

A cash till worth £1,200 which had been stolen from the new Union Lower Refectory, was sold in a shop in Brentford for £50.

On Friday September 17 the College received a telephone call asking "how their till worked". The caller had bought the brand new electronic till for £50 "from the shop next door", but could not operate it because the master-key was not provided. Seeing the IC logo on the till, he decided to telephone the College for the instruction book.

According to Martin Parsons (Victor Mooney's aide-de-camp) it was the first the refectory staff knew about it; apparently the till could have been stolen any time since work began refitting the refectory.

The work was begun in July and the new till had been left awaiting installation since then. Apparently no-one noticed its absence.

Brentford police have not revealed the names of the shop where the till was sold or the buyer because they are still investigating.

Sprint to the Clink

The security office had received several complaints about this man over the past eighteen months, and recently he had actually been observed stealing the wallet of Adrian Clarke, librarian of Mines. 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WINKING 'ILLEGAL' Will Police Turn A Blind Eye?

Imperial College's tradition of opening the year's Rag by playing tiddlywinks will go ahead on Saturday despite official opposition.

Last year, tiddlywinks raised over £1,200 in Oxford Street for the National Deaf Children's Society. This success, however, left only pennies for the less boisterous collections of the Multiple Sclerosis Society, who promptly queried the validity of IC's street collectors' licence. This year, determined not to be out-done, they have made a move against independant licences being granted on their flag day. Instead, they are extending their own licence for IC students to collect for them "provided they do not behave indecorously."!

Undaunted

Unfortunately, the Metropolitan Police, who had pre-viously turned a blind eye to the winking of unlicensed tiddleys, feel that they must now step in because MS had officially complained that tiddlywinking was not covered by the street licence. According to regulations, collectors must stand perfectly still and at least twentyfive metres apart, and the police have informed the Union that they will be on the lookout for people infringing their rules in Oxford Street.

Not to be daunted, Union officials have decided to circumnavigate these technicalities by re-routing the students to the King's Road. Can holders and tiddlywinkers will mass together to a clicking of counters and a rattling of cans hoping to collect as much as possible before their

legality is brought into question -if, indeed, it is.

Following tradition, RCS students will go down the lefthand side, C&G down the right, and Mines down the middle of the road. One participant last year spoke of tiddlywinking through a taxi, "but having a bit of trouble with the ridges in the rubber carpet." Another student hopes this year to master hopping his chip back up the steps of the tube station.

Prospective tiddlywinkers are

Deputy President

Phil Greenstreet, who was elected Union Deputy President last term was unable to take up the post because he failed his third year Physics exams.

The Union will therefore be without a Deputy President until another election is held. Nomination papers for the post will go up this week with hustings and an election taking place at the end of the month.

Mascot Returned

Mike, the 1701b micrometer of Imperial College Union, was found hidden in a cardboard box in the Union Office only a few feet from where it was last seen.

The mascot, which had been missing, presumed stolen, for six weeks, was finally discovered in the Union Office on the afternoon of June 28 by Union Administrator, Jen Hardy-Smith. Union staff claimed to have searched the office thoroughly over the two months Mike was missing.

LST Sued

London Student Travel paid £28.75 in settlement of an action commenced against them by ex-IC student Paul Charlton, who alleged that LST's Imperial Branch had sold him tickets which were £20 dearer than advertised.

Passwords Scrambled

July 13 a computer user, attempting to copy files from magnetic tape onto disk gained access to secret passwords in the Imperial College Computer Centre (ICCC) system. Mr Arthur Spirling, Operations and Service Manager, responded by 'scrambling' all passwords and correcting the faulty program by adding one line. Previously users with malicious intent have uncovered some passwords especially those left lying around on scraps of paper. Mr Spirling highly recommends that users regularly change their passwords.

Prints Charming

Peter Dawson joined the FELIX staff in July as the new printer, replacing Ian Morse who left the Union after eight years to become a full-time musician. **Concrete Canoes**

At the Concrete Canoe Championships held at Thorpe Park

on June 20, IC won two design awards for a 30kg high-alumina cement canoe designed by third year Civil Engineering student Mike Rowley.

Accommodation

Student Services have arranged to lease the Freemantle Hotel in Cromwell Road to provide accommodation for students for the next three years. A nine months' lease has also been agreed with owners of the Sovereign Hotel, Cromweil Road, to house postgraduates.

