




































Imperial's connection with China's army hackers

Cybersecurity firm found university that will open centre at White City was recruitment hotbed

ELIX has discovered that the Chinese university that will partner with Imperial at a new tech hub on the White City campus has been cited by a US security firm as being a recruitment hotspot for the unit of the Chinese army alleged to be involved in the country's cyberwarfare program.

Zhejiang University signed a deal with Imperial late last year, following plans for an Imperial-Chinese "entrepreneurship hub" at Imperial West in Acton, which will bring together academics from the Business School and Zhejiang's School of Management.

At the time, President Gast described the deal as a push to make Imperial College "China's best partner in the west".

Analysts at the cybersecurity firm, Mandiant, note that: "Unit aggressively

talent from computer science departments of Chinese universities "such as Zhejiang University School of Computer Science and Technology".

Unit 61398 is a highly secretive division of the Chinese People's

Liberation Army. It is thought to be tasked with economic espionage against the United States, the UK, and according to the Mandiant report "any organisation where English is the primary language". So it's a step up from GCHQ recruiters at a careers fair.

Also, in 2013, Chinese news agency Xinhua announced the arrest of the university's then Party Chief Jin Deshui. Vice-Vice-President for "economic crimes" (which is understood to be shorthand for corruption). In March of the same year, Reuters reported a senior professor jailed for embezzling more than 10 million yuan (£1.08 million) of research contracts.

The college is currently run by

governor of Zhejiang Province from 2004-2011, Mr. Deshui is known to be a personal associate of President Xi Jinping. A 2010 report by the Zhejiang Daily claims that 15 people had died there due to police torture in that year alone.

The new centre is expected to open some time next year.

Violent Gloucester Road mugging video released

The incident happened on Cornwall Gardens

CTV of a violent mugging that took place last month near Gloucester Road has been released by the Metropolitan Police, in the hopes that the perpetrators will be found.

The attack, which took place on Cornwall Gardens, under ten minutes walk away from campus, involved a pair of muggers attacking a man from behind and wrestling his belongings from him in the process.

It occured at 9:30pm on Saturday the 30th of January.

The first attacker grabbed the man from behind in a chokehold, before his accomplice stole the man's phone and wallet from his pocket in the ensuing struggle.

The assailants then dragged the man to the ground before fleeing into the night. Police said the victim was "very shaken" but unharmed by the experience. The men, described as white and aged 25 to 35 were wearing dark clothes, one of which having dark hair and one sporting a black cap.

The road is used often by students who are commuting towards Earls Court, and some College

Night Tube ressurected

Good news for Woodward - it'll only take 45 minutes to get home on a Friday night

ne of the four main unions representing London Underground drivers, RMT, voted in favour of a renegotiated contract on Monday, paving the way toward the Night Tube service that was due to be implemented in September last year.

84% of the union's 10,000 members voted in favour of a contract which would give drivers a yearly pay rise linked to inflation, the option (but not the obligation) to work on the night service, and a £500 bonus should the scheme go ahead.

ASLEF, the largest drivers' union, are currently also voting on the contract proposals and are expected to follow suit when their ballot results are announced this coming Monday. TfL are also confident that the service will be implemented,

having already hired around 200 new trainees who are expected to be fully trained by the time the scheme is rolled out, likely to be this summer.

This is not the end of the story however, with RMT representatives announcing on Thursday plans for yet more strike action over the Night Tube. The union claims that the deal has not been extended to all maintenance workers and cited issues surrounding staffing arrangements and pensions. The proposed Night Tube would mean the entirety of the Jubilee, Northern, Piccadilly and Victoria lines and almost all of the Central line would be operational throughout the nights on Fridays and Saturdays.

Good news for the residents of Woodward Hall in North Acton, as it could cut their post-Union commute to around 45 minutes, from the almost 90 minutes on two buses from South Kensington they currently endure. 45 more minutes in Metric, everyone's a winner.

UCL rent strike steps up a gear

Their head of Estates said "some people just simply cannot afford to live in London"

he rent strikes that UCL students have been undertaking since late January are gaining more and more traction, now boasting a cohort of over 500 disgruntled tenants.

The unpaid rent now exceeds £1,000,000 and as the strike action continues more and more people are joining, adding to this total on a daily basis. This is a huge surge from last month, when the number who had actively stood with the UCL Cut The Rent campaign was just 150.

The protest centres around the rent prices that the body feel are excessive and target low income students. The movement are also aggrieved at the response from the UCL management, notably the UCL Director of Estates, Andrew Grainger, who said "We don't set our rents on the basis of the least well-off students" and "some people just simply cannot afford to live in London" which the campaign feel heavily disregards student's opinions. UCL are also thought to be pursuing evictions for the rebelling students.

