead the OMC passed a motion to convene an Emergency Meeting on Tuesday 10 February, where the motion of no-confidence would be discussed, with or without Mr Bhalla.

This move has been welcomed by the ICU Executive, who were

threatening to push for a motion of no-confidence in the entire Guilds Executive. Instead ICU Council, who met on Tuesday night, passed

a motion commending the actions of the OMC, but asking the C&GU Executive to produce regular reports so that ICU Executive can monitor their progress. Speaking to Felix Andy Heeps, ICU President, said that "it would be unrealistic to expect great changes this year... but by recognising that they have a problem OMC have made the first step to improving C&GU". However, Mr Heeps pointed out that it would be wrong to put all of the blame for the problems in C&G this year on Mr Bhalla; "Vivake has been made into some kind of scapegoat, but all he's done wrong is not knowing when to give in". This

point was emphasised by Hannah Pearson, C&G Association Rep, who sees last year's elections as

Boat Club Bus Found in Thames

The IC Boat Club's minibus has recently been placed into early retirement, after being found bobbing in the Thames. Vandals broke into the vehicle in the early hours of a winter's morning, released the hand brake, and pushed the bus into the River Thames.

The following day, during an early morning training session, a team of rowers were astounded to discover their minibus had joined them in the water. The drenched bus had to be pushed back the 500yds it had drifted downstream, and was placed outside the boat club, where it has taken up permanent residence. Jules Davenport,

the boat club captain, who was amongst those training at the time, could only describe the experience as "very bizarre".

The boat club's minibus is not the only vehicle to fall foul of the hooligans, a number of other cars in the area have suffered a similar

fate. The incidents are symptomatic of a six month spate of vandalism in the Putney area; clothing, personal belongings and outboard engines have all been stolen from several nearby boat clubs. The crime wave has even extended to the theft of a 30ft trailer from one club.

The police have conducted an investigation into the incident. New security measures have been installed, and patrols in the area have been stepped up. The boat club's coach, Bill Mason, described the act as a "sick joke" but was heartened by the fact that high levels of security have limited attacks on the boathouse to this solitary event.

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NUS to Strike

The NUS announced last week that its plans for a shutdown of Further and Higher Education centres across the country has been overwhelmingly supported by a national ballot.

On 4 March, over 130 universities and colleges will close down. Student unions will be the centre of the campaign on the day, with over two million students taking part. Support will also come from other teaching and campus trade unions. The day of protest follows what the NUS call a "carefully planned battle of attack against the Government's plans to introduce fees" which has, so far, included a day of protest last November, a Week of Action in December, and a series of lobbies on parliament.

The NUS claim that students and their parents contribute enough to Higher Education, and that business and industry should now be making a more 'formal' contribution. It is hoped that the

actions of the NUS will force a re-thinking of the Teaching and Higher Education Bill, which proposes the idea of tuition fees and is currently being passed through the House of Lords.

Douglas Trainer, NUS president, said that, "this is a fight we can win and we will defeat the Government. The national shutdown will show our anger. Fees are killing access to Higher Education, they will destroy our universities and colleges just as they destroy would-be students' dreams of higher education."

Government figures released last December revealed a drop of 20,000 in the number of applications to universities, showing the concern that many school leavers are feeling at the idea of having to pay for their higher education. Many universities are considering various measures that will allow students to pay less, such as beginning the courses in spring or reducing the total course length.

Warning: Speakers Unsound

On Thursday of last week a resident of Bernard Sunley Hall was mugged. While on his way to college, the student was stopped on Queen's Gate by two men who pulled up in a white van. The driver asked the student whether he wanted to buy some cheap hi-fi speakers. The student declined, but the man persisted, so the student explained that he had to go because he was late for college. The man offered him a lift and the student agreed, and got into the back of the van. Once inside the driver's accomplice, who had been quiet until now, told the student to hand over his money. Due to the man's threatening behaviour the student obliged, but the ordeal did not end there. After discovering which bank the student patronised, the driver took him to a branch and forced him to withdraw £40 from a cash dispensing machine. The stu-

dent was then freed.

This was one success in a long line of attempts to con IC students by a group claiming to be delivery men. One hall warden described it as "a premeditated and organised scam". Other students have also been accosted, and some have even purchased the speakers, only later to find that they are extremely poor quality.

The scale of this fraudulent operation is not known for certain, but it would seem that more than one partnership is operating in the South Kensington area. The delivery men target students and tend to use various excuses to explain how they got hold of the merchandise. The audio name on the side of the vehicle, along with the delivery registration form they often brandish, serve to increase the apparent authenticity of their con. College security are aware of the situation and the police have been informed.

News in Brief...

FEES REPRIEVE

The new university tuition fees introduced by the government last year have once again been watered down. In an attempt to ease the current higher education funding crisis, all new students are being asked to contribute £1000 a year towards their course costs. However, in the summer, the Department of Education agreed to make the charge means-tested, exempting students from poorer families from the charge. Now, students are being offered an amnesty period, and will not have to pay until January 1999. Diana Warwick, Chief Executive of the Committee of Chancellors and Vice Chancellors (CVCP) who made the decision explained that "Students will be invoiced when they arrive at university, and we expect most to pay immediately. But those students who experience real difficulty in meeting the full amount straight away will now have more time to pay."

as will Guy's. Speaking to the Commons, Frank Dobson, the Health Secretary, said "We will not countenance the closure of that great hospital which has served the people of London for 875 years."

The closure of Bart's was first proposed in 1992 by the Tomlinson report, and the hospital was due to close by 2001, with services transferred to the Royal London.

Meanwhile, the merger of Hammersmith (home of the RPMS) and Charring Cross Hospitals is to be accelerated, and is to include the transfer of Queen Charlotte's to the Hammersmith site. Indeed, the report marks Hammersmith out to be developed into an international centre of excellence, which therefore stands to benefit heavily from the extra £140 million promised for the NHS in the capital.

PI CONSUMES

The student newspaper at University College London, *Pi*, has merged with its smaller brother *The Week*. *Pi* had been losing revenue in recent years and was forced to rely heavily on UCL Union for support. In order to save funds, it has merged with the union's 'what's on' newspaper. The name has been retained, and the paper is now being published weekly.

BARTS SAVED

St Bartholemew's hospital was granted a reprieve from the threat of closure on Tuesday, when the government accepted the recommendations of an independent review of London's hospitals. Bart's will continue as a specialist centre for cancer and heart conditions, but will lose its A & E role,

Election Update

NEWS TEAM

Papers for Sabbatical elections come down today. Anyone wishing to run for a position must be signed up, along with a proposer and twenty seconders, by 6pm this evening. As Felix went to press, seven candidates had signed up. David Hellard and Jon Lambert are running for ICU President; both have been proposed and are fully seconded. There are three candidates for Deputy President (Clubs and Societies); Simon Cooper, Ben Janes and Adam Cherrington. At the time of writing none of them had twenty seconders, and Adam

Cherrington has yet to find a proposer. Felix Editor is being contested by two candidates, Alok Jha and Ed Sexton, both of whom are proposed and fully seconded. Niall Darwin has signed up for Deputy President (Finance and Services), but has yet to find his seconders.

In a change from the dates printed in last week's Felix, Hustings are to be held on Monday 16 (ICU), Tuesday 17 (Charing Cross) and Wednesday 18 (St. Mary's) February. Voting is in all departments on Monday 23 and Tuesday 24 February.



Shephard Fails to Excite Con Soc Flock

Rt Hon Gillian Shephard, Member of Parliament for Norfolk South-West and former Minister for Education and Employment, addressed a Consoc meeting on Wednesday. She spoke briefly on the task of the Conservative party in opposition, which she described as "asking the unanswerable", and her specialist area of Higher Education.

Mrs Shephard began by outlining the reasons why she felt the Tories had lost the last General Election, which she saw as problems of elector tedium, splits over Europe, and the Party appearing out-dated. She anticipates a complete reform of Conservative Policy, led by William Hague and Peter Lilley's 'Listening to Britain' campaign, to be launched next month. She emphasised that it is important not to get too heavily bogged down by policy at this stage, citing Mrs Thatcher, who had "travelled light" during the seventies.