These measures mean that all IC freshers wishing to live in College accommodation during their first year will be able to do SO.

Southside Move Off?

The controversial and much publicised plan to move Union facilities from Beit Quadrangle to Southside was shelved.

Instead of moving all the Union facilities, beginning July 1983 and continuing over the following year, College now proposes that the Union make use of available space in Southside while retaining the Beit facilities.

A complete move in the next few years cannot be ruled out, but for the time being there is still scope for discussion.

Blackout

The Union Office was completely in the dark for several days after an electrician working in the Lower Lounge drilled through a lighting cable.

Car Rally

The FELIX Car Rally was closely won by the '21296' team. Answering the questions took them to such places as the church of St Andrew-by-the-Wardrobe, the Magic Circle headquarters, and the surgery of Dr Phang, a Hammersmith dentist, returning finally with the treasure which included the receipt for coffee at the Ritz and four inflated balloons.



I have already given you a dose of moralistic meanderings in my Handbook bumph (the rest makes a useful reference book) so, especially as Martin wants a short article, I shall stick to the practical stuff.

Parking permits: If you want to try for one, collect an application form from the Union Office and return it by 5:30pm Friday. Permits will be allocated that weekend.

Motorbikes: Registration number should be given to Chief Security Officer, forty-eight hours before bringing bike on to College premises.

Refectories: some outward improvements have recently been made to some of the refectories. However, because of the large number of meals produced, the food is not always of matching quality. If your food is inedible, go to the counter and ask for it to be exchanged; ask for the Refectory Manager if necessary. If, after this, you are still not satisfied, then write out a complaint and put it in the suggestions and complaints box (some are well-hidden and in Southside, at time of writing, the box is still in the Upper Refectory; in the Union, the box is in the Old Refectory). The com-

plaints (and suggestions!) are looked into by the (wait for it) 'Suggestions and Complaints' Committee and all those complaints with names and contact addresses are replied to. In general, taking the meal back has more effect on the quality of service than just complaining (especially if you do not put in a written complaint). Positive suggestions are also needed.

Insurance: All those living in College accommodation are covered for certain risks under the block Halls of Residence policy. (Note well the exclusion of clauses such as for theft from unattended motor vehicles, records and cassettes worth more than 10% of the total cover, bicycles over a certain value....). Claim forms are available from Room 438a Sherfield or myself.

Those not in College accommodation are well advised to take out some insurance. Replacing all your possessions (or even a bag of stolen laundry) is expensive.

Facilities: around the Union there are various sporting and recreational facilities. Some of the ones you will probably not be told about are: Internal Telephones: situtated in most rooms in the departments, on Halls of Residence landings, in the Union Building, in the bar, etc. Useful for getting your friend to come down and open the Hall door after it has been locked for the night, or even telephoning Nightline (int 2468, ext 581-2468) to find out the time of the last tube or for advice on more serious problems. Some useful telephone numbers are printed on your Unioncard.

Typewriter: there is a manual typewriter in the IC Union Office which anyone is welcome to use. Important letters from clubs and societies can occasionally be done by Pat, our Union Typist, but see me first. I generally give her most of her typing and consequently know how busy she is likely to be.

Gestetner: for large amounts of bumph the Union Office gestetner can be used. We have currently got three other gestetners, but no-one is willing to have a go at fixing them......

Offset-Litho: the Union Print Unit (based in the FELIX Ofice) offers facilities for quality printing at cheaper than average rates (currently, for example, $1^{1}/_{2}p$ per A3 sheet and £2.50 per printing plate and typesetting and paste-up charges).


Sewing: an electric sewing machine is available for use in the Union Office. Members of Dramsoc also have access to a rather temperamental industrial sewing machine—though they urgently need someone who is willing to use it (and who shall be accorded the title of 'Wardrobe Mistress' or 'Wardrobe Master' accordingly).

Perhaps our most useful asset is *information*, mainly available from those two pillars of the Union, Jo, the receptionist, and Jen the Union Administrator. It doesn't take much shoe leather or dialling finger and we do not, usually, bite—though we might be a bit busy at times so you might have to wait a while.

Back to the moralistic bit as I trot out the usual cliché of "welcome to our College". Your course might be boring or hard but do not give up on it too easily and return home (the first two weeks are always the worst for homesickness), try talking to someone else; they are probably as nervous as you.....





