This led him to become the PrincipalDSIR Scientific Officer at Los Tlamos from 1944 to 1945.





Carnival Organiser Jerry Stockbridge thinks that it is unlikely that there will be a procession this year as it involves a great deal of work and raises only about £100. Instead he envisages a series of stunts in Kensington High Street similar to those staged by the College of Estate Management.

Some 7,500 books of raffle tickets
have been issued already and it may be
necessary to call in unsold ones to redistribute them to successful sellers.
One student sold twenty-seven books before
the end of last term and took fifty home
with him for Christmas.

the money collected before then can be
