Due to the changes, Fuel will be closing after 12th March. From 13th -15th March, all students will be able to use the Senior Common Room (SCR) for meals and to access the salad bar there, covering the gap between 'Fuel' shutting and the new JCR shop salad bar opening.

What's already been introduced?

Some changes have already slowly been introduced since January. The SCR has a brand new salad bar, for which the demand was recognised through student and staff feedback collected verbally and online, as well as the SES survey highlighting the desire for healthier options. On top this, popular food items have also been introduced on campus. The JCR shop has added giant sausage rolls into their hot food cabinets, and the JCR Deli now serves hot meat sandwiches.

The Library Café has also refreshed its look, introduced an express queue for cold foods following feedback on speed of service, and started serving more freshly cooked food rather items in the oven [photo

below]. Not the only café to change, the Queens Tower Rooms (OTR) has now become a dedicated hub to Asian cuisine, with speciality chefs, alongside the usual meal deals.

Labelling The Independent Group MPs "traitors" is exactly why they left

There is a powerful rationale for the actions of the 8 Labour MPs that left the party last week

The hen Independent Group MPs left. they were in disgust at the state of their own parties. Let us consider the personal toll this must have taken. Many MPs grew up knowing that they wanted to be in politics, and what party they wanted to be a part of. They will have spent years working in small dingy rooms as researchers, walking miles a day canvassing, and putting on smile after smile on the campaign trail. Why did they do that? Don't tell me that it was just power lust. These people believed, rightly or wrongly, that they could make our country a better place. They believed in their cause and they believed in their party. So put yourself in their shoes, just for a second, and imagine how hard it would have been for them to turn their backs on everything that they had built. Why would they do that? The conduct of some Labour supporters provides us with an insight into how far our two major parties have fallen.

Last week, published in these very pages, was a tub-thumping condemnation of the actions of the 8 labour MPs that chose to leave. The article claims that their departure is "good riddance" and makes a number of other extraordinary and, in some cases, false statements. I fear the author has drunk too deeply from the well of



ideology. I hope to offer a humble refutation to some of his more egregious claims and, potentially, restore some balance to this conversation.

One of the tragedies of the decline of the Labour party is that its former tolerance and inclusivity proved to be the root of its transformation into the bitter and twisted party obsessed with ideological purity that we see today. Corbyn has been a Labour MP since 1983, and, when his party was in government, he voted against them 428 times. Yet, he was still accepted. It was accepted that Labour was home to those on the left and, while the more centrist leadership at the time did not agree with him, they never threatened to chase him out of

the party or to deselect him as an MP. Indeed, the irony of

Corbynites condemning Chuka Umunna as having betrayed the party that got him elected, is compounded by a tweet from Corbyn himself. In 2010, when power was nowhere in sight, Corbyn wrote "u vote 4 ur MP". Now that the boot is on the other foot, it seems such values have swiftly faded away.

Forgetfulness regarding uncomfortable truths seems to be a trend as the article goes on. "[7 Labour MPs] took the unprecedented step of leaving the Labour party and forming a new centrist 'party', taking the incredibly bland name 'The Independent Group'''. In one sentence, he brushes over historic party schisms, such as the

Labour MPs that left to form the SDP, he is guilty of misleading the reader by saying MPs have formed a party - a position he repeats despite later acknowledging it is false and adds a pejorative slur that says more about the intolerance rife in Labour than anything else.

If these are your voters and party members, then I have sympathy with Umunna and others when they looked across the aisle and joined with Conservatives who shared in their values of "[reducing inequality] through the extension of opportunity" and "[creating] fairer, more prosperous communities" rather than engaging is open anti-Semitism.

I know that this is a claim that will rouse many people but it is one that I will stand by. Corbyn has a history of being anti-Semitic and it is on his watch that the party has become a place where Jewish people are not welcome. If you are in any doubt over this, I refer you to the incident in 2012 when Corbyn protested the removal of a mural of a group of Jewish caricatures playing Monopoly, the board resting on the naked backs of faceless men. I, however, prefer to listen to the Jewish Britons themselves who have expressed time and time again that they are being targeted. If Corbyn became PM, almost 40% of Jews would consider leaving Britain and The Jewish Chronicle writes "Corbyn threat is much greater than far right".

Do I believe that The Independent Group is perfect? No. Of course not. It has been rightfully pointed out that saying that people of colour have a "funny tinge" is not a great way to start off. I believe that she should face investigation and potentially expulsion. But I think the author makes a mistake typical of the blinkered state that many Jez supporters exist in. We do not need our parties to be completely ideologically pure. We need them to represent our interests and the fact that, despite 72% of Labour members supporting a second referendum on Brexit, only the threat of more defections has convinced Corbyn to back a People's Vote shows that Labour voters have forgotten this.

The author writes that The Independent Group is just "another regressive Third Way tribute act from the 90s". The tragedy is that he hasn't noticed, too busy insulting other people, that his own party has turned into a bad hangover from the 70s. Maybe we could do a bit less mudslinging and a bit more talking about policy?

LSE Festival – An Exhibition of Policy and Social Science Research

he LSE Festival, running from 25 February to 2 March, is a week-long series of events aimed at engaging the public with social science hot topics. This year's theme is New World (Dis)Orders and focuses on the changing global situation: a new emergent world order where the US is no longer the biggest world power; rapidly-developing technology and its implications for our democracy; the politics that shape our interpretation of the world...

As part of the LSE Festival, the LSE Global Health Initiative hosted a panel on February 26 addressing a major question about antibiotic resistance policy: how can we reshape existing global healthcare structures, and coordinate international and interdisciplinary action, to combat new antibiotic resistance The panel, dangers? titled "The Drugs Âren't Working! Confronting the Crisis of Superbugs' provided broad view into a scientific crisis whose

solutions lie largely in policy and regulation.

The panel consisted of professionals from International Development, Health Policy, Government, and International Relations backgrounds, each offering solutions to the crisis from their disciplinary perspective, resulting in a comprehensive analysis of this policy-science crisis intersection.

From a healthy policy perspective, for instance, a panelist argued that the issue of antimicrobial resistance (AMR) is too interdisciplinary for government plans to be

is despite the estimate that investments of USD\$2 per person per year would be enough to prevent 75% of the related deaths, costing much less than the World Bank estimate of antibiotic resistance costing the global economy USD\$100 trillion by 2050. Why is investment into AMR treatment so difficult? The International Development panelist contends that investment into drug development is inadequate because the usual incentives for pharmaceuticals to create drugs do not apply to AMR. Antibiotics cannot be stockpiled, and must be made universally accessible for widespread treatment, making it unlikely that pharmaceutical companies can earn back a profit from the expensive process of developing drugs.