This club is not as dull as you may think. In fact, what we set out to do is have fun while helping others. We have many projects that you can help with if you're interested:

The Soup Run

This involves setting out at 11:00pm on Tuesdays and Fridays to take soup to the homeless of London. It's certainly a good way to meet other students in the cramped conditions of the minibus and to see London late at night! If you're interested, don't miss Freshers' Soup Run, tonight. Meet in Falmouth Kitchens at 10:30pm. The minibus will drop off at the student Halls and Houses at about 1:00pm. You will be surprised at the range of people who sleep on the streets.

Acton Youth Club

This takes place on Saturday afternoons for mentally handicapped and able children. Basically all you do is play with the children on the adventure playground, tiring but fun.

Old People

We have two activities involving old people, visiting them either at an old peoples home off High Stree Kensington any day or on Wednesday afternoons in one of the wards at St Pancras Hospital. Sometimes trips are organised for them and helpers are needed. Normally you just chat to them or play cards.

Battered Wives Home

We help to take the children of these battered women on trips round London usually at weekends. The children especially enjoy it when male students help as they no longer have a father figure around.

Draught Proofing

Working in conjunction with Age Concern we send helpers to draughtproof windows of old peoples houses on Wednesday afternoons.

Hunger Project

Did you know that

...more people have died as a consequence of hunger in the past five years than have been killed in all the wars, revolutions and murders in the past 150 years.

...28 human beings, 21 of them children, die as a result of hunger every minute of every hour of every day; which amounts to fifteen million people every year.

...this devastation is equivalent to a Hiroshima every three days. ...and also that if only one seventh of the

world's yearly expenditure on alcohol and tobacco or just 1% of the world's yearly expenditure on arms, were to allocated to supporting food self-sufficiency, we could end world hunger by the end of the century.

In 1977, the National Academy of Sciences in the USA published the results of a two-year study on world hunger conducted with the assistance of more than 1,500 experts from around the world. Their report concludes that "If there is the political will in this country and

abroad...it should be possible to overcome the worst aspects of widespread hunger and malnutrition within one generation.

And will is only found in people. World hunger will persist so long as people leave the responsibility with 'others' or 'governments' etc. The Hunger Project has set about to generate the will to end world hunger by the end of this century. Two million people have enrolled in the hunger project since it started in 1977. An important point to realise is that every single person makes a difference. YOU make a difference. The Hunger Project is about creating the worldwide commitment necessary to end world hunger, and this can

Rowing for Britain

From the Vienna World Rowing Championships, IC student Thomas Anderson sent in this report.

During the summer vacation I was privileged to be chosen to row for Great Britain in the Match des Seniors, the unofficial Under-23 Rowing Championship. This venture was supported by the Union and College who both contributed to the costs as the ARA cannot afford to run an under-23 team.

The crew consisting of stroke Thomas Anderson (IC), 3 Nick Hartland (UC), 2 Graham Wells (WLIHE), bow Francis Bucknall (KC), travelled to Vienna by train while the rest of the team drove, Cambridge towing the boats.

We had to practise on the course in the morning and evening as it was over 100°F at midday. Our race was to be at 11:30 so we tried to get used to the heat, which drained our energy really quickly. Luckily there was a slight cooling breeze.

On the day of the race there was a strong head wind and it was much cooler. The heat would have suited us but the wind ruined any chance we had of a medal as we were a very light crew.

In the race West Germany and France jumped the start and got an instanteous lead. We got away well and were lying third pulling away from the Italians in fourth place and holding the French in second. The French eventually got clear of us and we almost had clear water on the Italians at the 1,000m mark (halfway). From this point on we were just too light. The stronger and heavier Italian crew slowly pulled back at us and eventually got through and away to take the bronze medal and leave us in fourth place. Our tactics of 'go out and hang on' had been right, but the opposition just had too big a weight advantage on the day.

Walkabout-Looksee was born in a pair of comfortable shoes on an afternoon of excruciatingly boring labwork and has flourished and prospered since; armed with an 'A to Z', I set out to visit part of a museum's exhibit and come back to tell you about it.

At the William Weston Gallery near the Piccadilly end of Albemarle Street, is an exhibition of Kandinsky woodcuts of his Klänge album, published in Munich in 1913 (the title means notes in music.) During the period that Kandinsky worked on them he was undergoing his transformation from figurative to abstract artist. He started from the principle that figures and objects were merely means to an end: the essential ingredient of a picture was the spirit and emotion behind it. From this to the suppression of the object, and so to totally abstract art, was a comparatively small step. Of the prints on show, some definitely have figures in them, some may have, and in some the arrangement of black and white lines and patches of colour makes a purely emotional statement, like a phrase in music.

