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## Fossil fuel divestment finally on the table

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ollowing the resurrection of the Imperial divestment campaign, a paper brought to this week's Union Council

meeting set out proposals for the future of fossil fuels at Imperial.

The Divest Imperial Council Paper recognises that the majority of currently available fossil fuels must not be used if we are to limit global warming increases to the generally accepted upper limit of 2°C. Not only are fossil fuels a significant threat to the future of the planet, they have been linked to cases of human rights abuses in the developing These facts have world. prompted student protests, leading to one quarter of UK universities to pursue some form of divestment.

At present, Imperial has

£5.4 million directly invested in fossil fuel companies. This does not include further unspecified amounts that are indirectly invested via externally managed funds. This is claimed to be one of the largest investments in fossil fuels by universities in the UK. Imperial mission The statement mentions a

commitment "to address the difficult challenges of today and the future." As part of this, the Union believes that Imperial should be at the forefront of tackling climate change. Divestment is a chance for Imperial to support and promote sustainable technology. More importantly, the fossil fuel industry has "irreconcilable" differences with Imperial values. These differences include a "dubious ethical record", "intellectual dishonesty", and a "persistent

disregard for the environment." Divestment could be a way of forcing fossil fuel companies to change their behaviour. On a more pragmatic note, failure to divest could leave Imperial with stranded financial assets due to rising carbon levels and an increased cost of burning fossil fuels.

Concerns were raised at the meeting about how divestment might affect the relationship between Imperial and the companies in which it currently invests, many of which provide our students with jobs and funding for their research. Following what was described by Abigail de Bruin as "a fair amount of questioning", the general consensus seemed to be that the many universities that have already successfully divested have faced no obvious negative effects and there's no reason why this shouldn't also be the case at Imperial.

The Union proposes an immediate freeze on further fossil fuel investment. To begin the actual divestment process, the Union sets out a five-year target to withdraw investments in the fossil fuel industry. For those investments made indirectly via commingled funds, it is believed that it should be relatively easy to discover where money is being poured into fossil fuel firms and redirect it to other companies. Any future investments would be subject to student and

staff consultation to ensure compliance with Imperial values and mission statements. The campaign would be publicised in the Union newsletter, social media, and a dedicated website.

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The paper has so far been passed only in principle due to the meeting not being quorate (following minor amendments, the council will vote via email) but there are reasons to be optimistic about the future of divestment at Imperial. Union backing lends weight to any campaign. We have already seen how pressure from students has achieved divestment commitments at King's College London, Oxford University, and the London School of Economics. It remains to be seen whether the same success will be repeated at Imperial.

## Migrant students gain financial aid

n interesting paper at this week's Union Council m e e t i n g a d d r e s s e d the issues faced by asylumseekers and migrants trying to access higher education in London.

To study at a UK university, asylum-seekers and migrants with Discretionary Leave to Remain (DLR) or Limited Leave to Remain (LLR) must pay international tuition without the help of fees student finance, for which they are ineligible. At one London-based organisation, 500 young people have sought legal advice to help them achieve their dreams of studying in a London

#### university.

Many universities offer scholarships to help with the rising cost of studying in London. UCL, KCL, and City University offer a combined total of 11 scholarships specifically directed at asylumseekers and migrants with DLR or LLR status. Imperial offers no such aid. There isn't even a mention of asylum-seekers or migrants in either the College's Diversity Policy or Access Agreement.

It doesn't have to be this way. Imperial can control what tuition fees it charges and what financial assistance it offers to specific groups of applicants. The paper cites "exceptional" students and staff with DLR or LLR status as proof of the talent and value that migrants contribute to the College. The paper claims that is therefore the "duty" of the College to embrace its identity as an "institution taking pride in its diversity" and remove the financial barriers that prevent education being fairly accessible to all. Doing so would allow Imperial to become "a true representative of equality and diversity in higher education."

