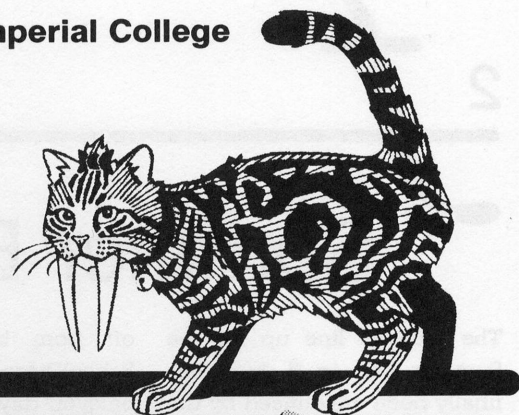

'Airport Lounge' Takes Off

The new bar on the Charing Cross Hospital campus was officially opened last Tuesday, a week after it had come into active operation.

Situated in the Reynolds Building on St. Dunstons Street, this new bar is the result of the refurbishment of what was (somewhat) affectionately known to older students as the 'Airport Lounge'. The total cost of the project was around 1.5 million pounds, and on entering the bar it is easy to see where this money has gone.

In addition to the fully licensed bar, there is a 'snack' shop with fixed seating area, and a dance area which contains sofas and chairs by day, which are cleared away to form a dance floor by night. Needless to say there is a huge sound system and a video projection screen to accommodate the entertainment of a standard night out.

The project was initially started by Lorne McEwan, President of the Medics' Student Union last year, his original intention being to refurbish St. Mary's

Bar in Paddington. However, when it became clear that this was not going to be possible for space reasons, he turned his attention to other campi, with this final result.

Despite original problems getting funding from the Union, Mr. McEwan eventu-

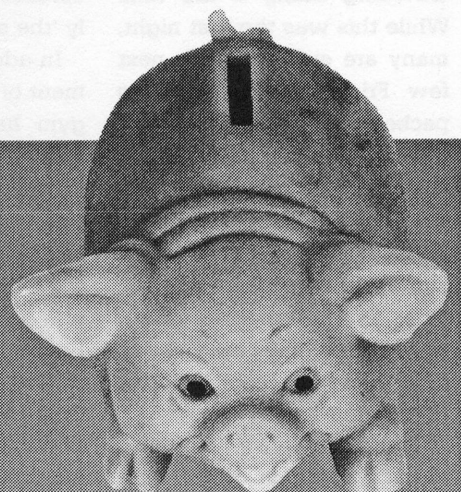
ally managed to find independent funding from three sources: the Faculty of Medicine itself, Hammersmith Special Trustees, and College itself. He also has the fortune to be one of the few students who has ever seen a project completed during their time here, with the total undertaking completed in less than two years.

Another unusual aspect of the bar is the license, the hours of which have been extended by special permission after a deal was struck with the West London Magistrates Court. Having heard that medic students work very antisocial hours, the magistrates agreed that the Students' Union would not have to apply for late licenses on Wednesday and Friday nights, but that they should be granted to the Charing Cross Bar as a matter of course.

Summer Ball Line Up

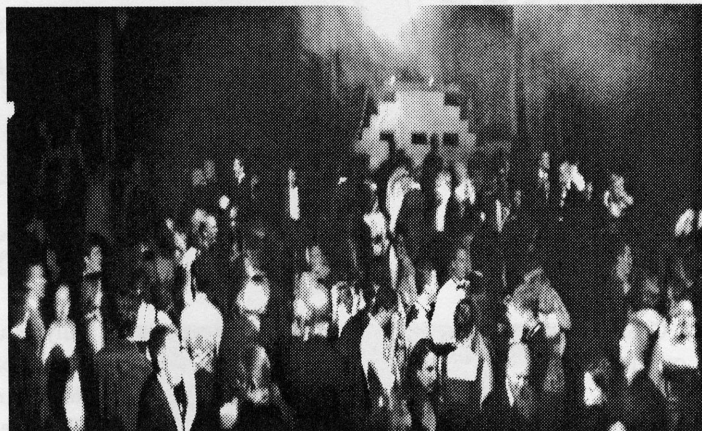
The musical line up for the Summer Ball on 8 June has finally been announced by the Summer Ball Committee.