Other than panels, the LSE Festival includes an exhibition and prize-giving ceremony of an LSE student and staff social science research competition. These entries are on show in the form of posters, photographs, and research abstracts. Entries cover a vast range of subjects, from "China's Two-Faced Rhetoric" to "Policing of Live Music in England and Wales". Film screenings, live debates, child-friendly events, and student-led drama performances are also part of the festival program.

fair to say that the #MeToo movement has been the significant most social upheaval of recent times. Triggered by the much-publicised downfall of Harvey Weinstein, the tremendous outpouring of stories of both sexual assault and everyday sexism faced by women on a regular basis became a force too powerful to simply be ignored. All of a sudden, the floodlights were on sexism, sexual misconduct and abuse of power like they had never been before. More and more women came forward. There is little room for reasoned debate about

such topics. And yet reasoned debate is precisely what is needed when societal norms change. What was considered acceptable a generation ago would now be seen as sexual assault. Consider the iconic WW2 photo of the US sailor kissing a nurse on V-day. Last week, a day after George Mendonsa (the sailor)'s death, a statue commemorating the event was vandalised with graffiti reading #MeToo. Whether or not that kiss was wrong, there certainly is a great deal of uncertainty now about how men and women should behave around each other, in both social and professional

'Should we subsidize pre-schools?' - a debate between man and AI

Spoiler alert: the AI lost, but not without putting up a good fight.

arlier this month, IBM Research and Intelligence Squared U.S. sponsored an event where Project Debater, IBM's AI debating machine, and Harish Natarajan, a debating expert, discussed pre-schools whether should be subsidized. Both sides had fifteen minutes to prepare on the topic given on the spot. There was a four-minute opening statement, a four-minute rebuttal round and a two-minute summary. At the end, while the majority of the audience declared Natarajan to be the winner of the round, Project Debater's performance was praised by many.

Project Debater made its opening argument by supporting the idea of subsidizing pre-schools, citing findings on the positive effects of subsidization from studies and historical research. The AI grounded its argument on the idea that subsidization should stem from a moral and political obligation to the public, citing findings from researches that showed that an early investment in an individual's education will lead to a more successful life in terms of health and income. It also cited how those individuals will be less likely to lead a life of crime, which will increase the safety of a neighbourhood.

Natarajan made his opening argument by



siding with the opposition, saying that subsidization doesn't effectively address issues like poverty and crime rates in a country. He argued that it is simply a 'politically motivated giveaway to the middle class', who probably already have their children enrolled in a pre-school. He argued that other programs would be more effective in tackling such important issues.

Throughout the rest of the debate, both sides provided interesting and insightful views on the topic, though they varied in style and approach. Project Debater used data to support its arguments, while Natarajan used his experience and skills to 'reframe the debate about where government dollars could be best used to ensure social equality.'

The winner was the one who was the most effective at convincing

the audience about the persuasiveness of the arguments put forth and was determined through a live, online polling. Before the debate, 79% of the audience believed that preschools should be subsidized while 13% disagreed and 8% were undecided. Afterwards, 62% agreed that preschools should be subsidized while 30% disagreed. Natarajan won.

The thing to note, however, is not who won at the end, but rather the fact that both sides only had fifteen minutes to prepare for this debate and didn't know of the topic beforehand. This means that the AI was not only gathering the most relevant information needed to support a side and formulating that into a paragraph, but was also actively listening to what was being said by Natarajan and responded

to him with its "own, unscripted reasoning" to convince the audience of its position. This is an important step forward on the long road to teaching an AI to master a human language.

Another interesting point to note is that 58% of the audience members said that Project Debater 'better enriched their knowledge about the topic at hand', while only 20% said the same of Natarajan.

In a discussion after the debate with four-time Emmy award winner John Donvan, Natarajan, Dr Ranit Aharonov and Dr Noah Slonim (latter two being part of the primary researchers behind Project Debater), it was unanimously agreed that it was a historically significant evening. Aharonov explained that Project Debater should be seen to have huge potential in '[understanding] both sides of a problem and presenting all the pros and cons so you have a wider view of the topic and then can make a better decision'.

In other words, the primary researchers working on Project Debater aren't building this AI in order to argue

better than a human, which many viewers were rightfully concerned about, but rather so that it can present sides of an argument that a human might not even have thought of due to their biases/prejudices. The true potential of this would be to augment human decision-making, without replacing the human decision maker.

Slonim added: "Ultimately, what we saw was that the interaction of man and machine could be enriching for both."

While this is a very long-term goal that can only be achieved once the AI works effectively, that evening was a huge step forward in a more short-term one of '[mastering] the complex and rich world of human language.'


So You've Been Publicly Shamed: The guillotine of modern life?

From democratisation of justice to weapons of destruction, our voices create a stage for shaming at an unprecedentedly large scale

s suggested by the title itself, So You've Been Publicly Shamed explores the world of the internet with compassion seemingly absent and every flaw amplified. In it, the author Jon Ronson details his interviews with those who were victims of ruthless attacks, perhaps for a bad joke or an immature photo posted online, and sheds light on the aftermath of those shamings, from jobs lost to rape threats.

We, once the voiceless, are given voices by the internet and social media, given authority to enforce morals as we see fit and given roles, such as social control police. We stand up against injustices, criticise the fraudulent, and topple the giants things we never thought possible - all with this combined force. But

slowly, it has evolved into intensive scrutiny, where we search for that one politically incorrect statement and tear its owner apart, all in the pursuit of justice.

Ronson starts off with the example of Jonah Lehrer, a pop science exposed for author misquoting Bob Dylan and subsequently criticised for his apology speech for which he received \$20,000. He was fired from his job, and his 2016 release A Book About Love was immediately probed for potential plagiarism and factual errors and received largely negative reviews.

example Another highlighted in the book is when PR executive Justine Sacco tweeted, "Going to Africa. Hope I don't get AIDS. Just kidding. I'm white!" Although poorly phrased, it was obvious that Sacco intended the statement satirically. In fewer than 140 characters, that tweet blew up on the internet and flipped Sacco's life upside down. Criticisms, accusations, threats, personal attacks all flocked in as social media influencers rallied their followers to do the same. Those who spoke up for her, pointing out that it terrible was merely attempt at humour, were immediately labelled racist. Then, Sacco was notified that she had lost her job.