The accommodation at UCL has increased its rent by 56% since 2009 and is thought to run at a 45% profit margin, corresponding to around £15 million a year. The strikers maintain that they are willing to negotiate, and are demanding a 40% cut in prices with concrete, long term commitments to low rent levels as well as an improvement

on poor living conditions that are present in some halls.

The last UCL strike over accomodation was successful, with students complaining after large amounts of noise and disruption from building works during exam season. This resulted in a terms worth of rent being refunded, giving a sign that change may be brought about should the cause continue to gain momentum.

The rent guarantor trap

College ignores the fact that many students struggle to afford rented accommodation

home students, there is an unholy pitfall for those trying to find accommodation without a guarantor.

This not only applies to international students but also home students from low income backgrounds. Without an appropriate guarantor, landlords see fit to demand rent in batches of six months as well as a huge deposit.

The vast amount of money that this adds up to has to be paid upfront in one go, otherwise the unfortunate student will have nowhere to stay. This is completely unacceptable, particularly in the turbulent London housing market, where costs add up to incomprehensible amounts.

Without a UK guarantor, and already paying huge fees, many international students end up taking out loans to afford the ridiculous cost of having a roof over their head. Imperial is the most international university in the UK; surely we should be catering to this need more than anyone else.

But that is not the case - other

universities such as SOAS and UCL have successfully implemented schemes where the university acts as a rent guarantor for any student in need. The system works by the university acting as a UK guarantor for the student, taking the uncertainty and risk away from the landlord. Therefore students can pay rent one month at a time, the way

it should be. This is clearly a system that works and relives so much stress for so many students. Why then has it not been implemented here at Imperial?

This is not a new issue, this is an ongoing problem. Many students have expressed concern over the inaction of College and their negligence. In an increasingly erratic world, where college life is getting more stressful and tougher, it is the College's responsibility to ensure life for students is as easy and stress-free as possible without the already stressful year of exams and coursework. Finding accommodation should be simple and financially possible, not a wild gamble and a stab in the dark.

The deadly orangutan cocktail

Interbreeding between Orangutan sub-species could lead to thier extinction

rangutans from a completely distinct subspecies have been accidentally introduced to another wild population, a recent genetic study has found. The population in question is situated in Camp Leakey in Tanjung Putjing National Park, within the Indonesian portion of Borneo (Central Kalimantan).

As their natural habitats are continually destroyed by human interference, increasingly orangutans are being displaced, with less space available for them to be released back into. There are currently two species of orangutan located in Borneo and Sumatra. Via genetic sampling and 44 years of Camp Leakey data, it was found that two females reintroduced into the park in the 1970s were actually translocated from a different subspecies usually found in a separate part of the island. This isolation means that they have been kept genetically distinct for around 176,000 years. Sudden interbreeding could now have serious unforeseen consequences. To date, these females have produced around 22 hybridized descendants.

In the past, hybridizations have

had positive or negative effects on existing animal populations. In some species, the cocktail of genes can lead to an effect of 'hybrid

Crosses are less locally adapted to the prevailing ecosystem, leading to decrease of mating success

vigour', where good qualities from each parent combine, leading to offspring of increased fitness. However, the opposite may occur in the form of 'outbreeding depression', resulting in crosses being at a disadvantage compared to purebreds, usually because they are less well adapted to the surrounding environments. And in primates with differing behaviourial traits, that may decrease mating success. So what has been the consequence for the Camp Leakey orangutan population?

The two females in question, Siswoyo and Rani, were rescued from the pet trade having originally been captured from the North West part of the island. Rani has interbred prolifically with local individuals, producing one of the largest families in the park with 14 descendants over three generations. Could this be hybrid vigour in action? At the other end of the scale, Siswoyo has much fewer, unhealthier offspring than any other female in the park. After two offspring dying in infancy and after contracting a followup infection, Siswoyo died ten days after her last birth. The only daughter Siswoyo produced has since had a stillborn offspring, a daughter that died in infancy and a son that regularly requires medical treatment. Could this be a tragic example of outbreeding depression? As such, this mixture of results for a population that is very much at risk has got scientists worried about the fate of Camp Leakey orang-utans.