Better than the hype, however, is the reaction that the bar has already received in the first few days of being opened. Last Friday saw the first bop, and there are many reports of students arriving at 9:30 in the evening to be turned away due to overcrowding being a fire risk. While this was the first night, many are expecting the next few Fridays to be just as packed, as more students turn up to see whether the new bar is as good as they have been told. There have even been fears that this may lead to less money being taken in the older South Kensington Bars, as students from that campus investigate the new facilities that are now available.

Of the students who attended last week, an overwhelming majority were very positive about the bar, with most

citing the large amount of space and central bar as their reasons. Only a few have been negative, the most common concern being the proximity of a hospital to a bunch of loud and drunk students. Despite this, those who attended claimed that it was generally quiet as students left the establishment, and apparently 'the sound doesn't travel'.

In addition to the refurbishment of the bar, the basement gym has also been re-done and is now a fully functional cardio-vascular gym with all the standard equipment. It was opened by former zoology student Simon Dennis, who was a gold medallist in the British Men's Rowing Eight, during the 2000 Sydney Olympics. Due to a lack of any ribbon to cut, however, he pronounced the gym open by opening the door.

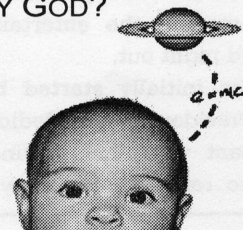

Chaplaincy: Stress is...

Stress is the 'wear and tear' our bodies experience as we adjust to our continually changing environment; it has physical and emotional effects on us and can create positive or negative feelings. As a positive influence, stress can help compel us to action; it can result in a new awareness and an exciting new perspective. As a negative influence, it can result in feelings of distrust, rejection, anger, and depression, which in turn can lead to health problems such as headaches, upset stomach, rashes, insomnia, ulcers, high blood pressure, heart disease, and stroke. Stress will help or hinder us depending on how we react to it.

75% of the general population experiences at least 'some stress' every two weeks (National Health Interview Survey).

Positive stress adds anticipation and excitement to life, and we all thrive under a certain amount of stress. Deadlines, competitions, confrontations, and even our frustra-

tions and sorrows add depth and enrichment to our lives. We need to learn how to manage stress rather than eliminate it. Insufficient stress acts as a depressant and may leave us feeling bored or dejected; on the other hand, excessive stress may leave us feeling tied up in knots. Identifying unrelieved stress and being aware of its effect on our lives is not sufficient for reducing its harmful effects. Just as there are many sources of stress, there are many possibilities for its management.

Become aware of stress and emotional and physical reactions. Don't ignore it or gloss over your problems.

Recognise what you can change. Can you change your stressors, if they're not exams, by avoiding or eliminating them? Can you shorten your exposure to stress?

Reduce the intensity of your emotional reactions to stress. Are you viewing your stressors in exaggerated terms and/or tak-

ing a difficult situation and making it a disaster? Are you expecting to please everyone? Are you overreacting? Put the situation in perspective. Do not labour on the negative aspects and the 'what if's.

Learn to moderate your physical reactions to stress. Slow, deep breathing and relaxation can help in reducing stress, as can taking exercise and a healthy diet.

Maintain your emotional reserves. Develop some mutually supportive friendships. Pursue realistic goals, which are meaningful to you, rather than goals others have for you that you do not share.

Expect some frustrations, failures, and sorrows. Always be kind and gentle with yourself.

If you are experiencing stress you are not alone. There are people at Imperial who can help. The Health Centre (49375/6), Student Counsellors (49430), The Chaplaincy (49600) or your Tutor.