Discussion at the meeting focussed on the risks of a student's refugee status being suddenly rescinded, which could lead to the student having to leave the country before the completion of their course. The worry was whether Imperial should be effectively "incentivising" people to join the College in the knowledge that they may not have the chance to finish their degree. It was agreed that this should be considered on a case-bycase basis and should not get in the way of Imperial offering similar scholarships to those already available or being discussed at other universities. It was also noted that Imperial was not being asked to provide hundreds of scholarships at short notice but for an effort to be made to provide at least one scholarship for those that need it.

The Union has resolved to run a campaign which would help asylum-seekers and migrants face the costs of studying at Imperial. This would come in the form of financial aid packages offered to those settled in the UK. There are also plans to lobby the College to review the tuition fee status of asylum-seekers and migrants, awarding home status to anyone that would normally be eligible (i.e. those that have been resident in the UK for at least three years). The final pledge aims to ensure that Imperial formally contributes to existing initiatives that seek to improve access to higher education for asylum-seekers and migrants.

As with other papers heard at this meeting, an email vote will be held, though it has already been passed in principle. With a growing refugee crisis and net immigration levels of 273,000 in the year ending September 2016, these proposals could not come at a better time.

# UCL leaks paper, finds out after exam

urns out Imperial isn't the only London uni to routinely fuck up exams, neither is it the worst at it. Last week at UCL a

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mechanical engineering exam had to be rescheduled after the department realised it had accidentally leaked the paper.

Students were contacted by their department a day after sitting their thermofluids exam and were notified that they'd have to do a resit later in the month.

In an apologetic statement sent out by the department on behalf of Prof. Alistair Greig, department deputy head, students were told that there had been "a breach of security". The department informed students that the

contents of the paper had been inadvertently shared on Moodle and as a result "following consultation with the Faculty of Engineering Sciences, UCL Examinations Section and UCL Registrar, it has been decided that the examination for this paper will be rescheduled. All students who were expected to sit the MECH203P exam yesterday will be expected to sit the rescheduled exam"

Moodle is a learning platform designed to facilitate sharing and is broadly used by several education institutions, very much like blackboard. #### University.

Naturally students are less than pleased. One mechanical engineering student in their second year who would prefer to stay anonymous told

felix that many students "are furious about the decision".

The student explains that the professor responsible for the leak released a mock exam paper onto moodle as a word file which meant that students could view the file's editing history. "It turns out, he simply edited the actual exam paper to make the mock paper. This meant that it was theoretically possible for us to have viewed the exam paper before the exam."

"Most people were not even aware that we could access the file's edit history. It was only after the exam that on our Mechanical Engineering Whatsapp groupchat, it was revealed that someone had discovered this."

The students have been

given 18 days notice to once again revise for the subject. For many this resit will be on top of up to eight exams that May is already packed with.

The department claims to be trying to prevent clashes with other projects on the affected students' timetables however communications so far don't' seem to have addressed concerns about wellbeing and academic performance

This has prompted students to accuse UCL of having "no empathy for their students... scrambling to contain this disaster" instead, feeling that their university is being "run as a corporation, rather than an inclusive educational institution". We have contacted UCL for comment but have not yet received a reply.

## Union to do more for freedom of speech

he Union is moving towards taking a stronger stance Freedom of on Speech. Over the past few months a conversation has begun around the role of Imperial College Union in supporting students' freedom of speech. The question of "Are we doing enough to promote dialogue and debate?" lies at the centre of this move.

Union officials are recognising that Imperial can be a place of contradictions. College and the Union don't exactly have a history of engaging in many practices associated with the 'politically correct' left. These include warnings, trigger noplatforming and boycotting. These policies are often attacked by alt-right personas as restrictive of free speech. Yet at the same time the safe

space policy and the external speakers policy (which requires the Union to vet external speakers) could be seen as restrictive of students' freedom of expression.

Similarly Imperial prides itself in the involvement of its students and staff and the Union has the highest numbers of clubs and societies of all UK Universities. Yet campaigns rarely take off and when they do, they don't necessarily get as much support as they could or should.