"There is no definitive evidence of outbreeding depression", says Banes,

one of the main scientists in charge of collecting the genetic samples, "but our findings are enough to cause serious alarm." At the moment, not much is known about how stable the future is for this population, however with constant habitat destruction, hybridization may be a necessity in order to allow the species survival. Many, including the scientists in charge of the study, are strongly opposed to this idea, and uphold the international conservation guidelines. state genetic testing should be done prior to reintroduction to avoid interbreeding that could effectively decrease population fitness, and lead to higher rates of extinction. A parting quote from Banes perspective on hybridization; "orangutans from different populations haven't shared a common ancestor for tens of thousands of years. For the sake of short-term welfare, we've compromised the viability of wild populations – we can never take that back".

Threats to these wild populations include poaching, habitat destruction and the illegal pet trade. But at the top of the list lies the production of uncertified palm oil in Southeast Asia, which is used to manufacture a variety of food and cosmetic products. So in the future, try to look for as RSPO or Green palm label that indicates the palm oil is sustainably sourced.

Science & the City espite huge changes since the 19th century, there is still an uneven playing field for women in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and maths).

Recently the Academy of Sciences in South Africa found that globally, women make up less than 12% of the membership of the influential bodies of science academies. This number is lower in the UK; women make up only 6% of the membership at the Royal Society; contrast this to many countries who have less historically established institutes and scientific societies, like Guatemala or Ghana, but have double the rates of female membership at 12% and 11% respectively.

Somehow through the course of education and employment, women are rapidly losing their footing in STEM fields.

WISE - Women In Science, Engineering and technology - is a UK organisation looking closely at these dynamics. In 2014, they found an equal gender ratio of students at the GCSE level, but girls outperformed boys in almost every single STEM subject. At the A-levels, the gender ratio begins its skewed trajectory with fewer female students, although they still continue to outperform boys.

In further education, numbers of women are currently increasing in apprenticeships, vocational qualifications, and academia, but gender ratios still lag behind. These also vary greatly by field, with ratios of women as low as 2.6% in qualifications for construction, planning, and built materials.

At the level of employment, the numbers still show the same trend, with less than 13% of workers in STEM fields being women. So it should be no surprise that by the time women are in a position to become members of the Royal Society, the ratio is skewed at just 6%

These numbers are telling of an inverted pyramid with numerous glass ceilings for women progressing through the course of an academic career. If we all start out equal, it's more than worth a ponder as to why women are not progressing as far and as often up the STEM career ladder as men.

Sh!t Sc!ence

Scientists left hanging over left handed fish conundrum

t Sh!t Sc!ence, we argue that all research, no matter how outrageously ridiculous-sounding, has a purpose and contributes to widen our knowledge of the world. Even when it is a study of how fish can be left-handed.

Well... not left-handed, per se. It turns out that a specific type of fish called the scale-eating cichlid has a mouth that is angled a couple degrees. For half these cichlids, the mouth tilts to their left and the for the other half, it tilts to their right.

This particular species could be considered rather foul, leaching off larger fish and ripping off scales from their sides as they obliviously swim. And since this phenomenon was first described in 1993, it was thought that the way their mouth is slanted determines which side of the fish the cichlid will prey on. So we were pretty sure that we knew why, but we weren't really sure that

That is, not until researchers Toyama University's Graduate School of Medicine and Pharmaceutical Sciences captured 200 of these fish and ripped them open (they deserve it, let's be honest). Surprisingly, by analysing the stomach contents of young and adult scale-eating cichlids, it turned out that even though the young fish have slanted mouths, they eat scales from both sides of their prey, and it is only later that they start to attack the fish from the side their mouths lean, when they become more efficient at preying. This tells us that the fish learn how to take advantage of their physiognomy. And this finding makes this curious piece of research important to the field of laterality.

Let me explain. As humans, we love symmetry, and a symmetrical face is a mark of attractiveness. However, our bodies are profoundly asymmetrical. Researchers are very interested in laterality, i.e. why

humans and other animals use one side of their body more than the other.

Most humans are righthanded, and it turns out we are mostly right-sided as well, we will prefer to use our right foot, our right eye, our right ear... Why is this laterality so strongly ingrained in our biology? It is thought that in our species, Homo sapiens, our strong laterality is a result of the literal laterality of our brains, our centre for language residing in our left hemisphere, perhaps encouraging us to use our right hand. But we still don't know whether laterality is genetic or acquired. Studies such as this one, showing an example of behavioural laterality, where the phenomenon is acquired through learning, give us better insights into our own development.