All of those consequences just because of a tweet seems like a hefty price to pay for a 140-word mistake. There is no forgiveness in this dictionary that is the world of the internet. In real life, if one were to make a mistake, it is social convention that we accept an apology and move on. But this is not the case when things are taken online, especially when the world judges you with the first thing that turns up in the search engine, however untrue that representation may be of you.

It is perhaps an intrinsic human flaw that hiding behind a blank avatar brings out the worst in us and strips us of empathy and respect. It could be that we are so eager to elevate ourselves that we resort to the humiliation of others to satisfy this need. More often than not, we have confused activism with conformity and blatant bullying. It is distressing to see that we can be so sensitive about what is politically correct that we can treat others so wrongly for that reason. As Ronson puts it, "We are defining the boundaries of normality by tearing apart the people outside of it."

Jon Ronson's writing reads like a documentary in literary form, combining aspects of journalism, advocacy, and expression of his personal opinions. It is expected that he sets the theme around a central idea, with a few main building blocks that portray different cases of online shaming. But I find it strange that he mentions many tangentially related topics with interesting potential but only covers them briefly. For instance, he includes his experience in a shame-eradicating workshop and Texas Judge Ted Poe's controversial use of humiliation when issuing sentences. One subject that I found particularly fascinating and had hoped to read more about is how women and men are treated differently as victims of shame, with men facing mainly the consequence of getting fired whilst women receiving rape and death threats. It would have been better if Ronson had made a clear choice, either structuring the book in a more streamlined manner or addressing



those tangential subjects more thoroughly and adding another layer of depth.

This book was released almost four years ago, and many things have changed since then - Justine Sacco has landed a job; the users of Ashley Madison were publicised; doxing Jon Ronson // Flickr

and cyberstalking have bloomed. It is hard to predict what trajectory we are moving towards, but one thing is for sure, to quote Ronson, "The great thing about social media was how it gave a voice to voiceless people. Let's not turn it into a world where the smartest way to survive is to go back to being voiceless."

opular and well-received by the public when it first showed in 1664, but quickly banned due to the backlash from religious groups for the portrayal of someone outwardly pious but truly a sort of lecherous con artist, Tartuffe was a masterpiece of satire on the sham of religion and its trickster nature. In this new version, it's a thinly-veiled commentary both on Brexit Britain, and also the widening gap between the rich and pretty much everyone else. In the past, where the play may have ended with Orgon and his family playing the victim, here we leave with an indescribable sense that Tartuffe is a sort of victim, and Orgon's bourgeoise lifestyle and the allowances that are made for him because of his wealth, were more of a problem that Tartuffe's deceptive behaviour.

It just shows how transferrable the subject matter is – it really is an incredible thing that a play 350 years old can still feel so incredibly relevant to today's socio-political issues. From ironic religious hypocrisy and deluding the gullible to the unjust abuse of wealth and power, Molière's work of art has it all.

Relocated to luxurious modern-day Highgate, in possibly one of the most beautiful and opulent set designs I've ever seen, Donnelly's version deftly shows that the moral issues the play explores are not a thing of the past at all. Perhaps what has made the play such a staple in the world of theatre is the universality of it. Donnelly makes it even more accessible for all audiences by abandoning the original, perhaps more complicated, rhymes in favour of modern-day language to suit the temporal setting. This gives us more of an opportunity to focus on the comedy and incredible physicality of the production, such as Olivia Williams's Elmire leaping around the room trying to seduce Tartuffe and expose him whilst her husband lies hidden on the sofa. The play has a slow start (still interesting though), and the second scene really takes off, with fantastic performances from all the cast.

The real stand-out performance of course comes from Denis O'Hare, for

et in the high security wing of Rikers Island, Jesus Hopped the 'A' Train boldly contrasts the stories of two inmates and the circumstances that led them there. On one hand, we have new prisoner Angel Cruz, played by Ukweli Roach, who shot a religious cult leader "in the ass" for brainwashing his friend - he's frightened, confused, and doesn't really know where he stands or what's going to happen to him. On the other hand, there's veteran inmate Lucius Jenkins, played by Oberon K. A. Adjepong, a serial killer who endures life on death row by God-fearing preaching and unreciprocated philosophical discourse with sadistic. no-nonsense guard Valdez.

The dialogue goes from sharp and witty to deep debates fluently, and the men argue about forgiveness, faith, redemption, responsibility, and crime. The delivery was spot on, from Adjepong's powerful performance as almost-too-righteous and aggressively committed to his cause, to Roach as superficially cocky but in reality terrified. There's also fine work by both Joplin Sibtain and Dervla Kirwan, who play the archetypal callous warden and arrogant defence lawyer respectively.

The set itself, expertly designed by Magda Willi, was evocative - a catwalk-type stage running through the middle with seating on either side, and perpendicular sliding glass doors to signify the divisions between jail cells. Young Vic plays are always interestingly staged, but this design lent itself particularly well to the context. Aside from the 'jail cells' and a chair, there is nothing else - it is totally bare, with no clutter, both exposing the characters symbolically, and also allowing their

emotion and acting to do all the talking, so the audience can really appreciate it. It is interesting to see when the doors move together and apart from each other, they are representing the compression and decompression physically, mirroring the character arcs. The dense writing really thrives here, and as Willi says in an interview, they didn't need much décor to make it work. The sound design starts off slightly abrasive, with the cacophony of trumpets with lights out during scene changes, but you get used to it.

In short, the play is addressing important questions of facing up to your wrongdoings and holding yourself accountable, and whether redemption is ever possible, which I'm sure everyone can relate to (just maybe not on a scale this extreme). There are no easy answers, and whilst you won't leave the theatre knowing exactly what the message of the play was meant to be, it provides a lot of food for thought – and really, what more could you ask for?