And now for something completely different.....

On the south side of Piccadilly, Fortnum and Mason are celebrating their 275th anniversary. In 1707 William Fortman, a footman in the Royal Household of Queen Anne who was selling used candles from the palace, and Hugh Mason, who had a small shop in St James' Market, began their celebrated partnership. In the store's windows huge books tell the history of London and of Fortnum and Mason, from their humble beginnings as a local grocer's shop to their current position as highly valued purveyors of hampers for Ascot and evening dress for Glyndebourne! The displays of wine bottles, crusty game pies, china and glass, blazers and tweeds, ball gowns and scent bottles are splendid: they are gorgeous to look at but most definitely belong to a fairy-tale lifestyle. If you venture inside, there's a model of a huge, multi-layer birthday cake in the centre of the food hall, dotted with candles and surrounded by the famous Fortnum and Mason hampers.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE FRESHERS' UGM.

The Deputy President.

The Deputy President. As most of you will have heard, Phil Greenstreet, last year's Deputy President-elect, failed to gain a Physics degree. Therefore he did not meet the "good academic standing requirement" agreed by ICU and the College Governing Body in 1972 and confirmed by a test case in 1979. Phillip attempted to register in the Metallurgy Department and as a Physics retake student, but was unsuccessful in both attempts. At the Emergency Executive Meeting held on 29th June it was decided that since there were no suitable candidates for Acting Deputy President the job would be split between Nick Morton, Christine Teller and myself over the summer. From the start of term and until a new DP is elected I will handle the day-to-day role of DP with Christine acting as Chairman of the House Committee and co-ordinator for the Bookshop and Shop. The details of the election will be covered by Mary in her report. If anybody is interested in the job of Deputy President, myself and Christine would be willing to chat to them at any time.

Southside Move.

Southside Move. At the end of last session Nick Morton, the then President, unveiled a plan to move the Union to Southside where it would occupy the bottom three floors. I have continued to negotiate through the summer, discussing the possibility of utilising unused space in Southside. The use of this space by the Union can only be to our advantage. The present discussions involve the basement space of 46/48 Prince's Gardens which can be used with access from the mews behind Southside. When we begin to talk about major areas such as the old Southside Refectory and the feasibility of substantial usage I intend to carry our negotiations through a Working Party of Council consisting of myself as Chairman, Mary, DP (1), SCAB Chairman, ACC Chairman, RCC Chairman, Christine Teller and Colin Cooper, plus other parties when necessary. This SWP (Southside Working Party), will report to Council and to ICU UGM'S on the feasibility of any schemes put forward by College.

Refectory Lower Lounge.

Since the end of last term the ground floor of the Union Building has been redeveloped. The old Union Refectory area has come under our control and will be used as a party/reception area. The new Union Refectory is situated in the old Lower Lounge. It is intended that this outlet will provide a wider range of cold food and hot meals resembling Bar food, additionally wine will be available from the bar.

I have been involved in this development throughout the summer and am aware of the substantial sum of money invested in this project by College. I think it should be given every chance of success.

The increase of $8\frac{1}{2}\%$ on Refectory prices was agreed before the start of term and is essentially the unavoidable increase in wages and commodity prices.

Bar prices will rise by 2p a pint, bringing our average price up to roughly 58p per pint which is still significantly lower than public houses around us.

Residence.

Over the summer two new Head Tenancies were acquired: the Fremantle and the Sovereign Hotels. This is mainly due to Michael Arthur and his Student Services Office that we can now offer places to over 2,000 of our students.

The College run Linen Service has now virtually been stopped and has been replaced by self-laundering or by individual Hall schemes.

HONORARY SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Parking Permits.

This year, mainly due to various building work around College, the number of spaces available to students has dropped to 174. As already half a ream of application forms have been taken away it is obvious that competition for places is as high as previous years. I reiterate that permits are issued solely on merit, forms must be back before 5.30pm on Friday &th October and that once allocated (on the Sunday) there is <u>no</u> possibility of obtaining a parking permit except in the rare event of someone returning a permit (one person last year, in the Spring term - it was reallocated to the "next" on the merit list). Sorry, but that is one of the problems of living in London.