Moving on to attack Labour, she responded to Peter Mandelson's description of the Opposition as "pathetic", claiming that Labour themselves are to blame for the trivialisation of recent discussion in the Commons, as they are attempting to bypass Parliament completely, by issuing press releases to declare policy. Mrs Shephard feels that Ministers either avoid questions, or claim that the subject is 'under review'. Finally, she emphasised that the process of devolution had not been thoroughly thought out, and no English voter had ever had

the chance to register their feeling on the issue. Highlighting her own

case, she claimed that the people of Norfolk feel no desire to merge with Hertfordshire or Essex in a potential new regional assembly for East Anglia.

Moving on to the Higher Education debate, Mrs Shephard added that a comprehensive overhaul of the University system was necessary, considering the mas-

sive increases in student numbers since the issue was last addressed in the sixties. The key is, according to Ms Shephard, to ensure that public money is fairly distributed "to

maximise quality and choice". She feels that this would best be achieved by attaching funding to individual students, so that they bring funding with them to their university, thus increasing competition amongst HE institutions. More importantly, Mrs Shephard emphasised that a Conservative government would not have abolished the maintenance grant, but would have moved to cap student numbers, with Mrs Shephard for one feeling that any further increases in numbers would be detrimental. Her concluding comments focused on the need to increase the respect given to Higher Education - particularly the 'new' universities. Speaking in their defence, she pointed out that "in my day you could get a degree in sport at Oxford. It would have been called English or History or something, but basically it would have been a degree in sport".

He went on to explain that this act of wanton destruction came as a particular blow to the club from a financial as well as a logistical point of view, but was certain that club would "just get on". The bus, which was estimated to be worth £15,000, suffered irreparable damage as a result of rust, ruined electrics and sodden upholstery. Jules Davenport stated "it looks okay, but nothing works and every now and again a bit more water runs out from somewhere." The minibus was officially declared a write-off by insurers last week and plans are now being made to purchase a second-hand replacement. Felix has been informed that the insurance company plan to reimburse the Boat Club about £7,000.

The Boat Club originally obtained the minibus under a cloud

of controversy. The facilitating grant was awarded by an IC sports fund known as the Harlington Trust, but almost immediately afterwards the trust decided that it would no longer consider applications for club minibuses. Frank Murray, the sports and leisure manager, justified the move, commenting "it is essential the club gets to regattas." He went on to describe the sizeable amount of equipment required for the meets which are invariably held significant distances away from college.

The Boat Club is currently hiring out buses through the union, which brings them into line with other clubs and societies. Frank Murray outlined plans for financing a replacement minibus, suggesting that a request to the Harlington Fund could make up the balance after the insurance pay-out.

the root of the problem: "The candidates stand as individuals, not as potential members... most are just after CV points and don't realise the commitment involved".

If the motion of no-confidence is passed (or if, as has been rumoured, Mr Bhalla resigns) a temporary President will be elected by the OMC, until the results of the C&GU elections are announced on 3 March. The newly elected President would then take over immediately. It is hoped that this move would provide the necessary catalyst to begin the process of renewal in Guilds. In the words of Selina Vinayaga-Pavan, C&G Publicity and Welfare Officer, "Exec is supposed to be a team, and we have finally realised that to function properly we need that team - but every team needs a

captain".

Looking to the future, it is realised that the problems of C&GU cannot be solved immediately, and go back far beyond this year - Eric Allsop, former ICU President, suggested that C&GU had been going downhill since he came to Imperial in 1989. However, Andy Heeps commented that whilst no overnight changes can be expected, he would like to see Guilds "taking the first steps... reviewing their constitution, sorting out their finances, and building up a solid first step in the chain of the command". Mr Heeps promised that only if such steps fail to be achieved will he use his newly mandated powers to take greater control of the running of C&G.

Imperial's funding is increasingly coming from Oil companies with a reputation for appalling environmental destruction, denial of Global Warming and links with assassinations. TIME TO ABOLISH THE CCUs

The problems of the City and Guilds Union this year serve as a pointed reminder; it's time to face up to reality and admit what our CCUs have become - outdated self-serving remnants or their former selves that eat up resources and do hardly anyone any good. It would be ludicrous to have five student unions at Imperial College, but the student union identity is still endemic in the CCUs. While they are still called unions, the attitude that they should be providing social facilities will prevail even though the ability to do so is far beyond their resources and competence. IC School of Medicine Union is the only CCU in living memory that has run a 'proper' students' union, and many of their facilities are duplicated or bettered by ICU.

Unfortunately, the inability of the CCUs to do the job they *think* they should be doing interferes with their attempts to do the job they *should* be doing; namely, academic support and advice for students. Such support is woefully lacking at IC (see my rant in Felix 1103) and though it would be great if college overhauled the system, it's really down to the students of ICU to take the initiative.

Let's look at a specific example. You enroll on a new course, a difficult one, only to find that your lecturer is inaudible / incompetent / wrong / failing to turn up at all. What can you do? At present, not much. If you are fortunate enough to have a dep rep, then you can complain to them. If they are one

of the more conscientious ones, they inform department via the staff-student committees, but the department does nothing. The end of the course rolls along (assuming you're still doing it), and you fill in the end of term questionnaire. "Oh dear", say the department, "Dr Death got a bad response this year. Never mind, let's give him to the first-years next time." And that's if you're *lucky*. But don't worry, there's always the CCU bar night to drown your problems, maybe.

Close 'em down. Get rid of the archaic names and crests, burn the regalia. We don't need half-arsed unions, we need a properly run academic support service for students, people who are approachable and efficient with real powers to make changes in the departments. Do it now.

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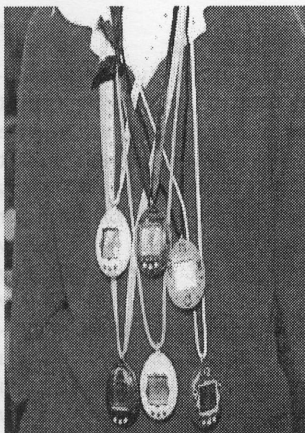

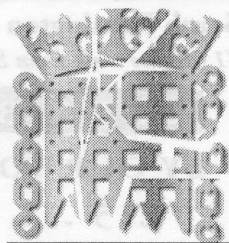

For the smaller countries, this usually means some good publicity, with 'our man' hob-nobbing with the US President. For Britain, the situation is slightly different. American patriotism is defined by their declaration of independence from Britain, and along with the Irish-American question, there has always been a slight anti-British undercurrent within the American population. Relations also depend on the ideology of the respective leaders being similar: with Thatcher-Reagan/Bush there was a rapport between the leaders, and consequently the Governments. When Clinton took over from Bush in 1992, rumours surfaced that the Conservative Party had assisted Republicans in the election campaign. As well as being a bad move in supporting a losing side (something which had additionally been clear beforehand) political partisanship in matters such these were more than stupid. They were suicidal. John Major and Bill Clinton did not get on at all well, with Clinton rebuffing Major within one week of entering the White House.

Clinton made little effort to hide his admiration of Tony Blair, pulling out all the stops when Blair visited Washington a year before the General Election. They have hold a

broadly similar position in the political spectrum, and are known to be good friends as well as good colleagues. Both leaders are extremely useful to each other, with Blair's 'star' status, along with Britain's recent 'Cool Britannia' image overseas, providing some useful political capital for the President. It seems Blair has plenty to gain from being associated with the United States. Unfortunately for us, relations are usually unequal. We Britain is undoubtedly the junior partner in the special relationship, something

which was first made obvious in the Suez Crisis in the 50s, the first time the U.S. effectively told Britain to hand back the colony and canal. This and previous British Governments have seen the U.S. as a teacher in some senses, adopting and learning from measures taken across the pond. This may not have been so obvious in Europe, when even now, the Government seems more eager to lecture than to listen. However, Britain has not been entirely sycophantic to the States in foreign policy. Sir Leon Brittan, a British EU Commissioner, was the

first one to prepare retaliatory EU measures against the U.S. Helms-Burton Act, punishing foreign companies for investing in Cuba, Iran or Libya. This was done with the full support of the British Government. Britain has also called for the U.S. to pay what it owes to the United Nations, remarking that they "shouldn't have representation without taxation", which raised a few hackles.