Arthur Miller's 'n 1968 play The Price, four people quarrel over the price of old furniture. Yes, that is essentially the drama's synopsis. Four characters in a New York attic, debating the value of relics of the past, piled up floor to ceiling from ancient dining sets, chairs, wardrobes, and old fencing equipment to an out-of-tune harp. But don't be fooled: Jonathan Church's 50th anniversary production of Miller's play is far more than that. Despite a seemingly mundane plot, The Price, starring David Suchet and Brendan Coyle, is as absorbing as a thriller. Visually extravagant and deeply emotional, it tells a story about resentment, the cost of success and the difficulty of making peace with the past in a heavily materialistic world. As Arthur Miller put it himself: "The play is about people who make decisions in life and the price they pay for those decisions".

The play's storyline is deceptively simple. Victor Franz is a 50-something, frustrated utterly and bitterly disappointed policeman, trying to sell a houseful of old furniture piled up in an attic that was once his childhood home. Despite once being a promising scientist, he dropped out of college to look after his father ruined by the Great Depression. He sees neither meaning in the past nor hope for his remaining years. At the same time, he lacks not only the courage to retire, as this would force him to recognise his failure to generate anything worthwhile through his career, but also the will to start over. Victor

resents his older, long-estranged brother Walter, who stayed in college and enjoys a career as a successful surgeon. Yet even Walter fails to find meaning or significance to his prosperity and fame. Over the course of an afternoon, duplicity and family secrets are

revealed. Walter, Victor's alcoholic wife Esther, and Gregory Solomon, the 89year-old Lithuanian Jew and antique dealer hired to appraise their possessions, force the beat cop to face a painful and long-stifled question, namely the value, or 'price' of his

sacrifice.

Both brothers are magnificently played. Victor, Brendan As Coyle – whom you might recognise from Downton Abbey as John Bates - impersonates perfectly the weariness of a man forced to acknowledge the pointless and meaningless fate from which he will never break free; a frightening warning of how rapidly one might waste their life. Adrian Lukis also portrays Walter perfectly by capturing his fears, unease and the guilt of having gotten away. The whole cast is undoubtedly exceptional, but it is truly David Suchet's manipulative, versatile yet charming portrayal of Gregory Solomon who is the play's icing on the cake. Although it is in fact a supporting role, Suchet's glowing performance turned this comic and eccentric character into the star of the entire show. Suchet played to perfection a seemingly harmless 89-year-old with extreme joie de vivre and incredible manipulation skills, but also with a vulnerable and wise soul. He was certainly missed in the second act, where he spent most of the time off stage.

Simon Higlett's set design was a masterpiece with massive amounts of chairs, tables, armoires,

and mirrors stacked up to the ceiling, giving the impression that all actors would eventually be swallowed up by the pile of old furniture. Sara Stewart, playing Victor's alcoholic wife Esther, successfully conveyed the perilous atmosphere as well as the stuffy and discomfiting nature of sitting in a graveyard of objects, which, although once loved, are now worthless. "Time is a terrible thing": in this line, Gregory Salmon truly encapsulates the whole essence of the play.

On the surface, The *Price* is about how much the antique dealer will pay for the long-neglected pile of furniture. But beyond the obvious, the play addresses the price involved in self-sacrifice, the price we pay for our success and ambitions - as well as the cost of dividing families. Although it is now 50 years old, the play's message is more relevant than ever in our current throw-away society. Miller compels us to reflect on the dichotomy of material wealth and affluence versus personal something integrity, which affects every one of us, yet something no one seems to care about. Finally, the play reminds us that while we are truly the authors of our lives, we must remember that there is always a cost attached to our decisions.

Ovid's Metamorphoses

many ow ways can one make age-old tales fresh and exciting? In 80 minutes, international theatre company Pants on Fire tells a selection of stories from Ovid's epic Metamorphoses: Jupiter transforms his mortal lover Io into a sad cow in a gas mask, Theseus is tended to by a gaggle of giggling nurses in a military hospital, Cupid is a little puppet evacuee who shoots Apollo and Daphne across a party while the gramophone plays in the background.

Peter Bramley's production transports these mythological tales to the setting of the second world war, with all its associated military costumes, characters and paraphernalia. When Eurydice dies and Orpheus is devastated, he follows her with his lyre, charming all in his way – to the Underworld, which in this case is actually the London Underground. The image of characters emerging from and descending down the escalators of the tube was cleverly done and very funny.

Indeed, the fantastical nature of the show relied on an array of colourful. ingenious props, and a creative use of set. Four whiteboards were moved around between and during scenes to create a changing space, from the interior of a room to waves at sea. Props used were very amusing - as Ariadne sings of her loneliness after Theseus abandons her, cardboard waves move in unison as two puppet fish join in the chorus.

Probably the most memorable story of the show was that of Narcissus, who is recast as a Hollywood heartthrob who falls in love with his own face on screen. Everyone in the audience probably has the image of actor Max Gallagher on screen smiling seductively in different angles seared into their minds. His seductive acting was so funny that when he reappeared on stage later playing the cello for another story, the audience laughed at his very appearance.

It was clear that the cast was having as much fun as we were. The seven actor-musicians move fluidly between roles in different stories, equally adept at playing instru-

ments as singing and being godly. Lucy Egger's original music was fantastic, helping to tie the otherwise disparate stories together somewhat.

Ovid opened his poem with the phrase "I intend to speak of forms changed into new entities" - and indeed, the stories presented in the show emphasise the transformations between man and nature. Daphne turns into a tree, Narcissus into a flower, Io into a cow. Bramley chose to open his show with the story of Tiresias, Apollo's prophet famed for his clairvoyance. Tiresias predicts that there will be a war in the future between man and nature, a theme that came across as too didactic and in-your-face by the end of it. It is an important theme, and very relevant today, but the importance of harmony between man and nature could be more subtly dealt with. The ample opportunities offered by the stories of fluid metamorphoses between man and nature were not fully harnessed to bring across the point in a more elegant way.

Ovid's Metamorphoses has received critical acclaim since its debut at the Edinburgh Fringe in 2010 and then off Broadway in 2011. It certainly does not disappoint.

Joy is trying to get bored businessmen interested in her free sanitary pads campaign, while Lizzie's music classroom is about to be turned into a shiny new computer lab. The two meet up later to attend their friend's 30th birthday party, taking out the frustrations of their day on their friend and each other.

This same day is played out multiple times during this show with tweaks in their dialogue, interactions, and therefore outcome. In one version, the two hide their respective bad days from each other, only to take it out on strangers at the party later. In another, Joy is brutal to Lizzie, saying "You look shit. No, seriously you do." Even Joy's taxi ride to the party is played out in different ways – she chats about her bad day, or plugs into her earphones to avoid any conversation at all.