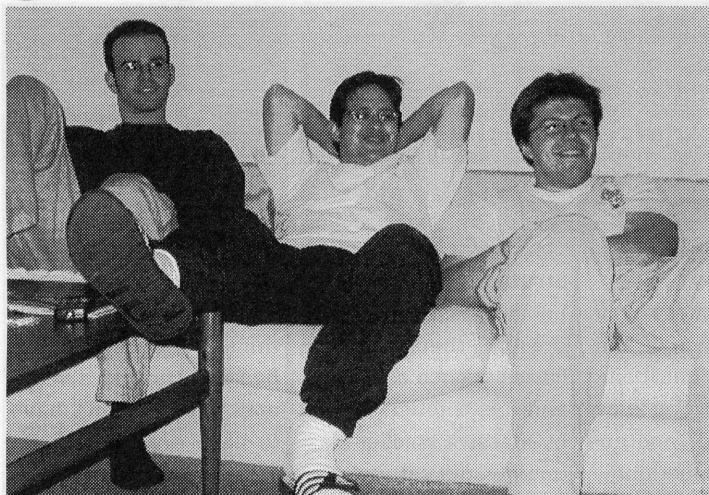
And this is only day two, of seven. Erk.

you won't find any here, ahem

Slackers is yet another addition to the already swollen ranks of the teen comedy genre. Despite my initial reservations about the film, I was cheered by the presence of Jason Schwartzman in the cast list. His performance as Max Fischer in the indie hit *Rushmore* (1998) was fantastic, so I was eager to see what he had followed it up with. As it turns out, I would have been better off watching *Rushmore* again.

Slackers finds Schwartzman playing "Cool" Ethan, the socially inept nerd who is in the process of stalking the angelic Angela (James King). His creepy task is eased upon discovering the cheating antics of our three eponymous slackers. He proceeds to blackmail Dave (Devon Sawa) and his stooges, demanding to be fixed up with Angela, or else he will have them expelled. But as is always the way in these things, the charming Dave himself ends up the object of Angela's affections. And so it goes on.

The opening scene of the film, where we are inducted into scamming world of the boys, is a well-handled juggling act, but after that it falters. There are straight-to-camera monologues, bizarre dream sequences and all manner of visual tricks, but none of these distract from the essentially lazy, teen-comedy-by-numbers on show here.

As for gross-out, *American Pie* had its warm apple pie scene, *Road Trip* its Jack Sprat sex scene, so *Slackers* has to have its hook too. We are actually treated to two, first a karaoke penis sock-puppet scene, and then an old woman hooker sponge-bath scene. But two sick wrongs don't make a funny right. That is not to say I didn't laugh at all. I did. But the good gags are hidden away amongst a lengthy array of tiresome fart, dick and jerk-off jokes. Even *Road Trip* seems reserved compared to most of this.

Schwartzman's efforts are hardly subtle, and despite having been given the majority of the funny material, he never makes Ethan into anything more than a 2-d caricature. It would have been nice to see the makers have the courage to produce something slightly blacker and more original about the obsessive stalking thread involving Ethan, but they ultimately shy away into more familiar teen rom-com territory.

Jason Schwartzman interview with a Slacker

How was the experience of shaving a large A in your chest hair?

INTERVIEW with Rod Jones from Idlewild

Idlewild's new single *You Held The World In Your Arms* is out now, and the album *The Remote Part* is due for release in July. Felix spoke to guitarist Rod Jones over the telephone.

FELIX: XFM's DJ Natasha was so enamoured with your last single *Roseability* that she started to compare all other songs to it and give them a "Roseability rating". Had you heard about this, and how would you rate your new single?

ROD: No, I hadn't heard about that. It would be difficult to try and rate *You Held The World In Your Arms* along those lines, as it's quite a different song. We felt at the time of its release that *Roseability* was one of the best things we'd written, but we feel that what we're writing now is better.

As you mentioned, *You Held The World In Your Arms* is quite different to your previous songs - is this an indication of what the new album will be like?