On the situation in the Gulf, the U.S. and Britain are completely in agreement. Many Gulf observers are

Sandhurst, the Army's Officer Academy). Anglo-Israeli relations had never been good, starting with the St David's Hotel bombing after war, with claims that the present Israeli Government is descended from a terrorist group. Most observer comment that Israel as a state would never have got off the ground if were not for the support of the U.S. Government.

So on an area of potential divide between the U.S. and Britain, Britain stands side by side, the only country publicly to do so. It seems that our Government has got to like a new tactic of standing by other Governments in trouble (note British support of French nuclear testing), no doubt to extract a few favours later. Perhaps Blair is playing the long game in Anglo-American relations, one that the press don't necessarily seem to be picking up.

The one thing that Tony Blair must be laughing about will be the Tories' reaction to these events. They are still discussing the cost of ministers' offices' refurbishment, trying to extend the 'sleaze' image for as long as possible. If the public wish to hear this message, they probably don't want to hear it from the Tories. As Blair discusses the state of world politics today, Hague discusses office furniture. Let us hope they soon provide some credible opposition, before Labour get too big for its boots. The ramifications for that would not make pleasant reading.

Part Two: Tutorials

Tutorials represent a golden opportunity for an interactive exchange of ideas between students and those who are knowledgeable in their field. 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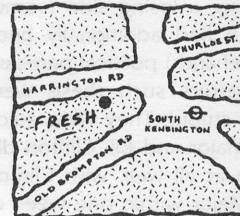

Jonathan Trout met "Comedy's Poet Laureate" at the Bloomsbury Theatre before the final show in his highly popular national tour. He brought Will Dugdale along to take the pictures and a handful of chocolate eggs for reasons which will become obvious.

The deserted, expectant theatre has a strangely charged feel to it as I perch on the stage aside **John Hegley**. Casually dressed in an open necked, expensive looking shirt and cream jeans, his timid, innocent public persona seemingly belied by his darting eyes and unshaven chin. I hand him a coffee, the five sachets of sugar inspired partly by knowing, winkly irony, partly by gushing hero worship but mostly because he might have been serious in naming his first book "Five Sugars Please". Typically, as such situations often turn out, he used none. Before we started I wondered if it would be possible to ask him to think of a poem around the theme "Felix".

HEGLEY: How much?

TROUT: Just a couple of lines.

HEGLEY: I meant how much I would get paid.

TROUT: I'll give you a Crème Egg for it.

I duly hand over a Crème Egg. He seems surprised, and grateful.

HEGLEY: Yeah? Oh, all right.

Cheers mate. That's even before you've heard it!

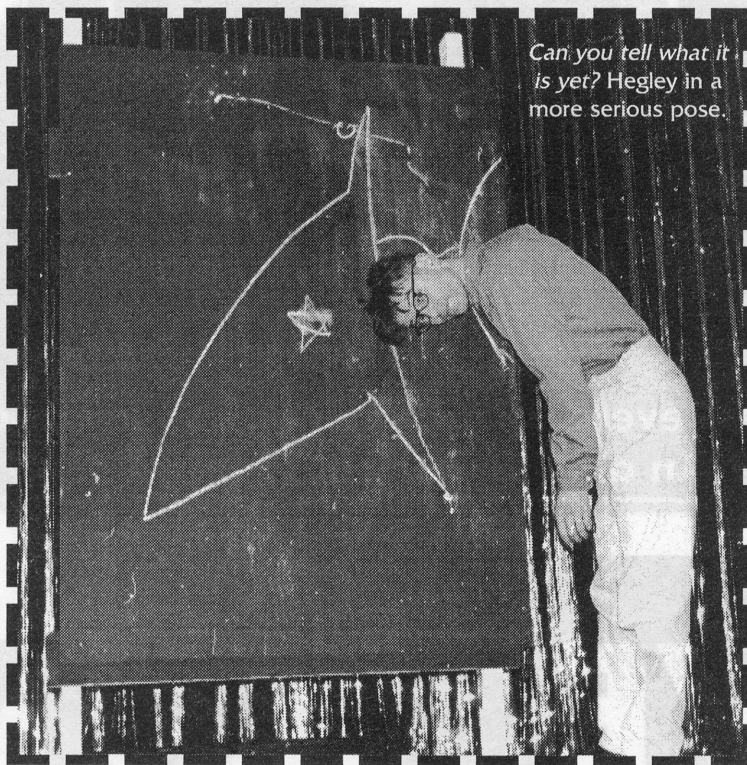
TROUT: You get an extra one if it's decent. Are your poems any good? Do you think so?

HEGLEY: Erm... [laughs] I've got to say, that was a very good opening question... I think that some of them are. Some of them are even poems. Not many.

TROUT: Why do you think people like you so much? Why do you think can you fill a place like this?

HEGLEY: Well, they are accessible, and people generally do like poetry, I think there is poetry in language; there are lots of phrases in language which are poetry; a lick of paint, legs eleven, clickety-click, people like it.

TROUT: When did you realise that you were destined for greatness, who was the first person to say "you're really good, you could do

something with this?"

HEGLEY: John Peel. When we did a Peel Session, '83, I remember that was the turning point, really, when he said he liked one of our songs on the radio.

I had watched his show on the previous Wednesday, in which he had described his life story previous to his brush with fame. I questioned as to whether comic poetry had been a conscious career choice:

"It wasn't really, no, it drifted, 'cos I started out as a singer, and then started doing some of the words without the music, so it sort of drifted towards that."

Mark Radcliffe's evening show on Radio One was instrumental in Hegley's recent resurgence; I told him that in a recent interview [Felix 1093] Radcliffe had pronounced Hegley as one of his three favourite guests, along with film buff Mark Kermode and transatlantic media chick Katie

Puckrick. He was at first shocked, and then genuinely moved.

HEGLEY: I didn't know that...

That's fucking great... oh, that is, I'm so, oh that's really fantastic... Did he really say that? Wow...

[Recovering] Did he mention Nigel at all?

TROUT: No, he didn't mention Nigel [Hegley's silent, miserable sidekick and guitarist], rude man... what do you think that exposure did for you career? Obviously, you'd done that earlier stuff with Peel, but that brought you into the consciousness of a whole new set of people.

HEGLEY: Yeah, it's been very good, actually, in terms of opening it out, bringing in a younger audience, because I was a bit bogged down with The Guardian; I enjoyed working with The Guardian and younger people do read that but it's not hip, not happening, is it, in that way. So it really brought in a younger audi-

ence, which is fantastic.

From this good position, I stupidly asked him how his doggie was...

HEGLEY: Well, he's all right. He's in a plastic bag, a plastic bin liner, with two others.

[There is an embarrassed pause as I take my foot from my mouth] That'll teach you... [laughs]

Gently diverting the subject (did he notice? I don't think so...), I ask who his favourite poet is.

HEGLEY: There are a few good people about, but, what do you mean, across the board? If I had to choose one person's words to take to a desert island, Elvis Costello.

TROUT: Were you influenced at all by Ivor Cutler [Glaswegian surrealist poet/singer/playwright]

HEGLEY: Ivor Costello, Elvis Cutler, erm, [mouthful of Crème Egg] a little I think, yes, not being afraid to be absurd.

Staying on the poetry theme, I asked how he dared rhyme "tob-bogan" with "mahog'un" [see box]. He laughed, then, struggling with his egg, ignored the question. "I'm trying to eat this chocolate egg without getting my thumb on the bit I'm eating... [then, bizarrely] ...I was in such a rush to get out of the house I didn't get to wipe my arse, it's true...". This was surprisingly hysterical, the three of us spontaneously falling about.