This week's science picture

Unmanned micro air vehicles (MAVs) are being used for a range of applications, from surveying dangerous areas to delivering packages. So far however, long range and high manoeuvrability are mutually exclusive. A collaboration of Imperial with Southampton, is developing a MAV prototype with bat-inspired wings. The wings use polymers situated in the membranes, stiffening and relaxing in response to the electrical current running through them. According to Dr Rafael Palacios, from the department of Aeronautics at Imperial, "The MAVs will be able to travel longer distances in tighter spaces with high controllability, just like a bat" making them and their production more economical. The aim is to get the bat-inspired technology to fly a distance of 30 or 40 miles. However this requires a lot more work as they will need a battery or chemical device. In the future these MAVs could rival the 10 mile range of Amazon drones.

hat does it mean to be a human? That's the question Channel 4's sci-fi show Humans dances around. Created by Sam Vincent and Jonathan Brackley, this show tells a compelling story with multi-layered characters.

Based on an original Swedish series called 'Real Humans', created by Lars Lundstrom, there's nothing particularly new about the premise of Humans, which features 'synthetic' humans or robots with artificial intelligence. For all its imagination, sci-fi is certainly a genre that recycles old concepts. The intrigue lies in the execution and the re-imagining of them. Naturally, this group is on the run from people who seek to stop them (or help them?) and they inadvertently get split up.

The series mostly centres on these

robots trying to find each other, while at the same time, trying to deal with the circumstances they find themselves in. In addition, there are also human characters central to the plot. These include, but are not limited to, the Hawking family who buy one of the synths, reprogrammed, a retired old inventor and a police officer who dislikes synths with vengeance.

The show finds a way to bring intrigue to a very familiar conflict

One of the amazing characteristics of Humans is that the premise isn't really such a big leap or advancement. AI is being developed and robots are being modified as you're reading this. Whether the robots will be as pretty as Gemma Chan as Anita (who's very convincing as a semi-humanoid) remains to be seen. Humans takes place sometime around now, not in a technologically advanced future. It's a sci-fi show for the non sci-fi fan; sci-fi that has a foot in sci-fact.

This show is a clever, well written and high-energy thriller. It has a breathless urgency and a

tachycardiac pace that keeps you on the edge of your seat. The show is written so that it's not really possible to divide the characters into good or bad. There's a more complicated, more realistic, and frankly more interesting morality to Humans, where everyone is acting around the moral grey areas. The writers are able to nail the real-life worries and emotional connections that come when synths are a part of everyday life.

The show also addresses, but doesn't directly answer, questions relating to having robots in our everyday life. When machines can do all the things you can do, then what's the point of us? What's the purpose in our lives? The teen

character Mattie helps to convey this well; she believes education is pointless because eventually the synths will develop to be faster, better and cheaper than us. The show also talks about what it means to be a human and actually live. Are emotions inherently a part of us, or can they be taught and developed? In one brilliant scene, the synth Anita says to Laura, the mother of

the family, that she can look after her children better than her because she does not get tired, angry or forget things; however, unlike Laura, she cannot love.

Speaking of the acting, all the actors are able to deliver engaging and impressive performances. With the Hawking family, we see each person react in different and believable ways to the new synth. The youngest daughter idolizes her, the teenage son feels attracted to

her, while the mother and teenage daughter are suspicious and curious. Gemma Chan is great as the synth Anita, conveying a smoothly-robotic nature with 'human' qualities through a compelling and alluring performance.

Another standout actor is William Hurt, as Dr. George Millican, an engineer on the original synth project and owner of Odi (Will Tudor), an out-of-date model that the government is looking to recycle. But George can't bear to part with Odi because he's come to feel like family and all the memories they share. Hurt imbues George with a sense of loneliness and regret; he doesn't like the idea of upgrades destroying the connections that families have to their synths. He also brings humor to the role as he suffers through his new, nononsense model, Vera, who strictly monitors his health.

By bringing these kinds of emotional touches into the episodes, Vincent and Brackley succeed in making Humans, well, very human – concerning itself not only with the humanity of the real people we meet, but with the humanity of the synthetic ones, too. With a plot full of twists and surprises and dazzling performances all around, Humans is an amazing and beautifully made show. It deserves more attention than it currently has and is worth a watch.

The Future of Pop

Charli XCX's Vroom Vroom Recordings aims to leave a mark on the pop music world

ntil recently, many saw the netlabel and electronic collective PC Music as the future of pop. However, even after a number of brilliant, innovative releases they've remained on the fringes. Danny L Harle's debut EP Broken Flowers, their first release on a major

label, might have had a single that made it onto BBC Radio 1's 'A-List', but he's failed to capitalise on this success. Similarly, **SOPHIE**'s compilation album, *Product*, which was released last year seemed like a bit of a flop, considering that its release also coincided with the launch of a sex toy.