Whether this is a result of the type of people that populate Imperial or an effect of Imperial's institutional culture of silence is up for debate. However just as there's a strong push for student involvement in clubs and societies, whether that's through sport participation or involvement with the arts, the feeling in ICU seems to be that

there should be a similar push in forming educated, socially aware citizens, capable of debate and if necessary action.

Within the next year we should be seeing a full restructuring of campaign management at the Union, though changes in the way campaigns are supported and the resources available for them are already underway.

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# Fuelling the resistance



Naomi Pratt addresses the global struggle against extractivism

he greatest obstacle to action on climate change is the one most often missing discourse: from the fossil fuel

industry. Since comprehension of anthropogenic global warming began, the fossil fuel industry has been ignored in negotiations and subsidised by governments. Much time and energy has been spent over the past decades to reduce consumption of fossil fuels and greenhouse gas emissions, both on an individual as well as on a collective level. However, whether the fix is energy-saving light bulbs or the Paris Agreement, our efforts are undermined by the refusal to address fossil fuel supply. A striking example of this cognitive dissonance is the UK's commitment to an 80% reduction in emissions by 2050 under the Climate Change Act (2008); now rendered virtually worthless by the Infrastructure Act (2015) which forces future governments to maximise UK petroleum recovery.

The fossil fuel industry spends millions on PR and social CSR (corporate responsibility) to craft a wholesome and generous public image. They also invest large amounts in lobbying efforts, in order to exert political influence and ensure that extractivism continues unabated. Their primary obligation is to their shareholders, requiring 'sustainable' growth and profitability: a goal which requires continual exploration.

fossil fuels Once are extracted, they are inevitably going to be burnt; if not in the country of production, then they will be exported and burnt elsewhere. If we are to achieve climate justice, fossil fuels must be, quite simply, kept in the ground.

These companies, therefore, must dramatically change their operations; if they won't, then society must allow them to fail. Big Oil has gone to huge lengths already to defend business as usual, from sponsoring climate denying politicians to supporting wars against civilians, suggesting that they are unlikely to change, and their failure is our only hope.

Outside of our corner of the world blinkered by consumerism, direct resistance against Big Oil has been raging for decades. In some of these 'sacrifice zones', oil companies and the regimes they support can literally get away with murder, as was the case in the brutal treatment of the Ogoni in the Niger Delta. In this case Shell settled to the tune of \$15.5m, after a

long struggle by local people whose home and livelihoods were devastated by the industry's actions.

Localism is a potent tool when resisting resource extraction - voices with strong ties to place and landscape bring forward social justice as a cornerstone of the environmental movement. No struggle reflects this more than the powerful defiance of the Standing Rock Sioux at Oceti Sakowin protest recently broken camp, up in a highly militarised expulsion. Indigenous activists engaged in peaceful civil disobedience for months in protest to the Dakota Access

Pipeline, a project which disregards their land treaty rights in an extension of the oppression Native Americans have long suffered. Support reverberated throughout the US, including a thousandstrong march on Washington, and continues through legal action and divestment. The pipeline, which could become fully operational this year, has already had its first spill.

Though cries of 'nimby (Not In My Back Yard) -ism'

can often be heard from defenders of the industry, and echoed tacitly by governments overriding local consent, those on the front line are fighting for everyone's back yard, not just their own. In 2014, prominent writer Naomi Klein defined the term 'Blockadia': a new transnational zone of conflict where people whose lives are at the border with extractive industries fight for control over their water, soil and air.

Despite already holding more fuel in reserves than we can safely burn, continuing with exploration - using ever riskier methods - means the industry now faces battles on multiple fronts. Communities which have historically been more privileged are joining the struggles alongside marginalised people who have been long-standing opponents. As the UK prepares to extract its full hydrocarbon resources, swathes of the British countryside have become the new sacrifice zones. It is not only activist groups such as 'Frack Off' and 'Reclaim the Power' who are resisting the dash for gas. Local people from the South East, Lancashire, and Yorkshire are also joining the resistance, as they realise the destruction that fracking could cause to their towns.