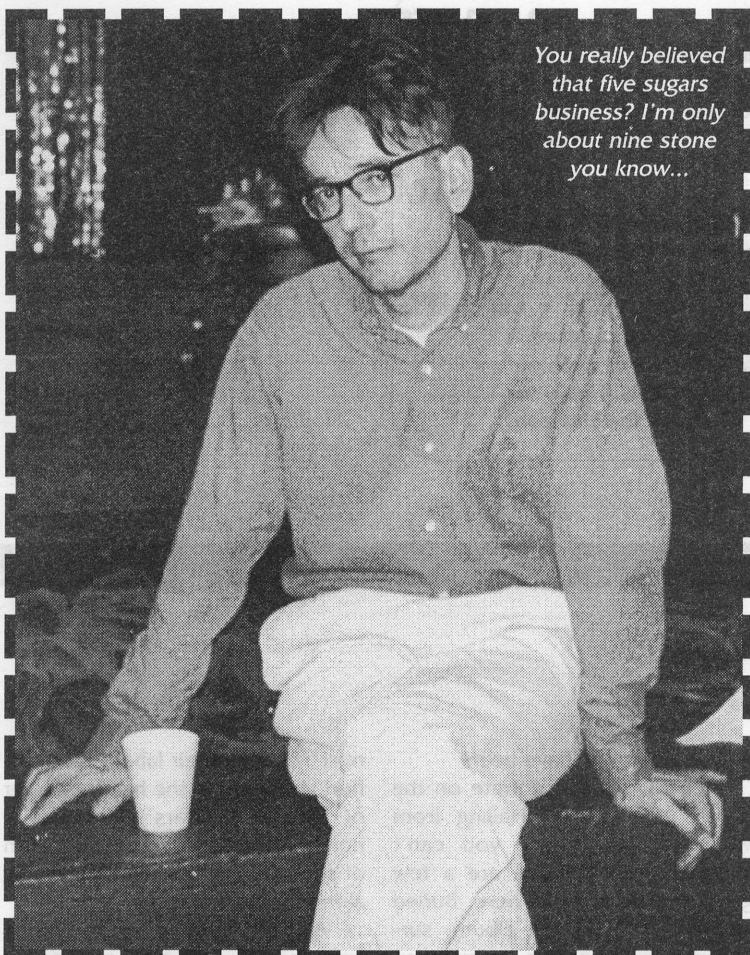
Whether it was the delivery or just the full horror of the statement I know not. After settling down I continue by asking if, as many a spite-filled poem might suggest, he really hates his brother-in-law

HEGLEY: No, not really. But he's not entirely fictional...

TROUT: How much poetry is left in you, do you think?

HEGLEY: Well the nice thing to think is that the vessel refills; at the moment I hope that there is about one hour and forty minutes worth...

TROUT: How has the tour been going?

HEGLEY: Very nice, we had a really, really nice time...

[How many times were you told at school not to use the words very, nice, really, and especially really, really nice? -Ed]

...but thank God it's over.

TROUT: Are you likely to do any more radio work in the future?

HEGLEY: Yes, yes I am, it's likely, if all goes according to plan, I'll do another little series of fifteen minute pieces for radio four, maybe a two hour special for GLR for Easter.

TROUT: Are you going to get a proper job?

HEGLEY: I don't know... I've always liked the thought of having the best of both worlds, and so I quite like the idea of having a proper job as well as this one. One piece of self indulgence; I mentioned a thoroughly odious woman who had been sat beside me at the show. I would have complained at her insistent and flesh-crawling commentary throughout the show, but not having paid for the tickets I thought it a bit rude. John remembered her: "You know I think I heard her when Nigel came on; 'I Love You

Nigel" I think she said... Yeah, Nigel is a nice guy, but do you know what, a couple of people came up to him in the bar after the show and said: "Listen, my friend and I were really worried about you, did something happen to you before the show, you know, are you all right?" and they looked really miserable...

Finally, I asked about his seeming obsession with potatoes, manifest in his poetry, songs, and even a ten-minute slide show of his favourite tuberous vegetables before the interval... He paused for a full ten seconds, motionless, before whispering with an entirely deadpan expression: "They're deep".

As an afterthought, John Hegley turns and runs back after us, telling us he'll do us a quick poem off the top of his head:

The wind howls. An engine groans and gains power. Then a gigantic mechanical machine starts up and pelts straight into a non-stop race to crush everything in its way.

Wow. Great opening track. High hopes all round, then, that the discovery of the year has been made. That Foil are THE band of '98. Maybe Felix will go down in history as 'The Paper that Brought Foil to the World.' Maybe.

On to track 2. Maybe not. For this song, they decided to put vocals over the track giving the voice of a more-than-a-few-years-past-it punker. Someone who thinks he is Scotland's answer to Kurt Cobain. And the music has changed as well. Straight punk meets heavy metal. Still good but just totally different to what it

could, or should, have been.

Foil's lyrics concentrate on the darker side of life. Hailing from West Lothian maybe you can't blame them but there are a few gems tucked away in here. Buried in the middle of the album, surrounded by ferocious assaults on silly things like soup, is a very different song. Slow and calm and reminiscent of Radiohead and Velvet Underground, the track *A Place To Hide* contains a beautiful melody yet still retains the raw naivety of the rest of this album. If only more tracks were like this. In fact, one thing you can say about this album is that it is diverse. It's not all mindless pap. There's fast pap, slow pap, probably-more-distorted-than-it-needs-to-be pap and utterly-original-and-a-breath-of-fresh-air pap. Perhaps slightly

over-rated by their label ('Foil reaffirm your faith in the healing power of electric guitars') they were nonetheless signed on the strength of their demo tape and debut gig alone.

Also welcome is a minor hit from a year or two ago called *Reviver Gene* - you'll remember it when you hear the chorus. All in all, if heavy metal/grunge/West-Coast punk is your thing then give Foil a go. Just bear in mind that they use the same producer as Elastica

There's No Confusing Some People

Oh dear - and it had such potential as well. What with the name Delicatessen being somewhat of a buzz word within the music scene of late, I really was expecting a better effort than this. Intriguing CD cover design and track titles just added to this expectation, increasing the height from which it inevitably fell.

Let's begin with track one, more of an intro than a song really and it truly does set the scene for a poor show. A vocalist cross between Nick Cave and Lurch Addams attempts to paint a dark,

sombre and somewhat surreal tone, what a pity that they seem to have turned to an Estate Agent's imagination to try - and ultimately fail - to achieve this. Through contorted vocals, Geldof skits and produces second rate indie rock. *There's No Confusing Some People* reaches the ludicrous *Various Pets*. If you've ever thought that Phoebe's (from Friends) *Smelly Cats* should make it to release, this one's for you. There's more talent in a dead mouse.

Despite attempts not to be pigeonholed within a specific genre, Delicatessen come across as

There is surprisingly an upside to this album - it's only thirty minutes long, and when you've resigned yourself to wasting an hour of your life with it, this is better than early parole.

There's No Confusing Some People is half an hour of conflicting sounds, dodgy lyrics, and repeated attempts at being something that Delicatessen are not. Their conscious decision not to fall into the same bracket as many a rock band, will surely see them fall into the

ever increasing canyon inhabited by all those who were nothing better, but thought they were. Leave this one well alone, it'll serve better as a shelf insulator at the local HMV.

Bennet - Horse's Mouth

They're the young indie band that's hard to pigeon-hole. Just when you think they're Suede, they become Lightning Seeds. Then they're Bis

Howlite - Halo

DJ Rectangle is from Los Angeles and is little-known over here I should imagine, as I only heard of the man a few weeks back myself. And I'm glad I did. What is surprising is that he has the most amazing CV, and is about to take the UK by storm.

Some of the highlights in his career are winning Box National DJ search '94, world Finalist in DMC DJ Championship '93, winning West Coast DMC DJ Championship '93, and winning

the American DMC DJ championship in '93.

DJ Rectangle has also made numerous appearances on too many radio shows world wide to mention, including Sony's world-wide service and BBC Radio One. He is probable best known as the DJ for Warren G, and for a recent UK visit as the DJ for the Alkoholics at the Subterranea club.

Now for his latest mix tape. He is described as a Battle DJ - a producer & performer and this is the perfect description. I was looking forward to hearing this as it's been a while since I've heard a proper hip-hop style scratch mix, and I wasn't disappointed.