The collective have now started to look towards mainstream pop to find their success. Before the debut of his record last year, a collaboration between SOPHIE and **Charli XCX** had been circulating around the internet for a while. It combined Charli XCX's familiar voice with the sugar coated production of SOPHIE, creating something truly futuristic.

This collaboration, 'Vroom Vroom', would end up being the name of Charli XCX's new label, Vroom Vroom Recordings. She describes it as label where the artists will be "sharp, potent and deadly". The first release on the label, an EP also called *Vroom Vroom*, was released last week – produced by SOPHIE and with a guest appearance from PC Music's *Hannah Diamond*.

Starting off full throttle, the EP's namesake sees Charli XCX imitate a car. She sings "Beep Beep" and "Vroom Vroom" mixed with the real sounds of an automotive. And on the chorus she's fully aware of her pole position in the race to the top of pop: "Bitches know they can't catch me". The song is a confident, and energetic statement of new lifestyle, having recently moved to I. A

'Paradise' begins on a chipmunkified chorus, with ethereal tones reflecting the core lyric: "Tonight, we're in paradise". It soon skitters into more experimental beats, with the pops and squeaks which SOPHIE has become known for.

Uma Thurman's line from Pulp Fiction, "I wanna win / I want that trophy," is sampled on 'Trophy,' a song which will feel far more familiar to fans of Charli XCX's previous work. She exclaims "All the

girls 'round the world, now we in control," and there's clear aspiration to be like Marilyn Monroe: "Take the crown, shut it down, 'bout to steal the show / Shooting star, I'm a boss" (a reference to the book Shooting Star: Marilyn Monroe). Empowering would be an understatement, 'Trophy' is

thunderous and explosive, with the chant "Throw it up" encouraging club goers.

The ballad-like closer, 'Secret', is the EP's biggest surprise. It's snappy and trappy, with a cheeky "Shh" emphasising it's obvious theme.

Many have called PC Music hyper-consumerist pop, self-aware in its commercial appeal. *Vroom Vroom* is the first sign of the

collective transcending this label; Charli XCX adds substance and meaning to their winning electropop formula.

PC Music are branching out and assimilating. Charli XCX is savvy of the true future of pop; her next album, also produced by SOPHIE, could be her biggest hit yet.

Housing


Ensure the college provides affordable student housing for all and continue to work on a system whereby International Students are able to privately rent fairly, without excess fees.


Having had time to get into the nuts and bolts of the role and Union system, I would like to keep the momentum of my work going. New initiatives include:


- 1) Formalising the role of Welfare Reps or a Welfare sub-Committee

I believe that the breadth of issues that we all face can be addressed through the following initiatives:

Timetabling affects every student – I propose:

- Departmental consultations with year reps, mental health representatives, the DPE and DPW when planning the spread of deadlines and exams.
- Stress-less days aligned with departmental peak periods.

Reducing stress-levels improves mental health but better support across the College is imperative. We need:

- An anonymous counselling app for immediate help from counsellors, the DPW and Union representatives

- Support sessions for all students who are directly or indirectly affected by mental health issues.
- Hold Personal Tutors accountable through SOLE-inspired reviews.

Student housing:

- Building on work by the previous DPW to open the option of using Imperial as a guarantor on rental contracts
- Lobby the University for affordable accommodation closer to College, reversing current trends.

Funding:

- Create better awareness of all the funding resources and issues among students, especially for medics.



Against a sea of troubles – theatre in the Jungle

The Good Chance Theatre is aiming to offer escapism to refugees across the camp

he question of whether the arts are a luxury or a necessity has become one of the issues surrounding the 'Jungle' refugee camp just outside Calais.

Over 6000 displaced people from some of the most violent places in the world have gathered in the camp, a collection of makeshift shelters, home to people from over 20 different countries, from Syria to Eritrea to Pakistan.

The lack of organised infrastructure and aid effort has pushed the camp into a state of humanitarian crisis, according to a report conducted by the University of Birmingham with the medical charity Medecins du Monde. Despite the abject poverty and squalor amongst the mud, something of a self made community is emerging. Along the main street running through the camp, hairdressers, restaurants, schools, churches and mosques have

sprung up; born out of a necessity or a hope to carry on as usual despite the horrific situations the residents

find themselves in. A theatre has also been set up by the British playwrights Joe Murphy and Joe

Robertson, supported by the Young Vic and The Royal Court theatres and many celebrated figures in British theatre including Tony award winning director Stephen Daldry, and artistic director of The Royal Court, Vicky Featherstone.