Direct action against extractivism becomes even more powerful when supported by pressure from behind the front lines. Campaigns which target the carefully and expensively crafted image of fossil fuel companies are

already clocking major blows. Creative protests from activist groups 'Platform', 'Liberate Tate' and 'BP or not BP' have succeeded in driving out oil company branding from such cherished public institutions as the Science Museum, the Tate, and the Edinburgh International Festival. As the tally of divested funds approaches \$5.5 trillion, cracks are starting to show: the Saudi oil minister recently advised the industry to thwart the campaign to 'Keep it in the ground' in order to shed its 'Dark Side' image.

The less political power the fossil fuel industry wields, the smoother the path to a low-carbon world, where environmental regeneration can begin. Speaking at a Carbon Trust dinner in 2015, former Shell chairman Mark Moody-Stuart admitted that "18 years after major oil companies acknowledged the threat of climate change...the industry has made remarkably little progress". Big Oil has shown its hand. It's time to show ours.

stressed at uni at some point. If you don't, I applaud your Jedi level of inner peace. But for the rest of us mere mortals, it hits at some point. Because it affects everyone, I just assumed that what I was feeling was normal, that my course was always going to be a tough one and it would have its harder moments. For the first year, that was true. I managed the steep learning curve and new social setting with a normal number of bumps in the road. But last summer, and at the start of the winter term, an onlooker would have seen things take a turn for the worse. I, however, didn't think anything of it for a long time.

I finally got a sense that things were not normal when I was feeling so despairing that I couldn't move or speak, and getting out of bed was harder than the current run up to exams. I wasn't learning

my self-image was so bad that being reminded of it would make me want to harm myself. You get the idea.

When the alarm bells finally rang in my head, I contacted the counselling service. It took two weeks to arrange an initial visit. Once I got there and alarm bells rang for them as well, I was prioritised counselling sessions. That took three weeks to happen. So, a month after reaching out in one of the most miserable points in my life, I was greeted with the question, "What would you like to do?" I don't normally articulate the details of what is running through my head when I feel like shit, but I believe I need the description of the pit I was in to make it clear how much of an unhelpful question that is. "What I would like to do is get better" was what I thought, but 'get better' doesn't really work in the timescale of the seven appointments they offer. Someone like me who saw no

way out and no happiness in the future doesn't know how to get better on their own. I don't like making sweeping or perversely grandiose statements, but the reality is that there is a good chance that in my position with maybe a few less friends, and a slightly less supportive family, I may have killed myself if all that was there to stop me was the counselling service. In retrospect, the support

they offered me would probably have been good if I had more acute exam stress or just a relatively small bout of low mood. But someone who can't get out of bed isn't going to drag themselves to a stress workshop where they can't share how they feel with a professional, or go back and forth over emails for a month to try and see someone.

Do I think my bad experience is the fault of the people who work there? No. Not at all. They are no doubt trying to offer the best possible care they can to as many students as they can. The time delay between my first email and my first

session was due to the understaffing of the service, which is no doubt oversubscribed because of the high-pressure environment at Imperial. My frustration is, in a sense, not directed at the counsellor that I saw, but at the college for claiming to offer a service to help with severe mental health problems, without employing the correct staff to deal with it. The service is not to help with clinical depression, but with short term issues such as stress. The purpose of the service has been misrepresented, meaning that people like me do not receive the help they need. Those who need immediate help are put on long waiting lists so that by the time their allotted appointment

arrives, the issue has already resolved. Moreover, there is not nearly enough information about other places to get help besides counselling, such as your GP. \\ Someone who can't get out of bed isn't going to drag themselves to a stress workshop where they can't share what they are feeling with a professional \\

If you find yourself agreeing with anything I wrote at the start of this piece, see a GP as soon as possible. If you're feeling worse than normal but not as bad as what I described, the counselling service may well be fine for you. But, in my opinion, if you feel worse than you ever thought you could, I simply cannot bring myself to recommend making the counselling service in its current form to be your first point of call.