The total control this man has over a set of decks is truly mind blowing, he does things that you simply shouldn't be able to do. For example,

scratching the record that's playing with out it skipping a beat, avoiding any talking over talking, but still rolling long mixes together. Rinsing phat beats on-top of phat beats and did I mention the scratching that's just to rough?

He also manages to cover all areas 'n' styles of Rap / Hip-Hop. A few of the top class line up of tracks used are: Busta Rhymes - *Dangerous*, Sean "Puffy" Combs - *Big Old Butt*, Sugar Free - *While U Bullshit*, Puff Daddy - *Senorita*, Rakim - *It's Ben Along Time*, Mac 10 - *Only In California*, The Luniz - *Freestyle* and Ice Cube - *Greed*.

The track listing on this mix tape would make for a most impressive compilation on it's own but when combined with the masterful mixing, cutting 'n' scratching of the Rectangle, your taken to another level. The

tracks are used in the environment they were made to be played in.

This is a must for all bad boys & girls out there, anyone who appreciates mixing, Hip-Hop, Rap and anyone wanting to hear how a DJ should be work it. A true performance.

Look out (in Clubscene & Club Listings) for when & where you can catch the man live 'n' direct, as a European tour kicks off in the next few weeks and look out for full interview in the coming weeks.

I haven't seen these tapes in the shops, but you can order tapes & CDs direct from Sound Chamber Recordings on 0171 823 4973, as well as a host over other top notch hip-hop tapes and CDs. **MC**

DRUM 'N' BASS

Seba. Connected.**(LookingGood Rec.) 9th Feb.**

If, it's on LookingGood Rec. You know your in for a musical treat, and this latest offering is no disappointment. Connected is a deep jazz roller, even beautiful, the way your carried away on the strong atmospherics, rolling bass-line & tight percussion. Anyone how thinks D&B isn't real music just samples strung together, should check this, a master piece of beat technology. Keeping LG one step ahead of the rest.

DJ Ron. Quintessence.**(Some' ting Rec.) Out Now.**

This a triple vinyl pack for only £10, a true bargain. Six tracks in all, featuring DJ Ron's *Space Jazz*, and DJ Krust full length rinse out mix of it.

21st Century, un-surprisingly starts off with 21st century fox title music, with sounds so bad that I can not understand what possessed Ron to do it, but he more than make up for it with the rest of the track, were thankfully it doesn't feature again. *Zulu March* uses awesome chopped up beats and deep b-lines, a nice dark stepper. With *Raid* a menacing dark roller, to mention a few of the tracks.

HOUSE 'N' GARAGE

Prezioso. Raise The Power (Truelove) 9th Feb.

4 mixes to choose from, all hard. Original mix start off with just a banging b-line (a great way to start) hard 'n' fast beats, great acid beep & bleeps. I could not decide which mix I liked best out of these, as they are all so good. Knuckle Headz mix has definite old skool feel to it, another banging 12" from the Truelove stable.

Solar Stone. The Impressions EP (Hooj) 9th Feb.

You get three mixes of *Day By Day*, original is a trancy builder, that drops into a deep pleasant breakdown. 2nd is a more housey number, bouncy b-line, driven beats, deep 'n' dreamy. 3rd mix is a more chilled version, stronger atmospherics & softer beats, one for Sunday afternoon.

Dick Dastardly & Peter Perfect. Rydim's At Ya EP. (Confetti Rec.) 9th Feb.

Starts out with a looped, stretched & warped female vocal, beats quickly build up over this, with jiggery keyboard stabs working in and out with a array of bleep 'n' beats. Groaning bass-line soon comes into play, with the clever arrangements and an up-beat feel sure to go down well in the clubs.

Sneaker Pimps. Spin Spin Sugar. Remixes (Clean Up.) 2nd Feb.

After it's phenomenal club success, it's back with even more re-workings, and sounding as fresh as the day it was made. A classic set of re-workings, using the Sneaker Pimps lyrics to full effect, these remixes just work so well. Sure to get any crowd away from the bar and on the floor.

Ten Years of the Roxy V/A (Kubin)

Dutch ep to celebrate ten years of the famous Roxy club in Amsterdam. Three great tracks here, but I head straight for Laidback Luke's Sub-Conscious every time. This is infectious, uplifting, extremely funky and oh soooo groovy; all at once!

Solyent Green Solyent Green 2 (Playhouse)

Playhouse is one of a small number of labels that is making house minimal and, dare I say intelligent. Three unnamed tracks create a sound that is fiendish and daring. Not quite Basic Channel, not quite Robert Hood. Sharp, precisely placed bursts of sound make for a tense, stretched ambience. Playhouse has had the guts to carve its own niche and that deserves my respect.

DOWNBEAT

Skylab. The ? EP. (Eye Q) 16th Feb.

A-side, is slow down beat number, haunting strings, slow drum pattern, sad even depressing lyrics. A dark trippy track, that breaks down to reversed lyrics and eerie live bass taking you even deeper in.

B-side, is less depressing, still deep 'n' dreamy, beautiful female vocalist is used again, this one more minimal, no drums at all, simply clever use of electric guitar, piano & strings.

Courtney Pine.**Trying Times Remixes (Talkin' Loud) Out Now.**

You get three mixes of *Trying Times* to choose from & one remix of *Sense song* by Raw Deal.

Two mixes by Headstrong, one vocal, one dub. This down beat, jazz fusion works quite well. Attic Blues mix is more beaty, same strong emotions and feeling. A eclectic assortment of beats that's great to just chill to.

Reactivate soared in popularity. Each Reactivate release gave the label more converts to the church of techno and a bigger influence in the underground dance scene. This week sees the release of Reactivate Classics, the compilation of all the previous compilations, and an excellent opportunity to either re-live or discover some pivotal moments of history in electronic music. What's more, the CD has been mixed by Daz Saund and Trevor Rockliffe, two pioneering DJs during the days of the rave who have continued to exert a strong presence in the techno scene to this day. The freestylers are a name that my not be familiar at the moment, but all that is about to change with their new single *B-Boy Stance* storming into the national charts last week at number 23. A killer track that has been caned in the right clubs for a while now, and played extensively on Radio and Kiss FM.

The freestylers are a full on group; eight people combine to create their fresh sound, not to mention their break-dancers (yes people still break dance and few better than the thirty strong Freska Break-dance crew).

Now back to the group. Aston Harvey (ex-Blapps Posse) and Matt Cantor (major London break DJ) oversee things with their knowledge and production skills. The other members of the group are J-Rock (Scratch DJ champion) cutting things up, Jo on bass guitar, Chris on lead guitar and the hard beats of drummer Clive. With vocals by the one 'n' only Tenor Fly (Major UK reggae artist) and MC Navigator (a top drum & bass MC, Radio 1, one in the jungle MC) this is quite an impressive line up.

Aston Plays Freestyle

The freestylers have been making a name for themselves on the fast emerging Big-Beat scene (break beat with big bass-lines), which London once again seems to be leading the way in. I have been listening to their previous works over the last few weeks and believe me these are no one-hit wonders and look likely to blow up in '98.

Aston kindly took time out from recording their follow up single to have a chat with me about past, present & the future of himself and the freestylers. He describes their music as an amalgamation of Hip-Hop, Electro & the whole Break-Beat culture. Old Skool flavour with a new identity via a use of different production techniques.

He started out DJing at the age of 16, and around this time was friends with rappers Brotherhood. They had wanted to make a track together for a while, so they got there ideas together and headed to the studio to put their ideas down.

He admits that his early attempts were nothing special but says that, with time, as he learned how to use the equipment and the ideas came in thick and fast, the quality of the music he made improved. He said that he still learns new tricks and ways of doing things all the time so it's a continuous process.

Aston's tip for wana-be producers is to get all your ideas together well before you get anywhere near the studio. For example, drum rolls, break-downs, bass-lines,

melodies should all be worked out beforehand. If possible take someone who knows how to use a studio with you to show you how to work the equipment yourself.

Around '91 Aston formed part of The Blapps Posse, making similar music as Shut 'n' Dance but they didn't get hyped as much. Later on, in a solo project he created one of the biggest tunes, a true classic of those large scale rave days of 91-93, *Don't Hold Back*. That could be heading for a re-release and I'm sure it'll be a big hit again. He has also worked with the first lady of jungle, DJ Rap, before meeting up with Matt to form The Freestylers. So they have plenty of experience to call on.