Yes, it is. With previous albums, we felt that most of the tracks were more or less just noisy pop songs. So we decided to experiment a bit, and that helped us learn what we were capable of. **You toured America to promote *100 Broken Windows*. Did you enjoy your time out there, and what was the response like from the American audiences?**

It was great fun and very exciting, but quite weird because the album was released about a year later than it was here. So we didn't know what to expect, and when we went out there and did the small club tour we found that we had a small loyal following who had got hold of the album on import. It was a very refreshing experience. We plan to release the new album at the same time in America, because we want to continue improving as a band and to have staggered releases means that you're always going back to things you were doing a year earlier, and that can slow your progress.

When you first started to break through into the British market, you gained a reputation for being very good live. What did you feel were the reasons for that?

We gained a reputation for gigging quite a lot, and I suppose all the practice we got helped to make each show better than the last. Also, we felt that the songs on the record weren't as strong as they were live because they were basically noisy rock. With the new album, the reverse is true, in that the songs have a lot of subtlety to them which is difficult to recreate live. So we have had to really reinvent ourselves as a live act.

What is your take on the charts at the moment, and how do you think your new single will do?

We don't really pay much attention to the charts at the moment, even though maybe we should. But we know there's a lot around that isn't great. I do feel that people get a bit nostalgic about the charts in previous eras, but I'm sure that there was just as much crap around in 1979 or whenever as there is now. We just want to play the music and try and let that do the talking. We are hoping that the strength of the new songs will get people to listen.

Europe's largest student relay races are the Hyde Park Relays, which are organised by Imperial's cross country club. Every year sees new friends coming to take part for the first time, as well as the return of the regulars. The 54th Relays took place on Saturday 16th February. Due to the renowned quality of the race, the first guests arrived on Wednesday, and like last year these were the Polish teams.

Again we challenged them to a game of darts but unfortunately due to the comprehensive manner of our defeat last year, they merely laughed at our challenge. U.S. Cycle Challenge

This summer I, Tom Scorer, am cycling across America from Seattle to Boston, travelling through sixteen states and two countries. The journey will take me over the Rockies, the planes of Central America, Pennsylvania and New Hampshire. I will encounter many types of terrain and conditions, from the peaks in the Rockies to the planes and heat of South Dakota. I will also be raising money for Whizz Kidz

During the challenge I will be entirely self-reliant and will carry all I need to live for that time, except for food and water! I will be taking all camping equipment, clothing, tools etc with me and pulling it behind me in a specially designed trailer.

It has been a life long ambition to do this trip. I have been

training hard for the last 2 years to build up the core fitness I will need to complete the distance of 4,500 miles in less than 70 days, an average of 70+ miles per day.

My primary aim is to complete the cycling challenge but I felt that it was also a great opportunity to raise awareness, and money for Whizz Kidz.

Whizz Kidz is a national children's charity with a very simple goal - to give disabled children independent mobility. By providing specialised mobility equipment, Whizz Kidz improves the quality of life of disabled children across the UK and literally lets children be children.

The route has been planned for 64 riding days (at a 70 miles/day average) which gives me 6 full rest days dur-

ing the 70 day period. The days have been planned taking into account both the terrain and conditions I am likely to experience so are likely to change! I aim to leave in early July and return in the early part of September.

I am going to be having a number of fundraising events for Whizz Kidz in the next few weeks the 1st being this Wednesday 15th May, There will be a Bermuda Triangle Pub Crawl starting from the New Charing Cross Bar starting from 11am. (Nearest tube Hammersmith)

Those that want to come and help raise money and have an awesome time can pick up collecting tins, pub crawl guide and collecting licences from the bar and go and have fun!

We have organised some really good deals at some of the pubs along on both Drink (both Soft and NOT) and Food.

The Route in Brief:

The Pub crawl is going to be going from Hammersmith to South Kensington on the tube, then onto Paddington where we have loads of deals with different bars in the area. Next from Edgware Road to Embankment then back to Charing cross where there is a cocktail theme night waiting...

Anybody is welcome to come and help raise money: you don't have to drink; we will need sober minds.