I do want this to change. That's why I'm writing this. This year has seen many steps forward, including the creation of the Mental Health Officer, but it is not enough. Every student should be involved with improving mental health, as it will affect every one of us at some point in our time here. Until my experience can never happen to another student again, we must continue to campaign for change.

> Most cheaters were found out at some point - largely because they confessed. Women and bisexuals were the most likely to confess (46% and 53%) whereas two-thirds of both non-binary people and pansexuals would never tell.

> When you look at each department, Civil Engineering and Materials students were the most susceptible to guilt: 100% confessed to their partner. Chemical Engineering students were much more likely to manage to keep their dirty little secret - 100% were prepared to take it to their arave.

> In most cases, cheating didn't end our respondents' relation-

ships - at least not permanently This was largely because their partner didn't find out. Those most likely to break up permanently were the unlucky few that got caught in the act. Confessina didn't seem to do anybody many favours - 49.23% lost their relationship as a result of admitting their transgression. So much for open and direct communication. If you want to be honest but still want to keep your relationship, your best bet is to let your partner find out either from somebody else (62.5%) or social media (57.14%).

Pleasingly, I guess, most people have never been cheated on (at least not knowingly).

those unfortunate Amongst enough to have found out that they had been the victim of cheating, 58% ended the relationship afterwards. A further 11% initially ended the relationship but then decided to get back together later. Is this a result of low esteem? You deserve better babez

Imperial students are evidently a very forgiving bunch. Half of you didn't break up with a cheating partner (though this may have been because you didn't realise you were being cheated on). Apparently, older generations struggle with fidelity: 26+ yearolds were much more likely to have been cheated on, with 60% of 27-year-olds reporting they'd had a cheating partner at some point. Then again, being cheated on

What do we leave behind when we die? Our browsing history of course. And the most damning element of that is our porn preferences. Thanks to us, you don't have to wait till your bestie dies to find out what they're into. You can use the magical power of stats to make an educated guess instead. So, what do people watch?

The most popular categories of porn overall and the corresponding percentage of respondents who enjoy them are threesome (45%), amateur blowjob (40%), (35%), bondage **FUN FACT** (34%) and college/frat (33%). However, the that porn people are heterosexuals enjoy watching gay-for-pay porn vs. 27% of varies a lot according to their gender identity - with exception the of threesome porn which dominates people's choice regardless of gender. Women have less varied tastes in porn than men. There were loads of popular categories for men, but for women it seems that most of them are all watching the same porn.

**Everybody likes** threesomes but...

We've established that when it comes to porn, it's all about the threesome. Most people are jacking it to threesome porn, but how much is this reflective of their sex lives? Well, 11% of men have had a threesome, compared to 10% of women, and 24% of non-binary people. That said, only 5% of heterosexuals and 15% of bisexuals have, with 39% of homosexuals having had a threesome leading the way.

For group sex, the hetero/homo divide is even more pronounced. 2% of heterosexuals have been involved in an orgy, but 21% of homosexuals have (and 7% of bisexuals). That means that if you're gay, you are ten times likelier to end up in orgy in comparison to a straight Imperial student. #sorrynotsorry

Despite this, 53% of participants really want to try having a threesome, and 26% of them want to give group sex a shot. Gender-wise, men are much keener than women to try a threesome (59% of men vs. 48% of women), but they also have a greater appetite for group sex (27% of men vs. 23% of women).

It would appear that the 43% of women who enjoy watching orgy porn, would rather have it stay a fantasy.

Threesome-craving doesn't seem to depend much on sexuality. 53% of heterosexuals would be down for a threesome, compared to 56% of bisexuals, and 54% of homosexuals. That doesn't extend to group sex though. ## Clitoris, female G-spot, vagina and boobs

Who values the clitoris most? 70% of international (non-EU) students thought that clitoral stimulation was important compared to 62% of home students and 52% of EU students. But it seems that Europeans may be the most generous lovers because an additional 36% of them thought that it wasn't sex if it didn't involve the clitoris, while only 12% of international students had this opinion. Whether Brexit will affect the clitoral stimulation of millions of women in the UK remains to be seen, but we are willing to send our data to the Home Office if there's a chance it will make a difference.