When asked why they seem to be have such wide spread success with the Freestylers, he said that there is a concept behind the group, a direction and identity to the music. Well there's definitely something.

Matt and Aston, also play-out, DJing regularly in such places as

Miami, Italy & Munich as well as regular UK dates. Some of the forthcoming dates are: Saturday 7 Feb. Project B, Milton Keynes, Friday 13 Feb. Middlesborough Arena, and finally making a London appearance at The Clinic, on Saturday 28 Feb. Before they shoot off to Miami.

Then back to London for 13 March at Club Innocence, London Bridge and Fri 20 March at Hanover Grand. Finally returning to London to rip up the Jazz Café, London on 26 April. Check club listings for info nearer the dates. Also mixing the Essential Mix on Radio One, Sunday 8 Feb. One not to be missed.

There are plans for a European tour over the summer to coincide with the album release, which should be around 8 May. And plenty of festival appearances lined up including Phoenix, Glastonbury and Tribal Gathering.

COLDCUT & HEX

TIMBER. ★★★★★^{1/2}

This latest release from Coldcut and Hex is out on the 9th Feb and has arisen from their interest in live audio-visual mixing, where all the images are directly linked to every single beat which makes for a most impressive live show.

This comes as a CD-Rom (characters shown feature in the visual experience) with visuals that are one with the music and clearly display the message that is being put across if you've got a computer that can run it. If not, the music itself can stand alone. This is not a mere backing track to the visual display but cutting edge beats, breaks & samples.

This also music with a serious message, as you may be able to guess from the title, that message to "highlight the abuse of the worlds biosphere and indigenous tribes". Timber is an attempt by Coldcut & Hex to do something about it.

Track 1 starts out with a wicked mix of samples and beats that builds up nicely with a tribal chant type vocal over samples of what sounds like engines or machinery breaking it up. I think this could be part of the message, which is clear when seen with the CD-ROM.

Track 2 has a strong electro beat thing going on that works particular well. Track 3 picks up the pace, a full on break beat number that is almost D&B, again carry-

ing the same tribal vocal as the first track. Excellent mish-mash of beats. Various remixes feature hear but they are used in a more chilled environment and works just as well. The pace is raised again with a crazy fast tempo break beat track with a sax thrown in for good measure. Track 7 once again

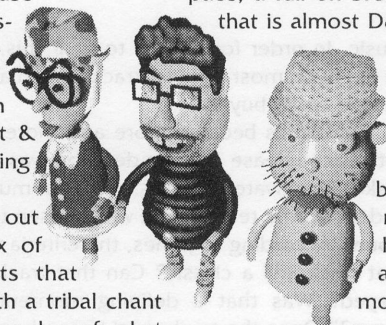
shows the ability of these two producers to make the most amazing assortment of beats 'n' breaks fit together perfectly. They have cut 'n' spliced together beat upon beat. The way the remixes change pace and style, but seem to keep the same direction, is impressive. Almost every track has it's own individual style, but at the same time is part of the whole.

So all in all a most impressive collection of sounds that works very well on it's own, and I can't wait to see the live show, which is sure to blow you away.

One day all music will be produced this way. One Step Ahead.

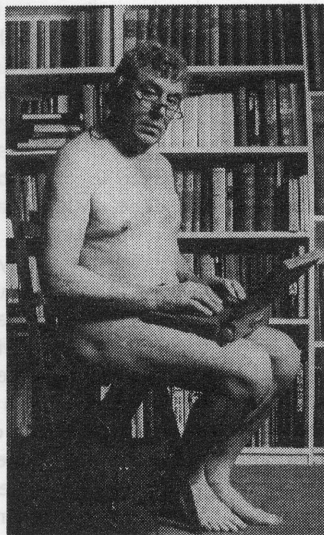

DOUGLAS ADAMS' STARSHIP TITANIC

Terry Jones



Remind you of the naked organist?

Stemming from a digression in *The Hitch-Hiker's Guide*, *Starship Titanic* is a novel by Terry Jones. Douglas Adams was unable to write the book himself as he was working on a CD-ROM version of it; his publishers insisted that the novel would have to come out at the same time as the game to enable them to sell it. This struck Adams as odd since "... they had managed previously to sell books of mine without any attendant CD-ROM game." Whatever, it came to pass that Adams asked his old friend, Terry Jones, to write it for him. The ex-Python agreed with only one proviso; he could write it naked.

Surreal situations, silly names, screwball antics and screwing as well, all fuse together in the literary pot to produce a deliciously enjoyable read. Written in the style of *The Hitch-Hiker's Guide*, Jones

equals Adams' quirkiness and if not, he enhances it with the naughtiness that only a naked man could conjure. Shoddy workmanship by the Amalgamated Unmarried Teenage Mother's Construction Unit leads to what appears to be Spontaneous Massive Existence Failure on the dawn of the Titanic's unveiling to the universe. This is where the real story begins.

The Titanic lands on Earth and takes aboard Dan, Lucy and Nettie. They link up with The Journalist from the planet Blerontin who was hidden aboard the ship with the intention of gaining information for a scoop about the Titanic's many flaws. Our characters' objective is to regain control of the ship. Along the way they have to contend with insolent Doorbots, pretentious Deskbots, operatic Gondolabots that sing when they don't have any passengers, a talking bomb that

frequently loses count, the peaceful Yassacans with their Simulated Destruction weapons and shoot-to-miss policy, galactic bureaucracy and, last but not least, a parrot!

Devilishly immature, *Starship Titanic* is going to be a love-it-or-hate-it book. One side will put forward the fact that it is just stupid while the other will say... Well, they'll say that it's stupid too! If you're looking for some satire, go read a Ben Elton novel. However, if you want a short read that is essentially just stupid fun, *Starship Titanic* has got its tadger out and is wriggling past the rest of the pack to take the chequered flag of bonkers comedy.

THE UNDERGROUND MAN

Mick Jackson

The *Underground Man* is the first novel from Mick Jackson and was shortlisted for the Booker Prize last year. As you would then expect, it is an extremely well written book. Surprisingly, perhaps, it is also very readable with a strong central character and a coherent and quickly moving plot. The story is set in the Victorian era and is about the fifth Duke of Portland ('the Underground Man') one of the wealthiest landowners in the country. Through his journal, interleaved with short reports from local residents, the story of a shy, eccentric old man develops. The title refers to the Duke's creation of a system of tunnels underneath his estates with great expense, where he spends more and more time. Because of this and his social difficulties and idiosyncrasies the local community believe him to be deformed or insane in some way. "His left eye was a good two inches higher than the right one and he dribble from the corner of his mouth the whole time," was what the locals believed the Duke (who was completely normal) looked like. The Duke, meanwhile, suffers from an absence that he does not

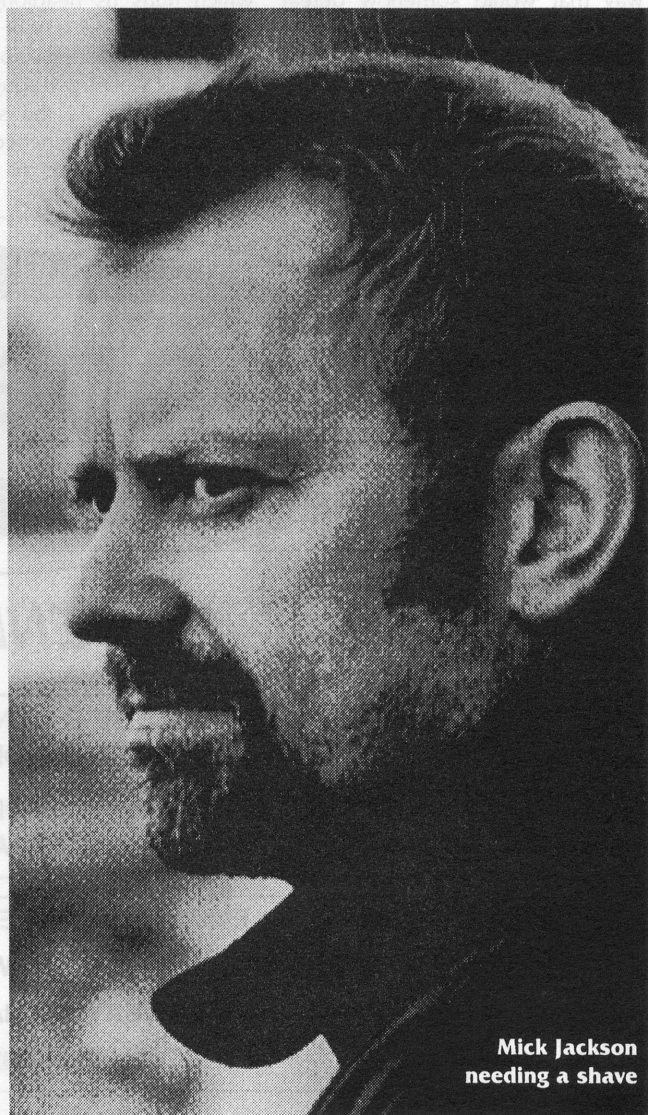
understand and can only slowly understand.