It is difficult to understand the point of the show from the outset. The different versions of the same day don't follow any particular progression, and none result in better outcomes than any other. "Tacenda is an archaic term referring to things better left unsaid," reads the show's description. "This is theatre about why we sugarcoat our words... Tacenda will force us to relive our mistakes until we have the nerve to be straight with each other.' If that was the point, it didn't come across as such. None of the scenarios had the characters being more honest than others, only differing degrees of nastiness to each other.

This was precisely what I thought turned out to be the message of the play in the end. That despite tweaking this and that choice of words, leading to a shift in interactions, and therefore outcome of the party and their days, none turns out 'better' than another. Whether Joy and Lizzie were honest with each other did not change the fact that someone would always mess up in the party after – just in different ways. Whether Joy placidly accepted the manager's dismissal of her campaign, or swore continuously at him, or played the compassion card of corporate social responsibility, her campaign was not accepted. What changed was how she felt about it after.

In the same vein, whatever Lizzie said, her music room was going to be taken away from her at school. But it was in the situation where she stood up to the head teacher that made her feel better about it after. In a way, there was an element of fate in how the scenarios were presented - we cannot change how things turn out, but we can change how we approach them. It was also interesting to see how minor changes in what characters say to each other transform the atmosphere of a certain situation. The setting of contemporary London and very millennial characters also made it feel relevant to our mundane daily lives.

In all honesty, it got rather tedious by the fourth scenario, and I was thinking, do I really have to watch this again? But that feeling grew on me at the end, as it emphasised the Sisyphean feel of getting through our millennial struggles. Too close for comfort? Maybe.

Ariana Grande's *thank u, next* is a mature and conscientious pop classic

Only half a year after the release of pop landmark Sweetener, Ariana Grande is back, this time reflecting on the turbulence and tragedy of the preceding months.

thoroughly enjoyed Ariana Grande's last album, Sweetener. With a majority of the production handled by Pharrell, the project had an eccentric and colourful atmosphere, and was far more interesting than your standard pop album. And it didn't just sound great; considering the context of the release (her first album released after a terrorist attack at her Manchester concert which left 27 people dead), the lyrics and song topics displayed surprising strength and positivity. The release also took place only a few months after her breakup with rapper Mac Miller, her boyfriend of two years, over concerns with his worsening substance abuse problems. Considering the turmoil of the preceding year, the emotional tone of Sweetener was celebratory and inspiring; even the songs about her pain were made optimistic and hopeful.

Not only did *Sweetener* contain songs demonstrating a mature and healthy approach to dealing with the trauma of the past year, it also featured a handful of incredibly gorgeous

and heartfelt love songs dedicated to her new fiancé, Pete Davidson. Her infatuation was clear in a number of tracks (including one named after him), and the potent mix of lovely production and moments of lyrical tenderness (take "my whole life got me ready for you" or "I'm tryna turn two single people into a couple") combined to create a euphoric atmosphere that showed that, after a painful year, everything was promising

to work out. Tragically, shortly after the release, things fell apart. A month later, Mac Miller died of a drug overdose - only four months after their breakup. Another month later, Ariana's engagement was over.

One might have predicted that there would be a long wait before new music was released. Nobody could have guessed that, only a month after the end of her engagement, Ariana would release a song showcasing a staggering amount of strength and maturity.

It really can't be overstated how incredibly positive and decorous that song, 'thank u, next', really is. In the track, she names her previous partners, thanking them individually for making her who she is now. Going as far as to directly name Pete and Mac in the opening lines is both brave and sad, showcasing impressive emotional maturity and warmth of spirit. The song took over the radio, and I would argue that a significant part of the success was

due to the genre-defying sincerity, honesty and emotional intelligence of the song. Many pop songs are reductive, cynically produced for mass-appeal; here is a song that sounds more like emotional healing, showcasing bravery and soul-bearing rarely heard in the Top 40.

After this, the album was announced, surprising considering how recently Sweetener was released. And it's even more surprising that, considering the short timespan between releases and the undeniable trauma of the past six months, Ariana has released an album that is so good. It understandably feels more emotionally vulnerable than Sweetener, with more songs showcasing clear heartbreak and pain. And unlike Sweetener; where new love provided the antidote to pain, here the turmoil is ridden out alone. Without distraction and infatuation providing relief, Ariana finds comfort in herself, from within rather than without. And it is this self-reliance that makes the album even more inspiring.

Sweetener, Unlike where Pharrell's (undeniably fun) production clashed with the few songs produced by other artists, creating a disjointed and confused overall sound, the production here is consistent, and coheres to paint the picture of a person going through the rises and falls in emotion essential for healing. There are moments of extreme sadness, followed by a gradual build in strength and confidence, and then again followed by a crash

in spirits. It feels realistic and cathartic, as if this accurately reflects the emotional journey Ariana has been through.

Sweetener Where featured a small handful of unnecessary songs, and some which were great but self-contained, with topics that didn't contribute to an overall narrative, thank u, next contains no filler, and every song feeds into the story of a person navigating through trauma. In addition to production consistent and lyrical content, this is also the first album where Ariana is the only featured vocalist, again contributing to a cohesive and consistent sound.

In addition to contain-

ing no unnecessary tracks, there are a number of fantastic ones. 'imagine' is a gorgeous and wistful album opener, 'fake smile' has jaw dropping bridges and choruses, 'ghostin' is the heart-breaking emotional nadir of the album, 'in my head' is somehow both crushingly sad and hopeful. And that's not even mentioning the excellent singles released to promote the album; the inescapable title track, '7 rings' and 'break up with your boyfriend' are all great, with the latter providing a light-hearted end to the album. The only song I personally think falters is 'bloodline', and even so my main issue is with the cheap-sounding

horns; other than that it's another great song that contributes to the narrative of the album, and would be missed if deleted.

Sweetener was a great album with a number of fantastic songs but a slightly confused message and sound. thank u, next takes death and heartbreak and creates art, an album chronicling emotional turmoil and ascension from despair to a place of stoicism and sanity, in a similar vein to Beyoncé's excellent Lemonade. Ariana takes extreme pain and transfigures it into something beautiful, complex and worthwhile.