What about the female G-spot? Turns out, more women than men think the female G-spot is a myth (13% compared to 8%). Worse still perhaps, 10% of men and 12% of women think it's the clitoris (nope) and 8% of men and 2% of women think it's the prostate (again, nope). Basically, you all need a diagram, apart from those who identified as non-binary, of whom 54% said they knew exactly where it was and how to find it. Only 28% of women and men on the other hand had the courage to make such a bold claim.

"I like 'em tight." Seriously, who says that? Apparently 19% of men but thankfully only 3% of women. No non-binary people share the sentiment suggesting once again they might be ahead of the curve. Still on the topic of vaginas, 80% of women think vaginas are all different, but 13% think they're all the same.

Let's look at a departmental breakdown: 29% of EEE students who answered our survey say that they like their vaginas tight, with 24% of Materials students not far behind, also finding a tight vagina high on their priority list. No one in Chem Eng or the Centre for Co-Curricular Studies (CCS) expressed this preference for vaginas. You're also more likely to prefer a tight vagina if you're older, with the peak percentage with that preference found in 25 and 26-year-olds. Thankfully no one under 18 said they liked a tight vagina which means they're either still pure and innocent or we're moving towards a society that doesn't rate **FUN FACT** vaginas based on tightness. Amongst those in re-Amongst gay students, lationships, the most popular type the ones of porn is college/frat, who are most likely with 55% enjoying this to prefer a tight vagina category. Only 30% are the ones of heterosexuals with either one, enjoy this or several friends with benefits. Take that as you will.

> Enough about vaginas. Let's talk about breasts. Men are more likely than women to prefer big boobs (21% compared to 16%) but are also less likely to think that small boobs make them sad (3% compared to 5%). Bioeng is the department with the highest number of Big Boob Enthusiasts (BBEs), with 32% proudly declaring that big boobs are great. You're most likely to think big boobs are great if you masturbate multiple times a day. 45% of people who watch Big Tits porn think that big boobs are better. At the same time, 6% of people who enjoy Big Tits porn also claim that they really don't care much for boobs. WHO ARE THESE PEOPLE?

#### The prostate and the penis

Moving on to the main attractions of the male anatomy, 45% of gay men and women think that the prostate is great, and 9% believe it needs to be stimulated for sex to be enjoyable Only 12% of heterosexuals have a similarly positive view of the prostate, with only 1% admitting to a need for prostate stimulation.

In part that may be down to the fact that 9% of men and 18% of women didn't even know what the prostate was. Mech Eng in particular need some biology lessons – 26% of them don't seem to know what the prostate is. Life sciences might need a curriculum overhaul too, though, because 15% of them also don't have a clue.

What about dicks? Do they vary? Do we really appreciate their subtle differences? They way they all bend differently? Apparently not. 74% of men and 76% of women think that a dick is a dick circumcised or uncircumcised. Although both men and women expressed a preference for uncircumcised dick on average, women are slightly more likely to opt for an uncut penis, with 10% of women liking them cut, and 13% of women liking them uncut. For men, on the other hand, the preference for foreskin is 19% with vs. 7% without. It seems some men are attached to their foreskin. Literally.

Looking at penis preference based on fee status yields further insight still. Although the vast majority of people really do just think a dick is a dick, no matter which way you look at it, both home and EU students – if they have a preference – prefer an uncircumcised penis, and international students overwhelmingly prefer a circumcised penis, being more than four times as likely to opt for something that doesn't look like a naked mole rat. For those who have a preference (at most 43%, which is in EEE), the only department where an unircumcised penis isn't the top choice is in civil engineering, where 20% of people call a circumcised dick their preference.