The Good Chance Theatre, which derives its name from the common debate amongst the refugees of the likelihood of crossing The Channel to Britain on a particular day, was set up to become a place where refugees from all the different countries come together to tell their stories.

Under the geodesic plastic dome of the theatre, a daily of roster of events is put on by volunteer artists. These include music lessons, dance and acting workshops, English lessons, and even workshops in specific arts as varied as circus or clowning. The Good Chance website declares they have hosted "poetry slams, stand up comedy nights, acoustic sets, theatre performance, rap battle", providing escape from the rest of the camp's dreariness.

The space has become especially important for the women and

children living in the Jungle. Women are outnumbered one to ten within the camp and do not

Everything from English lessons to clowning workshops take place in the theatre

stray outside of their family tents for fear of becoming targets of sexual violence. Likewise, the camp is a dangerous place for the hundreds of unaccompanied minors who have found their way to Calais but have become separated from their family. These most vulnerable of the refugees find it difficult to make use of the paltry resources available, for they are seldom able to leave the safe spaces. they have created for themselves.

For this reason, many of the visiting artists have made it their mission to draw the women and children out of their constant fear and give them an outlet to express themselves. Recently, Afsaneh Gray, a playwright associated with The Gate theatre in Notting Hill, ran a workshop encouraging the young refugees to draw scenes from stories told to them in their childhood. In his powerful essay about Calais in The Guardian, Christopher Haydon describes some of the drawings by the young children, many featuring the emblems of the war that has been ongoing in their native Middle East for their entire lives; guns, Chinook helicopters, the threat of

The images, so far removed from the childhood these kids should've had indicates the burden of mental health problems in this population.

Most, if not all of the residents of the Jungle are suffering from the mental effects of brutal and close encounters with violence and war. In most cases, the refugees are not receiving adequate medical care for physical ailments, let alone support for mental health. The Good Chance Theatre and similar initiatives may be one of the most effective ways of tackling the issue. Art therapy has been shown to be effective in tackling post traumatic stress disorder in returning soldiers, ameliorating aggressive and depressive tendencies. It is only reasonable to assume that the civilians fleeing from those war zones would benefit from the same therapies.

Not everyone has been convinced about the value of the Good Chance Theatre however. In particular, the performance of Hamlet by the touring 'Globe to Globe' arm of The Globe theatre became a lightning rod for controversy.

Critics argue that the residents of the Jungle camp are living in fear for their lives, often going without food, sharing one toilet between 75 people, completely without washing facilities; a theatre has no place in such an environment. Do they have a point? Should we be talking about food for the soul when there is a shortage of food for their bellies? Some might

consider the idea of performing centuries old theatre to people in such destitute circumstances to be very definition of leftist ivory tower thinking; a peculiar brand of champagne socialism ("let them watch Shakespeare"). In Elliot Eisner's words such people view the arts "as nice but not necessary".

Yet, it is clear that to the 300 refugees who watched the outdoor performance, it was a welcome break from the monotony of life in the Jungle. One refugee, speaking to The Guardian, said, "I've read the play in a book but never seen it... It is good to see theatre, ... It is good to enjoy something".

Throughout history, in times of despair, people have sought refuge and comfort in the arts.

Why else is Verdi performed to packed out audiences in the Donetsk Opera House as shellfire echoes around them? Why else, in

the midst of the darkest days of the First World War, did British soldiers start publishing and distributing poems and satire on the front lines in the 'Wipers Times'? Indeed, why else did our earliest ancestors start scrawling bison on the walls of Spanish caves when by rights they should have been more concerned with the woolly mammoths after them?

The idea that the arts are a luxury is a myth that should be readily and swiftly dispelled. The arts should not be sequestered away in gilted galleries, privy only to the privileged few. The arts more often than not

are utterly necessary to survival and in maintaining humanity, and surviving in a desperate situation.

The arts are utterly necessary for surviving

Imagine for a second that you had braved war, survived sinking boats, travelled across continents, when you finally arrived on safe land would you rather be rescued by the leftie 'luvvies' with their Hamlet and writing workshops, or the so called pragmatists who wouldn't look beyond a meal a day and bare necessities? I know which one I'd choose

Should we thinking about culture when people are starving?

The Good Chance theatre company and others like them are doing necessary and excellent work, but they may now face extinction. Though the theatre is still standing, the French authorities have begun demolishing the Jungle; churches and restaurants have already been bulldozed along with dozens of homes. Theoretically the residents, now twice displaced, should be rehoused in other parts of the city, but for many – especially the 500 unaccompanied minors – the situation remains precarious

It is a striking indictment of European politics that the people who have gone to extraordinary lengths to flee violence and terror from their own countries find themselves on the shores of one of the richest countries in the world still fearing for their security.