This is a superb book which I would recommend to anyone. The Duke is a sympathetic 'hero', and his story is a fascinating one. As we see the story almost entirely through his journal we get a personal view and can relate to the Duke a great deal. The story is loosely based on the actual Duke (William John Cavendish-Bentinck-Scott) who did build such a network of tunnels, but the book is definitely fictitious. The secondary characters, mainly the locals and the Duke's staff are all well developed and entertaining. The short reports between chapters from such people give a more rounded story, but, because of their prejudices these make us identify with the Duke even more.

The story is above all a powerful, yet witty, story which grabs the reader almost immediately. The ending is an appropriate, but shocking conclusion.

SHOPPING AND FUCKING

Mark Ravenhill

The scene: a room filled with people newly in from the cold, adjusting their dress, chattering, turning to neighbours, all nicely relaxed, until – BANG! We are hit by a thunderbolt of sound, a disjointed, harsh-voiced rant against life in general, ripping through the now total blackness over a thudding beat. Winded so to speak by the onslaught, we turn to the stage, unusually sparsely furnished, and dominated by a large screen to the rear, on which lighted lettering forms the title of the play. We see a scene in the home of our main characters. These three are occupied in picking at the microwave meals which appear throughout the play, but which Mark refuses to touch so that his companions attempt to feed him from their own plates, thus creating an odd parent-child tableau.

The plot of this play is far too involved and bewildering to attempt to even summarise here, and anyway that would somehow defeat the object of my trying to persuade you to see it, (which, incidentally, you definitely should.) At Lulu's and Robbie's request, Mark relates the apparently beloved tale of his first meeting with them. A stranger

had pointed to a nearby couple and told Mark that he owned them, but that they were trash and he didn't want them, even hated them, and he'd offered them to Mark for £20. They'd "done a deal," and Mark had taken Robbie and Lulu home to be his "slaves." This is where the "shopping" of the title comes in, and the idea recurs throughout the play in various forms, adding a really surreal (and not a little confusing,) element to the entire thing.

As the play progresses, with scene changes indicated very effectively by the lighted lettering behind. Up to this point, the acting had been a little slow and stilted, and I've had the distinct feeling that the cast are having difficulty in filling the enormous, bare stage, but the performances are beginning to strengthen, along with the cohesion of the group. The first act ends on a note of suspense, but that's as much as I can give away.....

The salvo of rapid-fire sound which hurls us headlong into the second act is no less of a jolt than that at the beginning – absolutely no danger of sleeping through the first five minutes. As the second act begins we are launched into the extraordinary scene of Robbie's

and Lulu's home with each engaged in a telephone conversation, which, it soon becomes apparent, is phone sex; they are making a last ditch attempt to raise the £3000 which they by now owe to Brian. During the course of this, other telephones ring, so that both Lulu and Robbie are holding two simultaneous conversations, juggling subject matter and even voices.

Throughout the play, Gary has been mentioning a wealthy man who is "out there" and who will take him back to his luxurious home for good. He goes into greater and greater detail, until he is describing a vision of being a possession, controlled completely, and he begins to see Mark as the one who will become his master. Gary then encounters Robbie and Lulu for the first time, and they agree to "help" him, by recreating his vision. They manipulate his words so that his vision becomes exactly the "trans-action" of Mark's story, and is played out in gruesome and menacing detail. This is where the "fucking" part comes in; this is the one thing on which the shock value of the play is said to depend, but to me it is shocking more for its apparent coldness, and for Gary's sub-

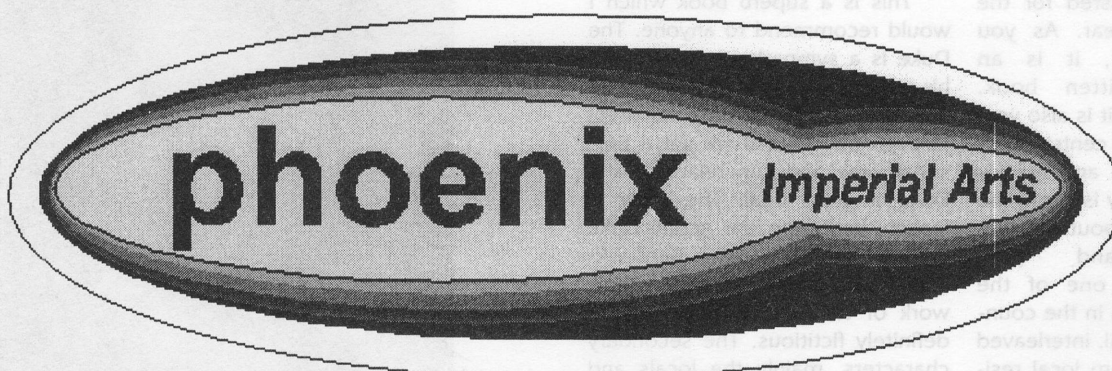
mission to what he believes to be necessary for the enactment of his vision, than for the act itself. I find the mind-games and manipulation surrounding it, and the fact that Robbie is in fact giving Gary precisely what he has asked for, far more horrifying. This scene, with its stark writing and powerful acting, is to me the most effective of the play.

It is very difficult to come to any definite conclusion as to what Mark Ravenhill is trying to achieve with this play. At this point in time I would say that it is an exploration of ideas on dependence, both on other human beings and on money, and the ways in which the dependence on one another of the members of a group affects all their lives. The whole thing is certainly extremely thought provoking, and succeeded in captivating me from beginning to end.

It's a hard life being a billionaire. You are never sure if your supermodel wife is only with you for your money, or if supposed friends socialise with you purely because they want something. This is Anthony Hopkins' situation in *The Edge*, a superior outdoor adventure film in the mould of *Deadly Pursuits* and *The River Wild*.

Hopkins once again plays a reserved aging Englishman, albeit with a stunning wife in the form of Elle MacPherson. The two take a holiday in the beautiful remote Alaskan wilderness. Accompanying them is a group of photographers including Alec Baldwin, who may or

may not be having an affair with the wealthy man's wife. There is a clear tension between the two men, and this comes to a peak when events conspire to place them miles from civilization, relying on one another to stay alive.

The plot may sound as corny as the usual Hollywood thriller but this film manages to retain suspense throughout. This is partly due to the qualities of Hopkins, whose character strives to help Baldwin at every turn despite suspecting that the younger man wants to kill him and obtain his inheritance through his wife. It is a treat to see this distinguished actor pitting his wits against the dangers of the great outdoors, which include a particularly ferocious man-hunting bear.

If you have already seen that film then you could do far worse than try *The Edge*. It doesn't take itself too seriously and, best of all, there is not a sinking boat in sight.

CLUBBED TO DEATH

This is a French arty film, which mostly meets your expectations. *Clubbed to Death* is a love story set in the slightly unusual surroundings of a nightclub, where a girl accidentally meets a bloke and becomes his girlfriend. In addition to the standard romantic script are the modern elements. The leading male is forced into bashing his own brother in an illegal fight, gives up crack and dumps his current girlfriend. The club that the film centres around is a converted church at the end of bus line and this combines with a barren, broken landscape to create a sombre and distracted atmosphere.