Snæfellsnes Peninsula - Iceland's hidden gem

recent he explosive rise in tourism in Iceland is nothing short of amazing. In fact, the Icelandic government is struggling to control the burgeoning tourism industry as more and more curious tourists make their way to the lone nation island to find out what the hype is all about. While Iceland has a lot of charming popular locations scattered around the island, especially the south coast, a lot of visitors are still oblivious to an enchanted region that is hidden in plain sight, the Snæfellsnes Peninsula. Located just north of

the capital city Reykjavik, the peninsula offers an abundance of natural geographic landscapes that are unique to Iceland and thus, it is often dubbed as 'Iceland in Miniature' by locals and travellers alike. From volcanoes and glaciers to black beaches

and lava caves, the peninsula has the most varied attractions compared to any other regions in the country. Because of its convenient location, many travel companies in Iceland offer assorted tour packages for the peninsula, though they have varying attractions listed.

While you can find multiple black beach spots in Iceland, Snæfellsnes' very own Djúpalónssandur black pebble beach is truly distinctive as it is decorated with unique rock formations from the lava field near the beach. As with other black beaches found in Iceland, it is also one of the wellknown locations in Icelandic sagas and folklore for trolls and the Huldufólks, Iceland's version of elves. It is believed that the rock formations belong to the bodies of trolls that were turned into stones when exposed to sunlight.

When visiting the Snæfellsnes peninsula, the breathtaking Snæfellsjökull will most likely be in the backdrop throughout the journey, looming over the peninsula as if it commands control over it. Indeed, the glacier-capped stratovolcano, located in the similarly-named Snæfellsjökull National Park, serves as the main attraction of the whole peninsula. It is primarily known for being the site where the protagonists discovered an entrance to a passage leading to the center of the Earth in "Journey to the Center of the Earth", an epic 1864 novel written by acclaimed novelist Jules Verne. Another unmissable

landmark that can be found on this peninsula is located near a small town called Grundarfjörður. Its oddly-shaped peak jutting out would certainly turn heads and the nearby waterfalls accommodate the scenery faultlessly for that perfect Instagram shot.

are Mumbai Mix! An Indian street food stall known for its long queues and vibrant aromas (that's not us bragging - it's feedback from our customers!) For anyone that hasn't met us yet, we are part of the Farmers Market that is located on Queens Lawn every Tuesday. We write this piece following an encounter with Andy, the Felix Editor, who happened to stumble upon our stall for a late lunch one Tuesday. Following a series of conversations, he proposed the idea of a page dedicated to Mumbai Mix in the next edition of Felix! We were ecstatic at this proposition as we rarely get to present ourselves on paper. This article gives us the opportunity to showcase ourselves both as a brand as well as on a personal level. For our regular customers who probably have some understanding of our background, this article will piece together some of the puzzle. For those that have never been to our stall, this gives you an insight into Mumbai Mix, its founders and the principles on which the business operates.

Mumbai Mix is a family run business founded in 2014 by a team of mother (Mohini) and two daughters (Deshna and Dimple). We offer a range of Indian dishes commonly found on the streets of Mumbai. However, our rich cultural background (Indian Kenyan and British) influences our choice of ingredients and cooking practices thereby giving a contemporary and unique edge to every dish we serve at the stall. The most popular dish is the Dosa wrap – a lentil and rice pancake with a slow roasted potato and onion filling that is served with an array of freshly made chutneys: coconut-coriander, roasted red pepper and tamarind & date

chutney.

We take great pride in our menu because we are particular about every aspect of our cooking process from the choice of ingredients to the creation of our own spice blends (masalas). 



ecause you're President, when you run on a manifesto, you have quite a lot of broad points and part of it is shaping a team that will be able to do it rather than necessarily taking on every single project yourself because it's simply not possible". I feel like this perfectly sums up Rob's performance. He has been an effective leader, taking a more hands-off/



wholistic approach to the job and ensuring that he appropriately supports the Officer Trustees below him. Having said that, he has also done well to achieve the majority of his main manifesto points (see below; the stars indicate partially completed manifesto points). Outside of his manifesto, Rob has been involved in various projects, including governance, disciplinary review, Graduate Students' Union review, policy review and Officer Trustee role review.

Felix: Do you like the direction the Union is currently going in?

Rob: I don't think I would have run if I thought it was perfect - manifestos are almost entirely about change, I ran on the idea of change. I agree with the vision, maybe I have questions on how to get there. Overall, the big impact and the big pieces we do are the right ones.

We've recently seen examples of the sabbs being left out of big decisions made by college/union – what are your thoughts on this?

Union decisions- it's part on us, recently we've completely redeveloped the way that the Leadership Team works. That side has definitely been a challenge so far but I think that the approach that we've taken in the last couple of weeks in tackling that has been really positive and we are actually beginning to see a way forward and a framework that may work. The College side is really frustrating. In all honesty, we sit in too many meetings as it is. College is so large, it's impossible to be at every table, the challenge is making sure we're at the right table at the right time, which I think largely we are.

James Medler - Deputy President (Clubs & Societies)

Tames' performance as DPCS thus far has been something of a masterclass in "how to sabb" and highlights the importance of adequately **V** researching the role and what it entails prior to writing your manifesto. James has seen major "wins" in his first six months largely because his manifesto built on the work of his predecessors. These wins include the refurbishment and expansion of Ethos gym. He has also managed to secure almost £500,00 funding for the Union Concert Hall and is currently



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working on a "big project management piece" looking to adapt the structure of the Union itself. James told Felix: "A lot of the problems that people have with the Union are 'it's not very effective', 'we're not very efficient at dealing with projects', 'we're not very good at replying to emails'. All of that is down to the fact that, under our current model, there aren't enough people to do all of the jobs. It wasn't designed in a way to deal with problems effectively."

Felix: Do you think sabbatical officers are adequately supported?

James: I feel our current structure and current way of working isn't effective enough to support the sabbs in the way it should be. Everybody has the same view of wanting to support the sabbs and wanting to do these new projects and wanting to get it done but the way we're currently set up means that's not always possible. I think everybody is aware of that and it's a pain. I dont think we're quite structured right, I think there should be more flexibility within our structure so teams can work more collaboratively.

laudia has arguably had the most difficult time as a Sabb. Analysing her manifesto, although she has made some changes that she said she would, there are substantial gaps. This is not completely her fault and complaints of "friction" between her and members of the Senior Management Group (SMG). She told Felix, "within the Union, between the senior staff and the Officer Trustees, there is a disconnect. We have highlighted it and we're addressing it. In most cases, it's actually not too bad. I happen to experienced most of the extreme



ends of this." Claudia also doesn't feel the Officer Trustees are adequately supported, making her "feel very lost". She revealed, "it has really taken a knock on my confidence. The Union environment had got quite toxic at times. It felt very lonely. It's been quite a big battle coming back from that." Claudia's experience as a Sabb highlights the problems with the structure that exists within the Union and the need for adequate support, both pastoral and operational, for the Officer Trustees. SMG has been described as her "biggest obstacle" when trying to "make a change", however this has been identified and strides are being made to remedy this issue.