Civ Eng are our size queens, with a third of them saying that penis size matters, and that everyone prefers a well endowed partner. Chemistry are quite the opposite, with the highest number of students (44%) believing that it's more about how you use it. Straight people think size matters more than gay people: 18% of heterosexuals said that size matters, compared to 14% of bisexuals and 17% of homosexuals. Sadly for all you men, women actually care more about dick size than men. 20% of women say the bigger the better, where only 16% of men and 14% of non-binary people feel the same.

Whether you think a big dick is important seems to vary with age. It gets more important when you're in your early twenties, but it just isn't a priority when you're 24-26. However as soon as you hit 27 you realise you're too old for tiny dicks, and it gets back on the top of your list.

Comparing those who think size matters most with frequency of masturbation shows us that if you're masturbating less than once a month or multiple times a day, you're much more likely to think size matters. If you're having sex, you're most likely to think that size is important if you're having sex 2-3 times a week.

# Who's playing safe

#### Condom use and contraception

It's great seeing everyone have all this sex everywhere but are people keeping safe, and how? Though three-quarters of Imperial students regularly use condoms, 8% of all respondents don't use any protection at all.

Condom use seems to be more widespread amongst men, with women being 8% less likely to include condoms in their arsenal of contraception. However, women may use alternative methods of contraception such as the pill (31%), the coil (8%) or an implant (7%).

How do relationships affect safe sex practices? Single people are 10% more likely to use condoms than people in a monogamous relationship, but best safe sex practitioners are polyamorous people. While 11% of polys will not use any protection, 56% will use condoms and another 33% will use the pill or a coil. No polys seem to be relying on pulling out, or the rhythm method.

If you're unfamiliar, the rhythm method relies on carefully tracking fertile days to calculate when the probability of pregnancy. Although the method can be up to 99% effective, there are several drawbacks which include long periods of abstinence (up to 16 days), the chance of miscalculation, and of course the lack of any protection against STIs.

The rhythm method is implemented by 3% of sexually active female students while 10% of women and 12% of men rely on pulling out. This is an even less effective tactic, as there's often enough sperm in the precum to successfully fertilise an egg. Not to mention the possibility of deception and the risk of getting an STI. Gurl – don't you trust nobody with your reproductive health

#### Sexual health checks

Speaking of STIs, almost three-quarters of all sexually active IC students have, at some point, engaged in bareback sex (sex without a condom). Out of these, 42% have never been to the sexual health clinic. These visits to the clinic are more common amongst women than men, with 55% of sexually active men having never visited a sexual health clinic vs. 40% of women at Imperial. Women are also more likely than men to visit the clinic reqularly (at least once a year) as opposed to when they've hooked up with a new partner or are worried about STI symptoms.

Your relationship to sexual health might be related to your cultural behaviours associated with your sexuality. Straight students are less likely to visit the sexual health clinic than bisexual students. Further down the Kinsey scale, straight students are twice as likely to avoid visiting a sexual health clinic in comparison to gay students, and if we crumple up the scale and throw it in the trash, pansexuals are four times as likely to visit the sexual health clinic as their straight counterparts. Along similar lines homosexual and pansexual students are much more likely to regularly visit the clinic as part of their annual (or more frequent) routine.

## Sexually transmitted infections

Though most students seem to be aware of the existence of most common STIs, 5% of respondents claim to be unfamiliar with HIV. herpes and gonorrhoea, while 10% are not aware of HPV, syphilis and chlamydia. Only one-inthree respondents were familiar with shigella (which admittedly is niche – it causes dysentery).

As for actual STIs the most commonly contracted disease seems to be chlamydia, followed by herpes and gonorrhoea, tied with crabs. Though at this point the sample was relatively small so we wouldn't say this is indicative of an Imperial-wide state. However, so many people fail to check up on their sexual health, that anything might go.

## **HIV and PReP**

Pre Exposure Prophylaxis, or PrEP, has been in the news a lot over the years. Most recently it made headlines when Scotland made it available on the NHS. PrEP refers to an antiretroviral medication – usually Truvada - which is taken preventatively to reduce the risk of HIV transmission, which studies suggest it does successfully by 80%.