Unfortunately I found that I really didn't care what happened to the characters. I couldn't empathise with them even though they are supposedly part of a similar youth culture to mine. A distraction, possibly due to the

translation from French, is that there are points in the film when the conversations make no sense whatsoever. This, of course, may be part of the French mystical atmosphere.

One of the better aspects of the film was the soundtrack. A thumping selection of tunes, including Chemical Brothers and Massive Attack, help to give the film a unique atmosphere. Even Eric Clapton shows his musical talents in one of the most evocative scenes in the film. If you do see this at the cinema then a good quality sound system is a must.

For me it turned out to be a dreary non-eventful incomprehensible waste of film. It may be worth watching only when it comes on Channel Four or BBC2 late at night. If you do, look out for that classic pulling technique, wearing a creaking leather jacket and flip-flops. **F** LFB

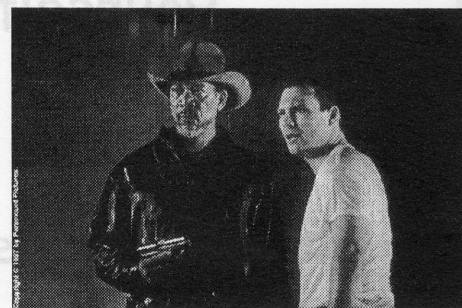
The next big film to open in Britain is *Hard Rain*, an action thriller starring Morgan Freeman, Christian Slater and Randy Quaid.

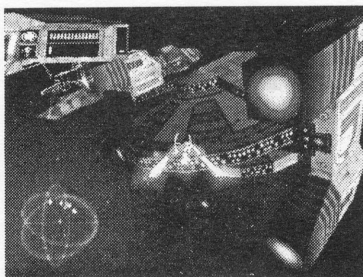

COLONY WARS

Pysgnosis ★★★★★

'Fight for a cause, fight for what you believe in but don't forget the consequences of war', this would sum up the feeling of Colony Wars and the atmosphere it creates. You are a pilot on the side of the League of Free Worlds waging a guerrilla war against the Imperialist Navy. At your disposal are various different types of fighter craft for a multitude of different missions. There are

several different endings to Colony Wars, several different ways of ending the tyranny of the Czar and his Imperialist Navy. Each ending depends on the outcome of each of your missions, fail all your missions and the League is doomed, but in each case the story will always have a beginning and an end.

After a couple of missions the game cuts away to the all-too-familiar computer generated movie, which has the feel of Babylon 5 and Star Wars (James Earl Jones does his usual evangelistic bellowing for the narration in each cut-scene).

The gameplay is exhilarating, those of you who have played X-wing or Tie Fighter will enjoy the dog-fights and will be relieved that there aren't 101 different controls to fly your fighter craft. Colony Wars has moved away from those usual games set in space where the black background colour usually dominates. Here huge frigates and other space war horses often fill

the screen, while the odd asteroid flies by - space is not a black void in this game. There are several different types of craft with different abilities and weaponry, disabling a craft with an EMP weapon will make it a sitting duck and easier to shoot down while anti-shield weapons can wear down your enemies' defenses faster than your normal lasers.

However the lasting appeal of Colony Wars is limited, as it is possible to reach one ending within a single sitting, while repeated playing is only required to discover the different endings to the saga. This is a well polished game with all the trimmings, animated sequences narrated by Darth Vader himself, analogue joystick compatibility and excellent head-to-head dog fights. Another game to get your arthritic fingers on.

OVERBOARD!

Psygnosis ★★★★★½

Avast there me harties! Shiver me timbers, keel haul the mainsail! Erm... no, I've run out of Pirate sayings. Anyway, I haven't gone mad - I've been playing Overboard, a highly enjoyable and silly adventure into the realm of arcade piracy.

The player controls a dinky little

pirate ship, complete with cannons and sails, and must attempt to traverse the sixteen levels of choppy seas.

Each level is enormous, and can easily take half an hour to complete. The basic idea is to collect all of the parts of the map of level, found in green floating bottles. Along the way are treasure chests and weapons to be gained. Some of the additional weapons are distinctly un-piratey, especially the flamethrower and ground-to-air missiles.

Standing in the budding pirates' way are rival ships, sea monsters, gun emplacement, flame-throwing towers and even massive spinning sawblades (somewhat reminiscent of Mario or Sonic). However, the player rarely feels totally lost or hard done by, and the game certainly kept me coming back for

more.

The whole game has a wonderfully engaging atmosphere, from the animation of the boats and sea creatures to the jaunty nautical theme tune that you'll be humming for days afterwards.

The game is eventually let down by its lack of variety in level design, and the difficulty in defeating some of the end-of-level bosses. A battle mode is included, which allows up to five captains to compete, but this requires a very large TV (or keen eyesight) as each ship is very small.

Overboard! is certainly a welcome addition to any puzzle-loving gamer's collection, but those requiring more a more cerebral challenge should give it a wide berth (groan).

In a promising twist, Katana may support the Direct3D API for easy co-development with PC games.

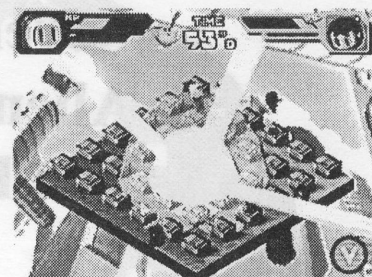

This little beauty comes with its own processor and motors to provide 'force feedback'. If you've ever played Sega Rally in the arcade, you will be used to

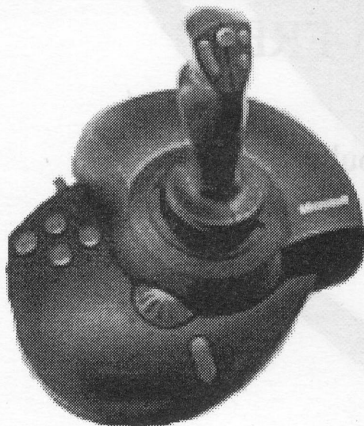
the feeling of the wheel fighting you on corners. This is the feeling that MS want to bring to home PC owners.

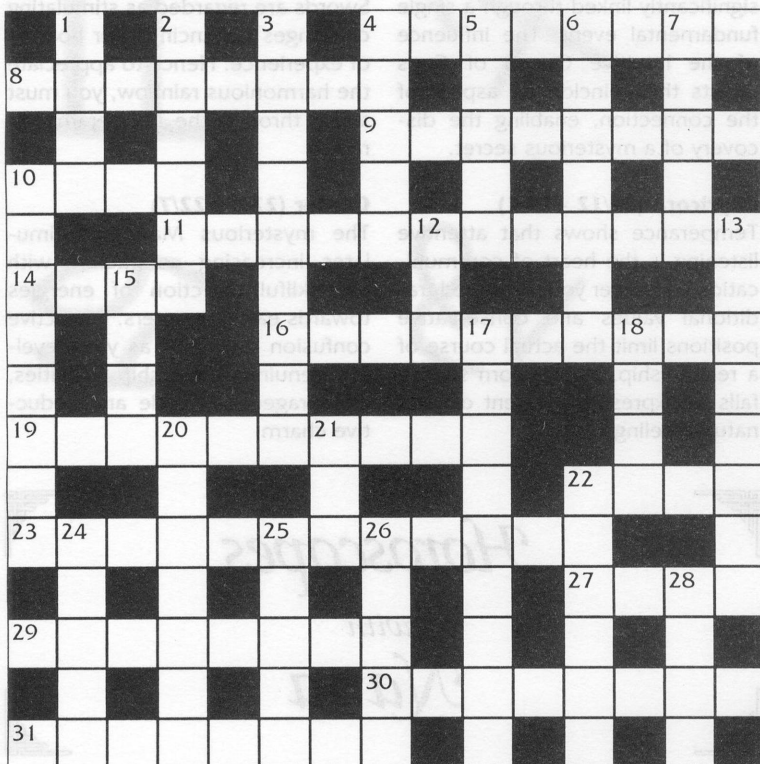