The Officer Trustees have very close working relationships with College - in those relationships, we're perceived as essential voices in the process of developing anything. We have a lot more influence and opportunities for impact than I first anticipated

Becky Neil - Deputy President (Welfare)

easuring Becky's achievements in the first six months in the role highlights a major issue with the nature of the role as an Officer Trustee. You write a manifesto with lots of ambitious points but, when you find yourself in the role, you are met with a multitude of other tasks that you hadn't previously forseen. These tasks can include anything from large projects handed down from your predeces-



sors that end up taking up the majority of your time, to minor administrative tasks which can easily build up. You may also be met with more opposition than you had anticipated, or find yourself inadequately supported (as has been echoed by the other Officer Trustees). As a result, much of Becky's manifesto points are under the "work-in-progress" status and will be the focus of the remainder of her tenure. One major failing on Becky's behalf is the engagement of the Liberation & Community Officers. Although Becky is well-intentioned in that respect, it has become apparent that the whole structure of the Liberation & Community zones needs widespread reform before it can effectively deliver results to the students. Having said that, Becky launched the inaugural Liberation & Community Week and hs supported the officers as much as the flawed system has allowed her. Areas where Becky has underperformed actually further highlight the lack of adequate support provided by the Union - case in point is the petition system, which still hasn't been implemented because the Systems team is overworked and unable to support Becky there.


Felix: What have you and College delivered?

Becky: I helped make a disabilities rent subsidy happen so that means that anyone with a disability that has had to be in halls in South Kensington gets around £100 subsidy because they can't live far away. I had input in the new mitigating circumstances policy. I got that changed a little bit and they've definitely looked more carefully at what they're doing. The student support strategy is happening but it's incredibly slow.

Welfare is a major issue facing students and College are finally acknowledging and listening to students. College must deliver efficient, resourced, fully-funded services and be held to account for their welfare decisions. College is currently compiling the Wellbeing Strategy and I plan to make sure this strategy has student consultation, is efficient in providing the services you need and is delivered to its best. You need a DPW that can provide this, and I have the experience, passion and drive to ensure this happens.



ith the ICSMSU being run as a separate Contituent Union under the umbrella of Imperial College Union, it is slightly more difficult to make sense of the impact that Dan has had in his role as ICSMSU President. On the surface, it appears he is doing an excellent job, ticking off all of his main manifesto points to some degree. ICSM is facing a challenge due to the impending Curriculum Review, which is also affecting many other



faculties. In addition, the SU is looking to implement a culture shift within ICSM by increasing its inclusivity and, hence, improving its offering and ensuring the SU functions to cater to all students. Speaking to *Felix*, Dan said: "Communication has been the biggest, most pressing issue throughout the year. We've realised that there were a lot of key areas that we lacked. It wasn't just general communication but the way we communicate with different bodies of the College and ICU and help them understand how we function, us understanding how they function so we can slot in and work better".

Another challenge that ICSM has been faced with is the growing cohort of students. One of the resultant impacts of this is the size of the first year cohort "basically outgrowing the lecture theatres and spaces". In response, Dan says, "with the new curriculum coming in next year, we're looking at how we can shift the way we're using spaces, shift the class numbers to work round that and that's something that we've been having constant input on with faculty. Putting out consultation to students about how they'd like to see space repurposed is a key part of that.

In response to complaints regarding the 'clubs and socs' room in Reynolds, Dan explained:

"In progress. It's all gone a bit slowly but we had the clubs and socs room itself redone and now we're looking at how we use the space in the clubs and socs room more effectively. Unfortunately, in the interim, that's moved into the common room, where the microwave is and we have had that raisedto us very recently. It's something we're going to try and sort out, hopefully making sure the facilities like the microwave are accessible in the next week or two"

Felix: You mention maintaining and developing student consultation. Firstly, do you think you've don that and how have you done it?

Dan: I have done it, I'm very happy with it. We started off last year, we used mainly SU officer-student engagement so we had our welfare officers, our president, deputy president and our academic officers all-round the table discussing. We tried three main different types of consultation since then. The most effective one we've had so far that hasn't just involved elected reps has been going out to our various hospital sites and doing engagement with the third years out there. Getting them together in a room, talking to them about what the curriculum review is, what we've got so far and what they'd like to see changed or what support they'd like from the faculty for them to be able to carry out their roles as academic mentors and supervisors

What are derivatives and how are they used?

rren Buffet has described them as "financial weapons of mass destruction". Robert Kiyosaki said that the subprime Morgage Backed Security (MBS) disaster was a result of them "exploding in financial institutions such as AIG and Lehman Brothers". So, what exactly are derivatives?

A derivative is a financial security with a value that is dependent or derived from an underlying group of assets. The derivative itself is a contract between two ore more parties with its price determined by the fluctuations of the underlying asset. The underlying asset can be anything from stocks, bonds and commodities to even interest rates and market indexes. Most derivatives are traded over-the-counter (OTC), since they are mostly unique and unstandardized. However, standardised some derivatives feature on exchanges, but they regulated. are more Essentially, they were created as a means of hedging risk (reduce risk faced by organisations and individuals). There are two main derivative types used in the financial industry; futures and options. Futures are financial contracts obligating the buyer to purchase an asset or the seller to sell an asset, most commonly a physical commodity or financial instrument, at a predetermined future date and price. Options are sold by an option writer

to an option buyer. They are typically purchased through brokers. The contract offers the buyer the right, but not the obligation to buy (call option) or sell (put option) the underlying asset at an agreed future price during a certain period of time or on a specific date. There are many different types of option from lookback option, which is path dependent option where the option owner has the right to buy or sell at the lowest price over a period, to a binary option, in which the contract pays a fixed amount or nothing at all. The type of option used wholly depends on the needs of the two parties.