In the UK (with the exception of Scotland as of last month), Truvada is only free if it's part of emergency PEP. PEP (Post Exposure Prophylaxis) is given in case of potential transmission. This might include accidental pricking with an infected syringe (particularly common amongst health professionals) or a sexual encounter of high risk (particularly common amongst men seeking men). Getting it pre-emptively as part of PrEP at the moment reauires shelling out £400 g month.

So what's the relationship of Imperial students with PrEP? Of all respondents, less than a quarter were familiar with the drugs, with 2% having heard of PEP and 3% having heard of PrEP. Women were perhaps surprisingly more likely to have heard of the two treatments. Queer students however were the likeliest to know of PEP and PrEP and amongst them, students that were familiar with one of the treatments were familiar with the other one too. 1.5% of respondents have taken PEP and 0.8% are currently on PrEP.

Puppets answer everything you wanted to know about sex but were too afraid to ask



Acts in Sex and Puppets \\ Edie Edmundson, Wondering Hands



Sex and Puppets will be at the Brainchild and Shambala Festival, summer 2017. National tour announced later. ex and Puppets is reimagining the way we talk about sex. A production by the puppet company Wondering Hands uses a series of witty sketches – composed from verbatim transcripts of real life experiences – to explore different aspects of sex.

It is directed by Edie Edmundson, who I interviewed last year for felix when she was the lead puppeteer in the Little Match Girl at The Globe. Edie hopes the show will help address the lack of proper sexual education given by the UK school system. She believes puppets help to make a subject that is often obscured by analogy or misrepresented in pornography, to be honestly talked about in way that is accessible.

I have first hand experience with the lack of useful sex education in schools, having attended a faith school that believed repeating "don't have sex before marriage" would adequately cover all the nuances of sexual education. It was, therefore, with

considerable anticipation that I sat crammed in People's Theatre in Camden last Sunday, where the show would be on for one night only as part of the hotbed festival of sex. I am happy to report that it did not disappoint. The performance was confident, well-choreographed, and delicately handled a range of issues, from first kisses, to some rather unusual sexual kinks. Most importantly, it was also really funny.

The venue perfectly suited the tone of the show. It was intimate and relaxed. Those at the front were only a few metres away the puppets and the puppeteers, which allowed a good deal of audience interaction.

In the opening sketch, Fuzz, who looks a bit like a cross between a golden retriever and a pink Muppet, pesters the front row to allow him to access 18+ material on his tablet. When he is finally granted access, he grunts and reclines, proceeding to enjoy the material with help of an aubergine.

Some of the most effective parts are when the puppets acknowledge their puppeteers; in one sketch, after declaring some bold sexual fantasy, they turn to question their operators, who become comically shy and awkward. Through methods like these the puppets are allowed to grow as characters away from their puppeteers, becoming detached from the humans on stage and taking on rich personas of their own.

The show was funny, informative, and, visually, a delight. My favourite sketches were given by the puppets acting as STIs, including chlamydia, crabs, and genital warts. Someone at Wondering Hands has serious creative talent – these puppets were very skilfully designed; I've never seen crabs look so cute or genital warts so grumpy! I was also surprised at how effective the puppets were at giving medical advice, as a microbiologist, it was heartening to see accurate information being disseminated in such a fun way.

Reflecting on the whole performance, it is clear that Wondering Hands are doing something highly commendable. Puppetry is an excellent medium to discuss sexual issues. The way we associate puppets with childhood means that it catches us unawares to hear puppets discussing topics on adult themes. We don't bring our guard up in the same way that we might be inclined to when a serious looking professional gives us information on the same topics. With the awkwardness out of the way, it's easier to engage with

what is actually being said. Edie hopes that in the near future she might be able to tailor a more child-friendly version of the show to be performed in schools. She tells me that they have lots of sketches stored up, so it's just a matter of choosing the best ones to perform.

The run may be over in Camden but there's another opportunity coming up soon; the next performance will be at Brainchild and Shambala Festival this summer, and there are plans to tour the UK later this year. I urge all of you to seek out this show. There'd a lot to learn from Sex and Puppets.