Despite all odds, in face of European governments that oscillate between barely acknowledging the plight of the refugees and openly denying their right to seek refuge, the men, women and children who have found their way to Calais are starting to rebuild their lives, but they need our help.

As with most things, governments are far behind the mentality of the citizens, but it is time that the powers-that-be in Europe recognise the displaced people, not as "a bunch of migrants" as David Cameron so charmingly termed them, but as human beings, just like us, deserving of shelter, food, warmth, and yes, even beauty.

Dispatches from the Oscars

he Academy Awards took place last Sunday evening, and your intrepid FELIX team stayed up until the early hours of Monday morning keeping track of the ceremony on an illegal livestream, significant portions of which were dubbed into Turkish. Truly, there is nothing we will not do for journalism. As usual, there were victories, surprises, snubs, and questionable jokes, and that was only in the office...

The biggest story of the night was the success of Mad Max: Fury Road, who swept up awards for six of its ten nominations. The awards may have all been for technical achievement – Sound Editing/Mixing, Costumes, Make-up & Hairstyling, Editing, and Production Design - and George Miller may have missed out on the Best Director prize. Nevertheless, the evening showed that big-budget action spectacles can have more of an impact then perhaps previously thought.

And, of course, after Mad Max claimed all those prizes, there was little left for The Revenant, who BEN COLLIER | managed to win three Oscars, despite being nominated for 12. Sure, Leo won his Best Actor award (is it right to put 'finally'? This may have been his fifth nomination, but I think you'd be hard pressed to name a year where he was actually 'robbed' of the award), Alejandro Iñarritu collected his Best Director trophy the second year running, and Emmanuel Lubezki was awarded Best Cinematography for the third year in a row. But The Revenant entered the ceremony as the frontrunner, and failed to clear up.

Most notably, The Revenant failed to win Best Picture, an award which went, in possibly one of the biggest surprises of the night, to investigative drama Spotlight - also winner of Best Original Screenplay. Writing in The Guardian, Alicia Shepard said the win for Spotlight, which focuses on the Boston Globe's uncovering of the Catholic sex scandal, "can expose to a whole new generation why journalism matters". That's us here at FELIX. We're iournalism.

In a charged speech, producer Michael Sugar said that the message of the film should "resonate all the way to the Vatican", issuing a direct challenge to Pope Francis to "protect the children and restore the

Spotlight's win for Best Picture wasn't the only surprise of the night. Mark Rylance won Best Supporting Actor, which was widely expected to go to Sylvester Stallone, for his role as Rudolf Abel in Bridge of Spies - the film's only award. Best Visual Effects went to Ex Machina, the British sci-fi drama whose budget was minuscule compared to its competitors; Ex Machina beat out stiff competition for the award, including Star Wars, Mad Max, and The Revenant, whose CGI bear scene garnered acclaim. Alicia Vikander, the star of Ex Machina, also took home Best Supporting Actress for her role in The Danish Girl.

Ennio Morricone took home the Best Score award for his treatment of Quentin Tarantino's The Hateful Eight. Going up to receive the award, the 87-year-old Morricone was treated to a standing ovation, a recognition of his decades of work in the industry. Inside Out took home the award for Best Animated Feature, as expected, and British documentary Amy, following the life of the late singer Amy Winehouse, took home Best Documentary.

Sugar's speech on the Catholic Church wasn't the only pointed statement of the night; in fact, nearly all winners had something to say about the state of the world. DiCaprio used his time to address climate change, calling it "the most urgent threat facing our species"; Best Adapted Screenplay winner Adam McKay, who won for The Big Short, told the audience "if you don't want big money to control government, don't vote for candidates who take money from big banks" (a thinly-veiled attack on Hillary Clinton, who made \$3 million from 12 speeches to big banks in 2013-15); and even Best Costume winner, Jenny Bevan, said that we might be heading towards a Mad Max world if "we're not kinder to each other". Such an innocuous message didn't stop a whole row of celebrities from giving her the stink-eye as she strolled down the aisle to collect the award, decked out in a bejewelled leather jacket and scarf, giving the sartorial finger to any notions of what women 'should' wear at awards.