Most derivatives are used to hedge risk. The contracts can guard investors against adverse price movements. A hedger seeks to protect a position in the sport market by taking an opposite position in the derivatives market. However, derivatives can be used for speculation. Speculators take a view on the market's direction and seek to make a profit from price movements by buying or selling futures contracts. Although this

method may involve a high degree of risk and usually have short holding periods, it is often more attractive than the underlying asset because the contracts can be highly geared. Put simply, this means that a small expenditure gives the holder a big exposure to the market. This leads the investor with the potential for large profits but also large losses. It is this speculation that dominates criticism of the derivatives market. Before the financial crash of 2008, the Credit Default Swap (a special type of derivative) market was over 20 times larger

than the market for the underlying security, Mortgage Backed Securities. There have also been numerous occasions in which derivatives have been used to gamble on bankrupt companies. Akshay Shah, previous managing director at the Blackstone's GSO hedge fund unit, terrorised European credit markets by spearheading a series of unconventional trades using derivatives. His secret formula involved: GSO buying a Credit

Default Swap contract on a struggling company from another hedge fund. The CDS is like an insurance contract: it pays out if the

company defaults

GSO then approaches the company and offers it very attractive financing (a low interest loan for example) with an unusual condition: it must default in a way that will trigger a pay-out on the CDS contract.

The company carries out this proposal, for example by paying interest on a bond a few days late, causing little concern to bondholders but "triggering" the CDS contracts.

The hedge fund then has to pay a lump sum to GSO given the company has defaulted.

In previous years, there has, at times, been a complete disconnect between the two entities. Lastly, as IQ Trans and Gender Variant Officer for the second year in a row, I have been working on getting a fund set up for trans students to assist them with buying transition related items that aren't covered by the NHS. This is currently in the works and should be announced in another Felix article shortly!



I combined my art with my research and produced The Ripple Effect. I spent 48 hours drawing a giant mandala by hand on an upcycled table top.

Imperial College takes over LSE

delegation of the ICMUN society took part in the SEMUN, held on the main campus at LSE in early February. This is different than most of the MUN conferences as it's completely focused on Crisis committees, an unusual and slightly underrated 'mode' in MUNs. In Crisis, delegates don't represent countries or international organisations, but individual people in various historical or fictional contexts; everything is based on your ability to devise a good strategy to achieve your goals and react to random events that can easily stop your rise to power. People same cabinet in the cooperate and usually have a common purpose. However, betrayals are frequent and everyone should always watch their back to survive (yes, characters can be fictionally killed): your number of choices is limitless, as long as you communicate vour clear strategy to the Chairs - those that run the committee.

For example, as one of the conspirators in 1605 Gunpowder the plot, our delegate ingratiated himself with the king, then faked his own death, hoping to lure King James to the funeral of a casket full of gunpowder. However, a traitor betrayed us to the Crown's spies and the king sent a body double. Yet all was not lost. In contrast to the previous two crises, the Algerian War Committee was particularly bloody (one delegate was killed twice on the same day, as two different characters). Our delegate managed to stay alive as the Algerian minister Lakhdar Ben Tobbal, while organising the resistance against the French army. Although there were many successful killings, including that of President De Gaulle, a truce brought forward by the French had to be accepted. Nevertheless, the conclusion was quite shocking, as the enemy managed to build a nuclear bomb which was launched on Algiers. A drastic decision which, had the conference continued, could have favoured the Algerian cause: our delegate was ready with part of the army to counterattack, so who knows how it could have ended?

Most of us were new to this new kind of conference, but we indeed managed to perform very well: with one best delegate award, a commendation and, most importantly, only one loss suffered (I know, it sounds weird saying this). Our experience was yet another example of how ICMUN delegations can leave a mark in these conferences





alentine's Day: 22 fencers, 6 competitions, 4 Imperial self-eliminations, 3 days, and 1 silver medal!

On the evening of Valentine's, while most people were with loved ones, 9 fencers set off to Sheffield to show their love of fencing. They were attending BUCS Individuals where university fencers compete in an individual competition to determine the best fencers in the country.

The first day of the competition was Men's Epee and Women's Sabre, and after winning a bronze medal last year in the Epee we had high hopes this year. After a mixed set of results in the poules the first self-elimination arose - Filip had drawn Louis in the round of 128. Filip won the bout 15-8 and proceeded to come 16th overall. Another self-elimina-

tion was on the horizon as James (last year's bronze medallist) fenced our strongest epeeist Harry in the round of 32. The bout finished 15-8 to Harry who finished in 6th.

Meanwhile in Women's Sabre, Fran (an epeeist by training), was progressing very well in her second weapon, finishing 13th overall. The remaining fencers joined everyone in Sheffield that night with many enjoying some excellent competition preparation with a night out in Sheffield...

The second day saw the Women's Foilists and Men's Sabreurs compete. A tough round of poules lead to our 3rd self-elimination when Michael faced Filip in the round of 128. Filip, possibly still inebriated, managed to win the very close match with a final score of 13-15.

Filip won the next round as well after a quick nap, finishing 32nd overall.

Women's foil had only two entrants from Imperial - one unfortunately didn't make it past the group stage but Ailsa, unencumbered by the thought of having to fence an Imperial student, fenced a strong last 32 match before finishing 14th, being knocked out by the eventual winner.

The third day was our final chance of medals in Men's Foil and Women's Epee. During the poules, Aaron, our best foilist, only conceded 2 hits (and scored 25) ranking 2nd going into the direct elimination round. This led to the 4th Imperial self-elimination of the weekend as Peter ranked 63rd faced Aaron in the round of 64 - Aaron won the bout 15-3.

In the Women's Epee, both Rocío and Fran got to the last 16 but were knocked out in closely fought matches with Rocío finishing highest in 10th place.

Back to Men's Foil and all other Imperial fencers were out, meaning Aaron was our last hope of a medal. A very close quarter final bout saw Aaron come back from 10-13 down to win 15-14, followed by a more straight forward semi-final win, guaranteeing himself a silver medal. The final was close fought to start, but 3 minutes in, Aaron's cramp caught up with him and a brief medical break was required. He fought on valiantly but after a long tough day, gained second place. losing the final 15-9.

Despite some unlucky draws and tough matches, the fencers should be proud of their fencing and their fantastic support and coaching of each other. Returning a silver medal was an excellent end to the weekend, and a result to beat next year!