There were some aspects of his hosting that did work well, such as award to the LGBT+ community.

the segment where he interviewed black cinema-goers in Compton, none of whom had heard of Bridge of Spies. It pointed out the glaring disconnect between what the public actually watch, and what gets nominated, as well as highlighting the disappointment at the lack of nods for Straight Outta Compton. Elsewhere, his jokes left a sour taste in the mouth, like when he quipped that in the past African-Americans were too busy getting "raped and lynched" to protest about diversity, or when he said Jada Pinkett-Smith boycotting the ceremony was like "me boycotting Rihanna's panties – I wasn't invited". And then there were some that left us totally stumped, like his introduction of Stacey Dash as director of the 'minority outreach programme', who came on and wished the bemused audience a happy black history month.

Singer and 'musician' Sam Smith also tried to get in on the socialjustice act when collecting his award for Best Original Song for 'Writing on the Wall', dedicating his

Unfortunately, he also tried to claim that he was the first openly gay man to win an Oscar (there have actually been, at my count, at least ten Oscars going to gay men). To be fair, he prefaced this with the claim that the fact no other gay man had won an Oscar "[might not] be the

case", showing us all that ignorance should never get in the way of saying what you want to say. When corrected of his mistake, he simply presumed he was the second gay man to win an Oscar. Someone then pointed out Howard Ashman had won two Oscars for Best Original

Song, to which Smith quipped "I should know him. We should date". Ashman died in 1991 from AIDSrelated complications. Smith has since quit Twitter, and will - no doubt - claim that he is the first gay man to do so.

efore I begin this review, I'm going to really strongly recommend that if you haven't already seen the film you should avoid reviews or summaries online. Should you watch this documentary - as I did – with no foreknowledge then I guarantee that watching *Dear* Zachary: A Letter to a Son about his • Father will be a genuinely unique experience. Director Kurt Kuenne • has a very important message to get across here, and the structure of the • film – the way it progresses, slowly giving you drips of information - is essential to its effectiveness.

• To give a very simple synopsis • of the film, it was made (as per its • namesake) as a memorial to the life • of Andrew Bagby, a good childhood • friend of the director. He was • murdered by his girlfriend, Shirley • Jane, after ending their tumultuous • relationship of several months. • The recipient of this letter is the • couple's son, Zachary, born shortly • after Shirley's arrest. The film is split • between documenting the murder and speaking directly to

Zachary, telling him about the kind of man his father was. The level of love and care that went into this film is apparent, as is the love Kuenne, and the dozens of friends and family members interviewed had for Andrew. This cinematic scrapbook

showcases Andrew's personality, his likes and dislikes, and the effect that he had on so many people's lives. Much like the ending of It's a Wonderful Life, certain parts of this film are life-affirming, highlighting all the positive effects a single man

can have on so many people.

Dear Zachary is really an experience above all else. I honestly cannot remember the last time I was so viscerally affected by a film. And for this reason, despite it being one of my new favourite documentaries,

I doubt I'll ever watch it again. A full range of emotions are elicited through the viewing experience, and anyone who gives it a watch can expect to be angered, amused, depressed, sickened, and everything else in-between. No other film has conveyed the impact of losing someone in such an emotionally intelligent and accurate way. However, despite all the dark moments, the lasting feeling most people will experience is one of hope and inspiration – at seeing the dignity and love shown by Andrew's parents throughout.

The film masterfully avoids the pitfall of slipping into overly sentimental territory. There's sentimentality, for sure, but nothing is forced. The charmingly amateurish way everything is shot and edited, along with the backstory of why the director is completing this project, just adds to the appeal. Overall, Dear Zachary is a very human documentary and one I cannot recommend enough; its contents are incredibly important, and I would consider it a disservice to yourself not to give it a watch.







nnually, the Imperial School of College Medicine Raising and Giving team organise a trip to a European city for a night out; with this year's destination being Paris. When this was announced, the ICSM Boat Club thought, why take the coach when you can cycle there for charity instead? It's only 295km after all!

At 4:45pm on Friday evening, twelve naïve cyclists set off from Queen's Tower for the ride to Paris, with a target time of under 24 hours. Initial progress was slow, given the Friday afternoon rush hour, but after surviving Tooting and escaping the M25 we sped into the pitch black roads of the South-East. Shortly before our first scheduled stop with our supporters (Tom and Luke), we suffered our only two punctures of the journey. After a quick repair we set off in search of Newhaven; 100km and five hours after leaving IC we reached the ferry, ready to catch a couple of hours of poor sleep on the four hour crossing.

At 4am (Local Time), we disembarked at Dieppe, ready for the 195km leg of the journey. Despite an initial navigation error, we made good progress through the short hours and sub-zero temperatures along the Avenue Verte.
